EXECUTIVE REPORTS (OFFICERS & DEANS)

REPORT OF THE BISHOP

It is time for congregations and rostered ministers to assemble as synod – an expression of the church that enriches the bond of our baptismal fellowship, extends our proclamation of the Gospel, and strengthens our service in the name of Jesus Christ. We assemble – *Freed in Christ for a New Day* – confident that God's intention is to demonstrate faithfulness to God's people and to call believers to respond with lives of thanksgiving, praise, and compassionate deeds for Jesus' sake.

Synod Assembly 2019 will not be simply one more meeting. It will be an occasion when the Triune God acts to fashion a more faithful, robust Lutheran witness in northeastern Pennsylvania. We assemble, therefore, with anticipation on June 1, 2019 in Hazleton as the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod – Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. It will also mark the 50th Anniversary of the synod's incorporation, which we will observe during the assembly luncheon.

Assembly 2019 is planned for one day, so there is limited time to carry out the reporting and business responsibilities to come before us. Planners worked hard to create an agenda that allows for effective completion of our tasks and for meaningful interaction and conversation. Prompted by cost savings afforded by a one-day assembly, assembly planners encourage congregations to apply the savings to costs for a 2^{1/2}-day assembly in 2020, when sufficient time is needed to elect a new synod bishop.

I continue to rejoice over the ministry exercised by pastors and deacons of this synod. Faithful ministers of word and sacrament, and of word and service, daily provide leadership to congregations eager to bear witness to the Gospel in their communities. Creative ministries abound and are arising in every mission district. I get to observe those ministries and see leaders and members find their faith renewed by them.

I also see local members and leaders active in ministry having impact on the mission of this church beyond the synod territory. Since 2014, congregations have participated in *Always Being Made New: Campaign for the ELCA* with a goal to have 100% of congregations make a contribution to the campaign. In the weeks leading to the 2019 assembly I can report that 90% of synod congregations have participated. Across the ELCA, \$181M (as of March 1) has been raised toward the \$198M goal; an additional \$45M has been raised in planned giving.

Ten ministries targeted to receive campaign funds, including ELCA World Hunger, have been strengthened or expanded. We not only give thanks at the outcome, but also rejoice at the renewal of this church because of the churchwide enthusiasm created by the campaign. I commend all who have been supportive of *Always Being Made New*. What's more, I am pleased to welcome the Rev. Ron Glusenkamp, campaign director, to our assembly as churchwide representative.

In August, approximately 30 voting members of this synod will attend the 2019 ELCA Churchwide Assembly in Milwaukee, WI. At that assembly, a presiding bishop and secretary will be elected. Action will be taken on a proposed social statement concerning justice for women, and a statement about interreligious commitments will be presented to the assembly. Both documents are important guides for ELCA members in our time. This synod's Churchwide Assembly voting members will discover the breadth and depth of this church's ministries in the U.S. and around the globe. Your sharing of congregational offerings to mission support makes possible so many expressions of God's love in the risen Jesus.

Transitions have occurred across the ELCA. The formation of United Lutheran Seminary, to which this synod has a formal relationship deserves attention. It required bold leadership to bring together the Lutheran seminaries in Gettysburg and Philadelphia. Hard decisions had to be made, and no one could have foreseen what transpired next.

Many who are graduates of, or who have provided generous financial support to, ULS and its predecessor schools are worried about the toll taken on the new seminary by dynamics of the transition. In the face of all the challenges, I encourage this synod to offer ULS whatever support is possible – financial, prayer, and encouragement to students, faculty, staff, and administration.

I encourage support of ULS because I respect the sincere efforts of those who led the predecessor seminaries to combine. They could have side-stepped consolidation, in the hope that something would work out for each school, or simply resigned themselves to the eventual closing of one or both schools. They chose a harder path, a path I believe worthy of consideration by our congregations when reaching a point of diminished viability. It is not necessary to acquiesce to eventual closure. Considered early enough and with resolve to build a new basis for mission and ministry, consolidation (of staff, or buildings, or organizational

structure) with another Lutheran congregation, or a Full Communion partner congregation, can keep the spirit of a congregation alive.

The synod's organizational landscape too has experienced transition. Changes in synod staffing and officers have occurred since Assembly 2018. One bishop's associate retired; another stepped down for family reasons; a third moved to part-time status. A support staff member retired, with responsibilities assigned to existing support staff. Changing financial circumstances required adjusting the support staff work week from five days to four days. Completing this transition process, a vice president and secretary will be elected at Assembly 2019 to fill two of the synod's four offices.

We have reached a time in this synod's fifty-year history when sustaining the large number of congregations on our territory is increasingly difficult. There are many reasons for the growing difficulty. Continued closing of congregations based on current decision making by some will severely diminish the Lutheran witness in some areas of our synod. A new path is called for: a path that may require sacrifice, change, and hardship for a while; a path nonetheless that leads to a renewed Lutheran witness. Our consolation is that God does not abandon God's people in pursuit of faithful witness.

I want to make sure there is synod-wide awareness that steps were taken to be clear about this synod's zero -tolerance of sexual misconduct by rostered ministers. To that end, the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod's *Synod Policy on Sexual Misconduct by Rostered Ministers* underwent careful revision since Assembly 2018. Every rostered minister received a copy of the revised policy, with instruction to make it available to and known by congregation councils and other ministry oversight bodies. Our places of ministry must be safe places for all and our leaders must be trustworthy servants of Christ.

When Assembly 2019 ends, we move into a year of discernment in anticipation of the election of a new bishop. The Synod Council has authorized formation of a team responsible for helpful discernment activities and events provided by the ELCA Churchwide office. Watch for announcements of events at which conversations about future leadership needs and mission priorities. The team will finish its work prior to Assembly 2020, providing information garnered from the gatherings. The information is meant to assist voting members in the call of a new bishop.

Moving into our final year of ministry together, I commit myself to vigorous effort on behalf of the rostered ministers and congregations of the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod. I invite you to join me in doing all that can be done to strengthen the Lutheran witness to the good news of God's love in Jesus Christ across this synod. *Freed in Christ for a New Day*, let us give thanks always for God's goodness to us.

REPORT OF THE VICE PRESIDENT

My son, Brock, asked to have a few friends over to celebrate his 11th birthday. Naturally, my thoughts immediately went to invitations as I opened up Etsy on my phone to peruse creative ideas. "What kind of theme do you want this year, buddy?" I asked him excitedly as I recalled the custom themed invitations ordered for prior birthdays. I was already typing my guess of "video games" into the search bar when he said, "I don't know. None, I guess. I think I'll just send a text."

I was horrified. Perhaps that is the way of the world, but I'm of a different opinion: Invitations -- and the way they are presented -- matter. I just simply can't imagine a special event without something pretty or fun to post on the fridge as a reminder of a joyful time yet to come!

When was the last time you received a compelling invitation that stirred your heart? Was it a thick wedding invitation on linen paper with a wax seal and organza ribbon? Was it a sincere offer to take you to lunch by an old friend who already had her calendar out, ready to find a date and time that would work for you both? Or perhaps it was someone making eye contact with you and smiling, patting the empty seat next to him to gesture that you are especially welcome to join the table. Sincere invitations come in different packaging, but all get the same response. More than likely, you didn't think twice about accepting: of course you'll RSVP to the wedding -- and the shower! Of course you'll be looking forward to the lunch -- where's your favorite place to eat? Of course you'll gladly have a seat -- thank you! Smiles and warm hearts abound.

My recent reflection on invitations mattering turned out to be rather timely. Shortly after that birthday planning gone awry, Pastor Mike Bennethum happened to share the book, The Invitational Christian, with me, as well as with members of the Synod staff. The author Dave Daubert, pastor of Zion Lutheran Church in Elgin, Illinois, makes a pressing case: Invitations -- and the way they are presented -- matter to the church, too. The quality and sincerity of our invitations is the heartbeat of our church and our faith. Daubert reminds us that "all of us who are Christians know of God's love for us because of other people." Our sincerest invitations to others to join us at church, in worship, and to come to know God's abundant love for all of us can be life-changing. Imagine how different our own lives would be had faith and church -- and invitations! -- not been a part of it.

I, for one, would not be serving as your Interim Vice President of the Northeast Pennsylvania Synod were it not for a sincere invitation by Bishop Zeiser to fill the shoes of Dr. Barbara Belón. It has been an invitation like no other, far exceeding even the fanciest of wedding invitations; an invitation that has deepened my faith, strengthened my commitment to my beloved church, and challenged me in a call to service that I have found humbling and rewarding. I thank the bishop from the bottom of my heart for this opportunity, and I also thank Mike Bennethum, Secretary Carl Shankweiler, and members of Synod Council and Synod Staff for their heartfelt welcomes and guidance these past few months.

As a part of my time as Vice President, I not-so-humbly invited myself to several congregations in the Synod on Sunday mornings to be among my greater church family. I am pretty proud to be known as "the Vice President who just shows up," because it has given me valuable insight on just how vital being an "Invitational Church" is to a church's wellbeing. Given that, I will challenge you with these questions:

How are you doing at extending your sincerest invitations to welcome those not yet a part of our church family? How are you doing at inviting each other to engage in our faith and in our churches in exciting new ways? What are the stumbling blocks? What can we do to overcome them?

And I will also invite you, as Pastor Mike invited me, to read the book, "The Invitational Christian" together as a church. If you choose to do so, I'll gladly accept any invitations to join your study and listen. I believe you will have many important discoveries and ideas at the end of your book study, and I'm eager to hear the discussion.

For my part, I'd like to extend my sincerest invitation to you -- yes, YOU -- to consider fresh new ways to serve our church together, and I hope that you'll consider accepting! Are you interested in financial matters? Is helping to coordinate large events your skillset? Do you find engaging with our youth to be invigorating? Do you have a passion for participating in steering the church? If it's time to take your faith and your skills for a walk outside the church walls, consider involvement in the Synod. I have found it to be an extraordinary opportunity to get to know fellow Lutherans throughout northeastern Pennsylvania, and an encouraging and uplifting experience being in service to the greater church. Committees are looking for members, and there are open seats on Synod Council. We have a lot of important work ahead of us this next year and in the immediate years to follow. Your voice and talents and passions make us who we are, as a Synod and a part of the greater church. I'm looking at you, smiling and patting the seat next to me. Won't you please join us?

The Rev. Dr. James W. Bowers, son of William and Mary Ann (Daniels) Bowers, was born on June 11, 1952, in Reading. He was a graduate of Mansfield State College (1974) and the Lutheran Theological Seminary, Philadelphia (1981). While serving in parish ministry, he completed a Master's Degree in Clinical Psychology at Marywood College (1996) and a Ph.D. in the same field at Fairleigh Dickenson University (2002).

Following his ordination in 1981 by the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod, Pastor Bowers served Good Shepherd, Wilkes-Barre (1981-1987) and St. Paul's Third, Easton (1987-2000).

Pastor Bowers served the synod as an intentional interim pastor, working with St. John, Whitehall (2001-2003); Christ, Dryville (2003-2004); and Friedens, Center Valley (2004-2005). In 2007 he was called to serve as the associate pastor of the Lutheran Church of the Holy Spirit, Emmaus. He continued in that position until his retirement on July 1, 2018.

In addition to his congregational ministry, Pastor Bowers was a licensed psychologist in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, working with both individuals and families. He served for many years on the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod's Candidacy Committee and performed assessments for candidates for the roster in this synod and other judicatories.

On July 17, 1976, Pastor Bowers married Mary F. O'Donnell, who survives him along with their two daughters (Allison Vovk and Julia Simko), his mother, and a granddaughter.

The Rev. Dennis J. Carroll, son of John W. and Charlotte L. (Rice) Carroll, was born on September 17, 1943 in Bryn Mawr, Pennsylvania. He was a graduate of Elmhurst College (1968) and the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago (1970).

Following his ordination in 1970 by the Illinois Synod of the Lutheran Church in America, Pastor Carroll was called to the Niobrara-Lindy Lutheran Parish in Niobrara, Nebraska, where he served until 1974. From 1974 until 1985 he served as the pastor of Zion, Oldwick, New Jersey. Following a period of employment with the Allstate Insurance Company, in 2006 he was appointed as the pastoral assistant at St. John, Nazareth. In 2007, Pastor Carroll was called to Friedens, Friedensville, where he served until his retirement on May 1, 2014.

On June 29, 1968, Pastor Carroll married Susan E. Nicely. They had three sons (Justin D. Carroll, Daniel J. Carroll, and Stuart M. Carroll) and three grandchildren.

The Rev. Charles E. Fair, son of John D. and Anna (Erath) Fair, was born on November 11, 1926 in New Brighton, Pennsylvania. He was a graduate of Thiel College (1947) and the Lutheran Theological Seminary, Philadelphia (M.Div. 1950; S.T.M. 1954). In 1950 he was ordained by the Pittsburgh Synod of the United Lutheran Church in America.

Pastor Fair served as pastor of Lynnwood Lutheran Church in Belle Vernon, Pennsylvania, from 1950 to 51. From 1951 until 1953 he was the associate pastor at Messiah, Philadelphia. He then became the mission developer of Christ, Levittown. In 1960 he was called as senior pastor of Alsace, Reading, where he served until his retirement in 1993 and during which time he preached on the "Alsace Lutheran Hour" on Radio WRAW. In retirement, he continued to serve actively as an interim pastor and visitation pastor.

During his ministry, Pastor Fair served as a member of the Good Shepherd Home Board, the Berks County Senior Citizens Board, and the Civil Service Commission of Muhlenberg Township. He was a delegate to the national convention of the Lutheran Church in America and preached at events in Pennsylvania, New York, North Carolina, and Ohio.

On June 27, 1953, Pastor Fair married C. Louise Balas, who survives him. They had three children (Daniel C. Fair, Jonathan E. Fair, and the late Rebecca L. Williams) as well as eight grandchildren.

The Rev. Norman C. Krapf, son of William L. and Caroline (Pufahn) Krapf, was born May 11, 1929, in Valley Stream, New York. He served with the US Army during the Korean War. He was a graduate of Wagner College (1957) and the Lutheran Theological Seminary, Philadelphia (1960).

Following his ordination in 1960 by the United Synod of New York and New England, United Lutheran Church in America, Pastor Krapf served the following congregations: Christ's, Woodstock, New York (1960 to 1968); Prince of Peace, Binghamton, New York (1968 to 1971); St. Paul, Easton (1971 to 1986); and St. Luke, Williams Township (1986 to 1992). After retiring, he served in a number of interim and supply ministries and as a visitation pastor for St. Peter's, Bethlehem.

On June 14, 1964, Pastor Krapf married Gwendolyn S. Johnson. They have one daughter, Caroline Clifford, and two grandsons.

The Rev. Paul T. Manrodt, son of Manfred and Martha (Mueller) Manrodt, was born on August 27, 1924, in the Bronx, New York. He was a graduate of Loyola College, Baltimore (1945), and the Lutheran Theological Seminary, Gettysburg (1948).

Following his ordination on May 28, 1948, by the Maryland Synod of the United Lutheran Church in America, Pastor Manrodt served as pastor of St. Andrew Lutheran Church, Capitol Heights, Maryland. From 1957 until 1966, he was the pastor of Christus Victor Lutheran Church in Baltimore. He was then called to Trinity Lutheran Church in Whitehorse, Yukon Territory, Canada, where he served until 1972. From 1972 until his retirement in 1990, he served as pastor of the Bernville Parish in Berks County While in Whitehorse, he served as president of the Breaburn Christian Camp.

On October 24, 1953, Pastor Manrodt married Lilly Cholodetzky, who died in 2000. They are survived by their sons, Eric Manrodt and Karl Manrodt and by five grandchildren.

The Rev. Eddie A. Nilsen, son of Erling M. and Aasine (Listad) Nilsen, was born January 31, 1941, in Brooklyn, New York. He was a graduate of Augustana College, Sioux Falls, South Dakota (1963); Luther Seminary, St. Paul, Minnesota (1971); and Drew University (D.Min., 1991).

Following his ordination in 1971, by the American Lutheran Church, Pastor Nilsen served as pastor of Grafton Lutheran Church, Grafton, North Dakota. From 1974 until 1976, he was pastor of Trinity Lutheran Church, Cincinnati, Ohio. He then served St. Peter Lutheran Church, Edon, Ohio, from 1977 until 1983. From 1983 until 1997, he was the pastor of St. Mark Lutheran Church, Morristown, New Jersey.

In 1997, Pastor Nilsen came to the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod to serve Shepherd of the Hills Parish in Dushore. From 2002 until his retirement in 2006, he then served the former Good News Parish in Shohola, Greeley, and Lackawaxen. For several years he also served as a chaplain with the Civil Air Patrol.

Pastor Nilsen married Randy E. Hansen on August 5, 1967. He is survived by a daughter, Karen Jensen, and a son, Mark Nilsen, and by three grandchildren.

The Rev. David B. Schaeffer, son of John L. and Arlene M. (Reichard) Schaeffer, was born on December 30, 1949, in Bethlehem. He was a graduate of Kutztown University (1971) and Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary (1977). He was a veteran of the U.S. Army.

Following his ordination in 1977 by the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod, Pastor Schaeffer was called to serve as assistant pastor at St. John, Nazareth. From 1982 until 1989 he served as the pastor of Peace-Tohickon, Perkasie, Pennsylvania. In 1989, Pastor Schaeffer returned to St. John, Nazareth, to serve as senior pastor. He continued to serve there until his retirement on August 6, 2017. He was active in community organizations, including president of the Board for Moravian Hall Square.

On July 22, 1972, Pastor Schaeffer married Carol R. Hollenbach. He is survived by their two children (John M. Schaeffer and David Schaeffer) and four grandchildren.

The Rev. Lars B. Staaby, son of Nils and Sofie (Berthelsen) Staaby, was born on December 31, 1920 in Flekkefjord, Norway. He served in the Norwegian Merchant Marine from 1938 to 1941, immigrating to the United States by way of Argentina following the German invasion of Norway. He joined the United States Army in 1943 and was granted citizenship during his military service. He was a graduate of Wagner College (1956) and the Lutheran Theological Seminary, Philadelphia (1958).

Following his ordination by the Ministerium of Pennsylvania on May 25, 1958, Pastor Staaby served as pastor of St. James, Ashland, and St. Peter, Lavelle (1958-1959), as associate pastor of St. Paul, Landsdowne (1959-1961), and as pastor of St. Peter, Lavelle (1961-1966). In 1966, he was called to Epiphany, Temple,

where he served until 1970. From 1970 until his retirement in 1984, Pastor Staaby served Christ, Stouchsburg. Following his retirement, he continued to serve the church as an interim and visitation pastor in several congregations in the Lower Susquehanna and Northeastern Pennsylvania Synods.

On September 1, 1945, Pastor Staaby married Helen L. Brem, who died in 2011. They were the parents of three sons (Lars B. Staaby, Eric R. Staaby, and David L. Staaby) and had several grandchildren. Eric died in 2014.

REPORT OF THE SYNOD COUNCIL

This year's report comes in two sections. Section I is the traditional report of the previous year's actions by the Synod Council of the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod. Section II consists of the proposed revisions to the synod's continuing resolutions and other resolutions that continue to have an impact in the life of the synod. Both sections include items for 2019 assembly action, that is, the resolutions highlighted in bold print.

SECTION I

The Synod Council met four times since the 2018 assembly: July 18, 2018; October 17, 2018; January 23, 2019; and March 14, 2019. The following report lists all resolutions adopted at these meetings as well as one action taken by the Executive Committee of the Synod Council and reported at the subsequent meeting and any electronic ballots taken by the council and then reported at the subsequent meetings.

The numbers preceding the resolutions indicate the year, month, and sequence number of the resolution. Recommendations for assembly action appear in bold face type. All items are presented for review by the assembly. The complete minutes of the meetings of the council are posted on the synod's website and are available upon request from the synod secretary.

Prior to requesting approval of the Synod Council for the sabbatical leave, the bishop shall make arrangements with mission district deans, neighboring synod bishops, and other appropriate entities for the purpose of providing pastoral care during the bishop's absence. The bishop will provide at least six months' notice prior to the leave and a summary of intent of the sabbatical to the Synod Council for its consideration. Upon approval by the Synod Council, the bishop will inform appropriate churchwide office personnel. Congregations and rostered ministries of the synod will be informed in a timely manner of the dates encompassing the leave.

Upon completion of the sabbatical, the bishop will provide the Synod Council with a report on the leave, including a report on the benefits accrued during the leave.

The ELCA and Portico Benefits Services websites have helpful resource information pertaining to sabbaticals.

This policy will take effect September 1, 2020.

(2018.10.07) *Resolved*, That Hope's Table, housed at Hope Lutheran Church, 601 N. Front Street, Reading 19601, be reauthorized as a Synodically Authorized Worshipping Community (SAWC) of the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod.

(2018.10.08) *Resolved*, That Common Ground Recovery Community-Downtown Reading Campus, meeting at Trinity Lutheran Church, 527 Washington Street, Reading 19601, be reauthorized as a Synodically Authorized Worshipping Community (SAWC) of the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod.

(2019.01.06) *Resolved*, That the Common Ground Recovery Community, housed at Atonement Lutheran Church, 5 Wyomissing Blvd, Wyomissing, PA 19610 be reauthorized as a Synodically Authorized Worshipping Community of the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod.

SECTION II

In 2016, the Constitution Committee of the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod reviewed, edited, combined, and updated the mass of continuing resolutions as found in the current annual Minute Book, adding to those resolutions the newer resolutions from recent years which had not yet been included. When this work was presented to the synod council through its Administration Committee in January 2017, the council retracted the resolution dealing with the disclosure of certain salaries by agencies seeking synod grants (Chapter 2, Item 10 in the proposed document;

the original resolution adopted by the 1993 Assembly). Another item dealing with Mutual Ministry/Staff Support committees was amended (Chapter 5, Item 8 in the proposed document). Since that meeting, no additional action has been taken on this proposed document.

Hence, at the 2019 assembly I will move the following resolution: Resolved, That the document "Continuing Resolutions and Other Resolutions of Ongoing Impact," as considered and amended by the synod council at its meeting on January 18, 2017, be approved effective the close of this 2019 assembly, except for those specific sections identified in writing by at least one member of the 2019 assembly for further consideration at the 2020 assembly, in which instances the previous synodical actions on the same topics will continue in effect until revised or replaced by the 2020 assembly.

Because many of the original resolutions behind the proposed revisions were the result of assembly action, it is beneficial to have the assembly approve the proposed document so that the revisions, updates, and retraction cannot be seen as being taken by the council without regard for the assembly's previous work and action.

As stated in the resolution, any 2019 assembly member who wants consideration to be given to a specific item in the following document should inform the secretary in writing before the end of this 2019 assembly. Otherwise, the un-requested items will go into effect immediately following this 2019 assembly. Any items needing further action will be considered at the 2020 assembly, when the agenda will allow more time for business items. Of course, any specific issues not thereby approved in 2019 will still be governed by the original synodical actions of years past.

CONTINUING RESOLUTIONS and OTHER RESOLUTIONS OF ONGOING IMPACT Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod, ELCA

CONTINUING RESOLUTIONS

- S9.01.A08. The Synod Council Executive Committee shall provide for background checks for persons nominated for synodical office prior to the Synod Assembly at which the election will take place or as soon as possible after the Synod Assembly for newly elected officers nominated from the floor who were not identified as nominees prior to the assembly. The process shall be as follows:
 - a. Prior to the Synod Assembly appropriate notice of the background check requirement and protocol will be provided to voting members, potential nominees, and others as directed by the Synod Council.
 - b. Nominees and newly elected officers are required to provide written consent to a background check and all information necessary to complete a background check, which should be completed prior to the Synod Assembly with respect to nominees and prior to installation for newly elected officers, if possible.
 - c. The Synod Council's Executive Committee shall designate one Executive Committee or Synod Council member to obtain the background checks.
 - d. All background checks for nominees and newly elected officers will entail a criminal background check. A financial background check will be completed for nominees for treasurer. The Executive Committee shall decide whether additional types of background checks are appropriate for each officer position.
 - e. The background check results shall be provided to that nominee or elected officer and to the Synod Council's Executive Committee, which shall then take action as deemed appropriate. Further disclosure of the results may be determined by the Executive Committee.
 - f. The Executive Committee may adopt other procedures or protocols as are necessary to provide for background checks for nominees and newly elected synodical officers and shall report such actions to the Synod Council.
- S11.01.A13. There shall be seven Ministry Teams: 1) Worship, 2) Spirituality, 3) Witness and Service, 4) Youth, Young Adult, and Family, 5) Faith Formation, 6) Connection Building, and 7) Leadership Development.
 - a. It shall be the duty of each Ministry Team to oversee the development of programs which will further the achievement of the purposes established by the Synod Council and the Synod Assembly. The Ministry Teams shall also carry out further tasks that may be assigned by the Synod Council.
 - The Witness and Service Team, in consultation with the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America Congregational and Synodical Mission Unit (CSM), shall be responsible for identification and review of new and renewing ministries in this Synod that are supported by CSM grants.
 - The Ministry Teams may appoint task groups as necessary to carry out programs in their areas of concern and shall assure the necessary coordination and communication among these committees
 - c. Each Ministry Team shall recommend to the Synod Council an annual budget for that Team's area of concern. In preparing this budget recommendation, it will consult with its task groups

- concerning the needs and plans in each area of its concern. It shall also include in its budget request an amount for new programs that the Team will identify and fund during the budget year.
- d. The Teams shall report regularly and at least annually to the Synod Council and annually to the Synod Assembly.
- S11.01.B13.a. There may be support committees to provide for the other ministry functions of this Synod and to assure the availability of resources to meet these needs.
 - b. With the exception of the Committee of Deans, the Consultation Committee, and the Commit tee on Discipline, support committees will be appointed by the Synod Council on nomination by the Bishop, and their duties shall be determined by the Synod Council.
- S11.01.C13.a. There shall be a Cabinet composed of the Bishop and Vice President of the Synod, the chairs of the Ministry Teams and the staff persons relating to the Ministry Teams. The function of the Cabinet shall be to provide coordination and communication among the Teams.
 - b. The Cabinet shall report to the Synod Council after each Cabinet meeting.

OTHER RESOLUTIONS OF ONGOING IMPACT

CHAPTER I - Synod Policy, Officers, Elections, Leadership

- 1. This synod may adopt continuing resolutions by action of the Synod Assembly or by action of the Synod Council (S18.31). The assembly or council may also adopt other resolutions that have an ongoing impact on the life of the synod. All of these resolutions shall be included in the synod's list of Continuing Resolutions and Other Resolutions with Ongoing Impact until action is taken to rescind them.
- 2. All Continuing Resolutions and Other Resolutions with Ongoing Impact then in force shall be published immediately following the Constitution and Bylaws as part of the minutes of each annual Synod Assembly. Included with each continuing resolution and other resolution with ongoing impact shall be notice of the year in which it was adopted and by which governing authority.
- 3. The responses of the ELCA Churchwide Assembly or of the Church Council of the ELCA to memorals initiated in this synod shall be reported to the next Synod Assembly through the report of the Synod Council.
- 4. In keeping with Chapter 6 of its constitution, this synod is committed to encountering and sharing God's word of love given in Jesus Christ and to encouraging all people to engage in lives of service. To accomplish these goals, the synod's strategic directions are as follows:
 - Deepen the spiritual lives of people to help them see God at work and help others see that too.
 - Build a network that uses our gifts, skills, and resources to maximize what we can do together and strengthen congregations in their ministry.
 - Develop leaders, both lay and ordained, who are equipped and engaged in God's mission in daily life.
 - Enhance lives of service to deal with social needs and issues that arise in local communities or across the synod.
 - Strengthen the work being done with children, youth, and families to support ministries as they engage their communities.
- 5. Those who serve on the bishop's executive staff shall be required to complete the Child Abuse History Check and the PA State Police Criminal Record Check every 36 months, as required by law; and the Criminal Record Check shall be required of support staff as well, with the synod paying the cost.
- 6. Prior to the assembly at which a bishop of the synod is to be elected, the Synod Council shall appoint a task force to ascertain and define the needs, concerns, and priorities of the synod. The report of the Synod Council or appointed task force shall be disseminated prior to the spring mission district assemblies. Following the report of the second ballot for the office of bishop, a period of not less Than three (3) hours shall be set aside for the purpose of the discussion of issues, mission district caucuses, presentations by the nominees, and prayer.
- 7. Service of an unexpired term, or a partial term, of two years or more in duration, shall count as a full term in determining eligibility for any election or appointment which is subject to limitation of terms.

- 8. At least one youth below the age of 21 shall be included in each of the lay male and lay female categories on the ballot for voting members of the ELCA churchwide assemblies.
- 9. Voting members, congregations, mission districts, and ministry teams presenting issues to the Committee of Reference and Counsel shall be urged to submit these issues in writing at least 45 days prior to the assembly. The Committee of Reference and Counsel is urged to mail a report of its recommended actions on those issues to voting members at least 30 days prior to the assembly.
- 10. Resolutions received by the Committee of Reference and Counsel less than two weeks before the opening of the Synod Assembly will be brought before the assembly to decide whether or not they should be considered. Such resolutions will be considered only if the assembly votes by a simple majority to consider them.
- 11. The privilege of voice at synod assemblies shall be extended to candidates approved for ordination as well as to pastors of full-communion partner denominations who are serving in synod congregations.
- 12. A missionary serving under a call from the Global Missions Program Unit who is unable to attend assemblies of the synod shall be regarded by the Committee on Registration and Excuse as excused.
- 13. It is the policy of this synod that display space and forum time at synod assemblies are available only
 - a. congregations, mission districts, ministry teams, committees, task forces and teams of the synod;
 - those agencies and institutions which are a direct outreach ministry of the ELCA and/or the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod, ELCA educational institutions or those of our full communion partners and the Pennsylvania Council of Churches;
 - c. Lutheran fraternal benefit societies: and
 - d..1517 Media, which is the only group with permission to sell goods or services.

Other church-related groups and individuals may apply to the Synod Council for a one-time exception to the policy on displays or forums at an assembly. The decision of the council is final.

- 14. The following guidelines will apply to all displays and forums:
 - a. Displays and forums are to be related to the ELCA and the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod or their ministries.
 - b. Personal attacks and defamation are prohibited. In presenting a point of view, civil and respectful language must be used.
 - c. Displays and forums are not to promote ideas or activities in opposition to provisions of the ELCA, Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod, or congregational constitutions.
- 15. The synod calls upon each member of the synod to exercise his or her own political responsibility, as his or her own faith and conscience demand, including learning how to be involved in the political decision-making process
- 16. The synodical bishop may, at his or her discretion, provide legal assistance and/or bail for pastors and members of congregations who, for reason of Christian concern for human rights and eschewing violence, are subject to arrest and/or incarceration.
- 17. Recognizing the variety of opinions within this synod with regard to matters of human sexuality and same-gender relationships, the synod asks its rostered leaders, congregations, and social ministry organizations to commit themselves to the action of the 2009 ELCA Churchwide Assembly "to bear one another's burdens, love the neighbor, and respect the bound consciences of all" for the sake of the unity of this church.
- 18. The synod asks its rostered leaders, congregations, and social ministry organizations to commit themselves to live in ways that preserve and protect God's creation, utilizing the information and assistance that is available through ELCA ministries that support the care of creation.
- 19. The synod encourages its rostered leaders, congregations, and social ministry organizations to enter into partnerships to address the prevention of bullying, harassment, and related forms of violence.

CHAPTER II – Financial Matters

1. The Synod Council shall seek at least two bids for any project costing more than \$5,000.

- 2. The investment philosophy of the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod shall be follows:
 - a. Investment in the ELCA Mission Investment Fund shall be continued. The amount of the commitment shall be reviewed annually by the Finance Committee of the Synod Council.
 - b. Pennsylvania's Prudent Investor Rule shall apply. Exceptions may be authorized by the Synod Council.
 - c. Investment decisions shall reflect the social concerns and policy statements of the synod and the ELCA.
- 3. The "Declaration of Trust" here following shall be the synod's Church Loan Development Fund. All assets currently held in the Church Loan Development Fund, including income earned on these assets, will be used to provide loans to congregations and to assist in the purchase or improvement or capital repair of real estate and to assist mission congregations. A representative of the Synod's Witness and Service Ministry Team shall meet with the congregation to discuss their needs and appropriateness of a loan from these funds and to recommend terms to be reviewed and approved by the Finance Committee before submission to Synod Council for authorization. The amount of any loan should not exceed 15% of the assets of the fund, including principal balances on other outstanding loans, as determined at the time of the loan. The interest rate shall be zero for new mission congregations up to 1% below the Federal Reserve prime rate for all other loans. Each loan is to be secured by a judgment note or real estate mortgage maturing in not more than seven years.
- Any bequest to the synod, to any of its program units, or to any cause administered by the synod, shall be applied to a synod endowment fund unless otherwise designated by the terms of the bequest.
- 5. Except where the donor specifies otherwise, a bequest naming the Eastern Pennsylvania Synod or the Lutheran Ministerium of Pennsylvania shall be allocated to the Southeastern Pennsylvania Synod, ELCA, or the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod, ELCA, according to the place of probate of the person's will, subject to these further rules:
 - a. Should the decedent be a resident of neither synod, the allocation shall be made to the synod in which the person last resided.
 - b. Should a case arise which is not covered by the foregoing rules or in which their literal application would frustrate the probable intent of the decedent, the officers of the two synods shall resolve the matter according to their best judgment of the probable intent.
- 6. The treasurer shall be authorized to place earned income that has not otherwise been designated for spending into a common fund (currently the Prosser, Pahse, Mission Fund) to be used for special projects or for synod budget items as designated from time to time by the Synod Council. Should an emergency arise between meetings of the Synod Council, the treasurer shall be authorized to expend up to \$5,000 from the fund upon unanimous consent of the other officers and the chairperson of the Finance Committee.
- 7. The assets from dissolving congregations, including the proceeds from selling their real estate holdings, shall be added to the Prosser, Pahse, Mission Fund with the exception that the Synod Council may entertain requests by the congregation councils of dissolving congregations that a portion of their assets be directed to other specific benevolent causes related to the ministries of the Synod and the ELCA.
- 8. The Synod Council shall set an annual spending policy for the Prosser, Pahse, Mission Fund, the Student Education Fund, the Leadership Development Fund, and the Social Ministry Fund based on the percentages of the funds' average asset values over the previous five-year period.
- 9. All income and appreciation from the Clyde Kelchner II Fund (the corpus of which represents the original bequest) shall be deposited in the Clyde Kelchner I Fund. The Finance Committee shall establish a spending proposal each year based on a percentage of the three-year rolling average of the sum of the two funds. The Lutheran Theological Seminary at Philadelphia or its successor shall be advised each year after the audit what amount will be available for scholarships in the forthcoming year.
- 10. The secretary of this synod shall ask each of the social ministry and educational institutions to which this synod contributes more than \$10,000 a year through its annual budget or through special appeals to report annually to this synod's assembly the salaries and benefits paid to its top

executive and to its three most highly compensated employees. [Note: the synod council acted on January 18, 2017, to "retract and delete" this item from the list of resolutions, which will occur in all subsequent printings of this document.]

- 11. To ensure the participation of the synod bishop in the annual ELCA Bishop's Academy, each year the bishop shall contribute up to \$500 from his or her continuing education funds toward the Academy expenses. Any expense above \$500 will be charged to the staff travel budget line in the synod's spending plan.
- 12. When studies are requested in this synod, the request shall be accompanied by an estimate of the cost and a recommendation regarding the source of the funds needed to conduct the study

CHAPTER III – ELCA/Synod Related Organizations, Committees, Ministry Teams

- The Constitution Committee shall review annually the Continuing Resolutions and Other Resolutions with Ongoing Impact and recommend to the Synod Assembly the repeal or replacement of any resolutions that the committee deems no longer applicable to the life of the synod.
- 2. The Leadership Development Ministry Team shall annually determine and publish guidelines for minimum base salaries for clergy and other rostered leaders.
- 3. It is the goal of this synod that at least 10% of the membership of the Synod Assembly, councils, ministry teams, and other organizational units be persons of color and/or persons whose primary language is other than English.
- 4. The leaders of the synod shall promote youth activity in synodical functions, including membership in the synod's ministry teams and organizations.
- 5. The following expectations shall inform the synod's ongoing relationship with the ELCA's social ministry organizations on its territory:
 - a. The synod shall provide moral and financial support to the ELCA agencies and institutions on its territory.
 - b. The social ministry organizations shall seek to coordinate their programs and ministry with the total ministry of the church on this territory.
 - c. The social ministry organizations shall report annually to the Synod Assembly.
 - d. The social ministry organizations shall seek the approval of the synod prior to any financial appeals among the congregations of the synod.
 - e. The social ministry organizations shall consult with the bishop of the synod concerning the employment of any rostered person whose call shall be issued by the Synod Council.
- 6. This synod shall be a member of the Pennsylvania Council of Churches. The bishop shall be authorized to appoint the required representatives.
- 7. The Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod of the ELCA recognizes Muhlenberg College as an ELCA church-related educational institution and affirms and supports its ministry as integral to the ministry of this synod. Further, the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod calls upon its members to support Muhlenberg College with their prayers and gifts.
- 8. The Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod recognizes the Good Shepherd Home Rehabilitation Net work, Diakon Lutheran Social Ministries, and Lutheran Congregational Services as social ministry organizations affiliated with the ELCA. Further, the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod affirms the caring ministry of these agencies and institutions and calls upon its members to support that ministry through their prayers and gifts.
- 9. The Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod of the ELCA authorizes its participation as the corporate member of the Good Shepherd Rehabilitation Network.
- 10. Specialized ministries of the synod, the ELCA, or its partners that request to do so shall be given the opportunity to share their stories with the Synod Assembly in a brief manner.
- 11. The synod, its members, congregations, and related institutions are urged to consider 1517 Media resources as a source for worship, educational, and other church supplies.
- 12. The Lutheran Archives Center in Philadelphia shall be allowed to contact potential donors (congregations and individuals) for donations. All such contacts shall be in the form of a targeted appeal

for assistance, not a general solicitation.

13. A special offering to benefit the ELCA's World Hunger Appeal shall be received at the annual Synod Assembly.

CHAPTER IV – Judicatories and Ecumenical Partners

- 1. The synod is committed to working together with judicatories and congregations of the ELCA's ecumenical partners, wherever possible, in order to avoid unnecessary duplication, gain strength in shared resources, provide more effective ministry, and gain visible expression to the unity we have in Christ, and to that end we will strive faithfully to
 - a. engage in mutual prayer for the life and ministry of our respective judicatories and to encourage our congregations in every community to pray for each other;
 - b. encourage and support congregations in like spirit to form covenant relationships on a local level by which they commit themselves to common worship, study, and mission;
 - c. provide opportunities on judicatory levels for God's people to worship, study and do mission together, deepening our understanding of historical and theological traditions;
 - d. encourage committees, task forces, agencies, and institutions of our judicatories with similar ministry concerns to provide for liaisons from the respective denominations and to share with these people all committee or task force communications;
 - e. invite official observers to all the conventions, assemblies, and meetings of our governing boards:
 - f. encourage a continued close working relationship between the bishops, executives, staff, and ecumenical committees of our judicatories;
 - g. consider joint use of physical facilities; and
 - h. review periodically our commitments to one another.

CHAPTER V – Congregations, Mission Districts, Clusters

- 1. The synod is a "Book of Faith" synod, committing us to live in and from the Word of God in all our meetings, assemblies, and events. To do so, we regularly and increasingly hear, read, study, share, and are engaged by God's Word. The bishop of our synod, who "as its pastor, shall be a teacher of the faith of this church and shall provide leadership for the life and witness of this church," shall lead this initiative personally and through collaborative programmatic work with congregations of the syn od. We celebrate and continue to support and strengthen those places where Scripture is already taught and engaged. We encourage all congregations to explore new opportunities for engaging the Bible, send members to synodical events for training as Bible study leaders, and include biblical study as an integral part of all meetings and groups in order to become more fluent in the first language of faith the language of scripture that we might live into our calling as a people renewed, enlivened, empowered, and sent by the Word.
- 2. Each congregation on the roster of the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod is urged to adopt a constitution based on the latest edition of the ELCA's Model Constitution for Congregations.
- 3. Congregations of the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod are urged to commit themselves to the following:
 - pray for the renewal of this church.
 - prepare and renew evangelical leaders.
 - teach discipleship.
 - start and renew congregations.
- 4. Congregations of this synod are called upon to
 - lift up in prayer all those living in poverty and struggling for dignity;
 - use ELCA study resources pertaining to these issues, including relevant social statements and messages; and
 - exercise responsible consumerism as a way to live out our commitment to justice
- 5. The synod urges its congregations and rostered leaders to affiliate with and actively support their local ministeriums and regional or county conferences of churches.
- 6. Each congregation council shall submit a report annually to the bishop regarding compensation of rostered leaders, paying particular attention to the section related to steps that will be taken to raise compensation to minimum levels if they are not currently being met. The bishop and his/her associates shall consult with congregation councils where minimums are not being met. Consultation will

automatically occur after the filing of the annual "Report for Ordained Minister Under Call From A Congregation" or the "Report for Associate in Ministry Under Call From A Congregation." All consultation shall be handled through the Office of the Bishop. With the goal of developing a process to achieve just and equitable compensation, the bishop may appoint, or the congregation council or rostered leader may request, specially trained consultants to facilitate continuing discussion. The bishop or his/her designee shall remind congregation councils of the importance of the housing equity allowance as a benefit to pastors in parsonages.

- 7. In accordance with S14.05. of the Synod Constitution, all rostered leaders shall complete the annual report for the bishop. This report lists compensation.
- 8. Congregation councils and rostered leaders shall develop an annual covenant of mutual goals, expectations, and responsibilities. The Mutual Ministry/Staff Support Committee will have, among its duties, the responsibility to review and evaluate the implementation of the covenant and to recommend appropriate compensation for rostered leaders. [Note: the synod council acted on January 18, 2017, to amend this item so that the second sentence will be replaced by "Appropriate processes will be developed to review and evaluate the implementation of the covenant." In future printings of this document, the synod council's wording will be shown as the adopted wording.]
- 9. Every candidate considering a call to a congregation in this synod shall be given a copy of the last annual meeting report of that congregation.
- 10. The Synod Council, through the appropriate synod committee, shall enter annually into consultations between the synod and its congregations to determine congregational mission support commitment goals for support of the synod's spending plan in the coming fiscal year.
- 11. Congregations of this synod considering a major capital expenditure are advised to consult with the bishop's designated representative before starting a major project involving capital expenditures.
- 12. Congregational leaders are encouraged to educate members as to how mission support funds are used, employing print and media resources created by the synod and the ELCA.
- 13. The bishop and his/her associates shall raise the issue of compensation publicly (at Synod Assemblies, mission district meetings, etc.) and give testimony to it as a matter of economic justice for those who serve the church.
- 14. The bishop or his/her designee shall provide an opportunity for education and discussion about compensation packages with new rostered leaders, emphasizing the leader's role in the process of compensation negotiation.
- 15. In arriving at a salary and benefits package, additional consideration shall be given to (a) prior work experience, especially in the case of "second career" leaders; (b) size and complexity of the employing congregation; (c) cost of living in different areas of the synod; and (d) performance and achievement factors.
- 16. Congregations of the synod are urged to review annually the wages and benefits provided to lay employees, seeking to ensure that
 - wages are commensurate with skills, expectations and responsibilities;
 - the possibility of offering health benefits is explored when needed and possible;
 - opportunities to gain new skills are provided; and
 - a forum for addressing concerns or grievances is made available.

Congregations are also urged to provide unemployment insurance for their lay employees.

- 17. Recognizing that we are all "blessed to be a blessing," congregations of the synod are urged to make the ministry of stewardship a high priority. Especially in times of pastoral transition, congregations are urged to review their current stewardship ministries, develop stewardship plans, and draw upon the resources offered by the ELCA and the synod to grow in the theology and practice of stewardship.
- 18. For a congregation in which the pastor(s) live in church-owned housing, the congregation council should review periodically the residential facilities to determine their safety and adequacy for the achievement of the purpose of the congregation in the community.
- 19. The synod encourages all congregations that enter a dissolution process to set aside an amount at

least equal to the contribution requested by the Lutheran Archives Center at Philadelphia, the interest of which will be utilized to provide perpetual care for these records. If the assets of said congregations and agencies should come to the treasury of the synod without a grant to the Lutheran Archives Center having been made, the synod will forward the appropriate amount to the Lutheran Archives Center provided that the congregation's assets are sufficient to cover such a grant.

- 20. The synod calls upon all pastors and members of our congregations to support open occupancy in housing in their neighborhoods and to assist every sound and reasonable effort to end the exclusion of any person from equal opportunity to rent, lease, or purchase living accommodations with all facilities and services at equitable cost. Further, we call upon all members as well as pastors of our congregations to visit in Christian love all newcomers to their neighborhoods and to invite them into full participation in community affairs. Further, we call upon all members of our congregations, when selling real estate, to make it available for sale to all qualifying purchasers, and to this end to exercise great care in the selection of real estate agents who will handle such transactions in accordance with the wishes of the seller. And further, the synod extends to all its pastors and congregations the assurance of its continuing approval and support in the implementation of these principles.
- 21. The synod calls upon its congregations to include in their evangelism visitations all persons in their communities without distinction as to nationality, race, color, language, sexual orientation, age, or religious experience in order to invite all people to experience God's grace through the ministries of the congregation. Further, the synod calls upon its members, congregations, and institutions to continue to be led by faith, the Scriptures, and church resources in order to address the racial barriers that have made the vision of a more multicultural church so difficult to achieve, while also recommitting to seek out, raise up, and support young people from all races, ethnic groups, and cultures for public leadership in the church.
- 22. Functions and events of this synod, its mission districts, and congregations shall be planned in such a manner and conducted in such places that physically, mentally, and sensory challenged persons can be included.
- 23. Congregations of this synod shall be safe environments for all children and their families and caregivers by
 - building Christ-centered, positive trusting relationships that nurture the healthy growth of children and strengthen families;
 - using our resources to provide a sanctuary for children;
 - creating a Gospel-centered, faith-based teaching and learning environment of hospitality that welcomes all children with their families and caregivers;
 - developing programs and places that help children to flourish;
 - collaborating with other faith communities, agencies, and service organizations that work for the well-being of children in our community;
 - working with the government for more public measures that support the well-being of children;
 - supporting the efforts of the ELCA to meet the basic needs of children through Lutheran social
 ministry organizations as they provide caring services for children, and through the ELCA World
 Hunger Program, which carries our concerns for children through the world; and
 - encouraging all congregations to have adults working with children to undergo appropriate background checks.
- 24. Congregations of this synod are encouraged to engage in education and conversations to discern where God is leading them regarding the welcoming of and providing pastoral care for LGBT people and their families.
- 25. Congregations of this synod are encouraged to allow same-gender marriages within their facilities, providing the same resources and following the same criteria they use for different-gender marriages.

In addition to the above resolutions, the following policies approved by the Synod Assembly or Synod Council are in effect until revised, replaced, or withdrawn:

- Procedure for Congregations Considering Withdrawal from the ELCA (Synod Council 2007.6.9)
- Personnel Manual
- Call Process (PT03)
- Procedures for Congregations that are Closing or Merging
- Policy on Synodical Administration

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF DEANS

The Committee of Deans met four times since the last synod assembly. Consideration of roster matters was an ongoing task of the deans at each meeting.

At its August meeting, Bishop Zeiser welcomed two newly elected deans: Pastors Mark Rigg and Scott Paradise. The deans heard a report from Pastor Thomas Lang, Synod Coaching Coordinator, regarding the purpose of coaching ministry – to accompany coaching clients on their journey toward a stated goal – and the availability of trained coaches on our territory to work with rostered ministers and other leaders.

In November, the deans reviewed and updated the synod's guidelines for the remuneration of those serving as supply pastors. Beginning January 1, 2019, the suggested minimum honorarium will be \$150 for one worship service, \$200 for two worship services, and \$225 for three worship services. The deans also learned of plans to hold a series of regional events to support the creation of men's ministries in congregations.

In January, Bishop Zeiser spoke with the deans about the recently revised synodical policy on the Sexual Misconduct of Rostered Ministers. Also, Barb Debski, Regional Representative with Portico Benefit Services, updated the deans on various changes to the health benefit program – including a new process for earning "wellness dollars" that can offset deductible expenses. She also spoke about the ELCA's Special Needs Retirement Fund.

At its April meeting, the deans finalized plans for a worship service and luncheon, to be held at the Lutheran Center on April 30, 2019, to honor those rostered ministers who are celebrating significant anniversaries of ordination, consecration, or commissioning. The deans also discussed ways that congregations can use the resource *The Invitational Christian*, by Dave Daubert.

Following his retirement, he continued to work part-time with the LTSP Foundation. Throughout his career, Pastor Feinour also served the synod in various capacities – as a benevolence consultant and as a member of the Stewardship Committee, Endowment Committee, Church Vocations Committee, and Examining Committee.

Pastor Feinour was married to Judith Merkel on April 23, 1960. They are the parents of two children – Kenneth Michael and John David. On July 1, 1984, he was married to Rosalee Goodman.

MINISTRY TEAMS

WITNESS AND SERVICE MINISTRY TEAM

When I think of "witness" I think of the witness trees I have encountered on my travels. Old lives, maybe hundreds and in some cases thousands of years old that are rooted in significant places. If only these old woods could speak or write, they would have many truths to share with us.

"Service" is more complicated. There are service centers that fix stuff, customer service departments, who solve problems, and service organizations that change the lives of people and their communities. Service like witness is not uniquely Lutheran or even Christian.

But when we place them both together, we can see our special purpose more clearly. We are the voice, the pen or the social media platform if you will for the story of Jesus Christ in our lives. Here is an accounting of our activity for 2018:

Awarded nearly \$24,000 in grants during 2018 to thirteen congregations and community organizations for new and continuing service projects. Grant recipients are asked to report their successes and challenges and are encouraged to develop funding and volunteer partnerships in order to help sustain and grow these service initiatives into the future.

Worked with the (dis) Ability Resource Information Task Force, Bike for World Hunger Task Force, Creation Care Task Force, LGBT+ Ministry Task Force and the Justice Ministry Task Force to increase awareness and advocacy opportunities.

Supported social ministry organizations such as Diakon, Good Shepherd, Lutheran Congregational Services, and Trinity Deaf Ministry from the Social Ministry Fund.

Worked with the Coaching sub-group to encourage and support strategies for renewing ministry.

- 3. Provide or insure support for the families of rostered leaders
 - The team maintains and reviews the salary and compensation guidelines found in the bulletin of reports.

2020 MINIMUM COMPENSATION GUIDELINES

These guidelines represent a 2% increase over 2019

1) The 2020 *minimum* base salary for pastors in the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod of the ELCA be in agreement with the following guidelines:

- 2) It is the responsibility of each congregation to provide housing for its pastor(s). This may be accomplished in either of two ways:
 - a) <u>Housing Allowance</u>. A portion of the pastor's salary may be designated as a housing allowance. This amount will vary, depending upon location and the needs of the pastor. Congregations and pastors should check current tax laws in establishing this figure. This amount should be established before the beginning of each year by a resolution of the Congregation Council or the listing of an amount in the congregation's budget.
 - b) <u>Parsonage</u>. This is free use of a church-owned house, including utilities. A portion of the pastor's base salary may be set aside for furnishings and other housing expenses according to the IRS code. An annual equity allowance of a minimum of 3%-5% of salary is recommended for all parsonage situations.

- 3) Congregations should remember that the figures in the grid are *minimums*. Congregations are encouraged to exceed these minimum guidelines. Additional compensation should be provided based on criteria such as continuing education, special skills, responsibilities, merit, and local conditions.
- 4) Each congregation shall establish a Mutual Ministry Committee to facilitate the discussion by which these criteria are evaluated (as well as for carrying out the other functions of mutual ministry).
- 5) A congregation that fails to meet the synodical guidelines shall submit a report to the bishop on a form to be provided, detailing the reasons why these minimums are not being met and the steps that will be taken to establish these minimums as soon as possible.

The following minimum benefits should be provided in addition to salary:

- 1) A **Social Security Allowance** equal to one half of the pastor's social security liability. This allowance is taxable for income tax purposes. For 2020, the Social Security liability is expected to be equal to 15.3% of the combined base salary and housing provision. (Parsonages are subject to this tax at their fair rental value.)
- 2) An **Automobile Allowance** equal to IRS guidelines per mile for business travel. Pastors reimbursed for auto expense on a per mile basis do not have to report this allowance as income if they submit written mileage reports to the calling institution.
- 3) **Continuing Education** provisions including a congregation/agency providing at least \$550 for tuition, books, etc., and two weeks of time (not vacation), and the pastor providing at least \$250. It is recommended that this money be deposited in the synod's PLACE program. (Programs that include Sundays must be negotiated with the congregation council.) It is encouraged that congregations/agencies and pastors work towards a partnership goal of \$1,000.
- 4) Four full weeks of vacation time annually.
- 5) One to two days off per week, and, at least once a month, two consecutive days off.
- 6) For the purposes of **Worker's Compensation**, pastors are considered to be employees of the congregation and therefore should be included in Worker's Compensation insurance.
- 7) Health and pension benefits according to the guidelines of the ELCA, including a 12% pension provision shall be provided for by the congregation or calling agency. In 2013, the ELCA Church Council recommended that in order to maintain the current level of health benefits for our rostered leaders and lay church workers, congregations offer to provide the Gold+ ELCA health plan option in 2017 for their rostered leaders and lay church workers. The Gold+ option most closely resembles the 2013 ELCA Primary health coverage. The Leadership Development Team of the NEPA Synod supports this recommendation of ELCA Church Council, and urges all synod congregations to offer the Gold+ option (or its equivalent) for rostered leaders and lay church workers each year.
- 8) Congregations may also reimburse the pastor(s) for **professional expenses** such as dues, entertainment, supplies, and malpractice insurance.

PASTORS WITH PART TIME CALLS

Pastors with part time calls should be compensated on a prorated basis in line with the above guidelines, in consultation with the Office of the Bishop. Vacation and continuing education provisions should be prorated, as well. Pension and health benefits are according to the guidelines of the ELCA, including a 12% pension provision.

- 3) Four full weeks of vacation time annually.
- 4) One to two days off per week, and, at least once a month, two consecutive days off.
- 5) For the purposes of **Worker's Compensation**, rostered lay leaders are considered to be employees of the congregation and therefore should be included in Worker's Compensation insurance.
- 6) **Health and pension benefits** according to the guidelines of the ELCA, including a 12% pension provision *shall be provided for by the congregation or calling agency.* In 2013, the ELCA Church Council recommended that in order to maintain the current level of health benefits for our rostered leaders and lay church workers, congregations offer to provide the Gold+ ELCA health plan option in 2017 for their rostered leaders and lay church workers. The Gold+ option most closely resembles the 2013 ELCA Primary health coverage. The Leadership Development Team of the NEPA Synod supports this recommendation of ELCA Church Council, and urges all synod congregations to offer the Gold+ option (or its equivalent) for rostered leaders and lay church workers each year.

MISSION INTERPRETERS

GLOBAL MISSION

Global Mission in the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod plays out mostly through the Companion Synod program. The Companion Synod program was started by the ELCA in 1990 when they matched Lutheran World Federation member Churches with each synod of the ELCA. Each synod received at least one companion to accompany and with whom to develop a special relationship. NEPS received two—the United Evangelical Lutheran Church in Argentina and Uruguay and the Löbau Zittau District of the Lutheran Church in Saxony, Germany. A few years later we added two more companions, doubling our ministry opportunities. These are the Lutheran Church in Slovenia and the South Central Diocese of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Tanzania. Each of the 4 relationships has its own sub-committee which is tasked with maintaining

and furthering the relationship. Two of the sub-committees are presently rebuilding and reorganizing themselves. These are the churches in Argentina/Uruguay and Slovenia. Below is a short summary of the other 2 Companion Synods.

The Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod is blessed by each of our companions/partners. We look forward to enhancing these special relationships in the years to come.

SAXONY

The committee spent most of our time in 2018 preparing for the Lobau/Zittau District of our Partner Synod to visit us in October. Part of the planning was for the actual day to day activities, but the other part was preparing for our Seminary Day discussing a partnership agreement.

Our companion synod arrived in Newark Airport Thursday, October 4. They rented three vans then drove to St. Paul's, Mountain Top where they had a light dinner and met their host families. Friday was planned as a light day visiting Jim Thorpe and taking a train ride in the Lehigh Gorge. Most of the group attended a high school football game in Hazleton.

Saturday was Seminary Day at the Lutheran Center where we discussed ideas for a Partnership Agreement. We then visited the Moravian Center in Bethlehem. Our companion district includes Herrhut, the International Moravian Center, and the city of origin of the Moravians. Sunday they visited local congregations and spent the evening at a barn party complete with hay rides. Monday was Host Family Day and they spent the day with their respective host families.

Tuesday and Wednesday were spent in New York City visiting the U.N., Statue of Liberty and Ellis Island along with some free time. Thursday they were in the Reading Area and visited the Ephrata Cloister, the Amish Village, and closed the day with a Thanksgiving Feast at St Marks. Birdsboro. Friday the group spent visiting historical sites in Philadelphia.

Saturday was host family day followed by a Pig Roast in Birdsboro. Sunday was worship with host families and participating in the Birdsboro CROP Walk at the Daniel Boone Homestead. Monday was lunch at the Lutheran Center on their way back to Newark Airport.

SOUTH CENTRAL DIOCESE OF TANZANIA

Getting the synods and dioceses together gave us an opportunity to share what has worked best in our various relationships. It also gave us time for worship and fellowship. Following the summit, Pastor Garbe and I traveled with Bishop Wilson Sanga and General Secretary Ezekiel Sanga to the South Central Diocese. While there we worshipped with the Makete Congregation on Sunday morning, visited parishes in Utengule and Madihani, the Women's Center, and met with the District Pastors to begin the process for better communication and building up our relationships.

THE LESBIAN, GAY, BI-SEXUAL, TRANSGENDER, QUEER + TASK FORCE (LGBTQ + TASK FORCE)

The LGBTQ+ Task Force endeavors to aid congregations to becoming truly welcoming to LGBTQ+ individuals and couples.

The Task Force makes education information available through an interactive display at synod assemblies. In addition, speakers and educational information materials are provided to congregations upon request. Task Force members, both clergy and lay, are eager to meet with congregational staff and/or groups, also upon request.

The Task Force recommends that congregations attain recognition as Reconciling in Christ (RIC) Congregation from the national Lutheran organization – Reconciling Works. Each RIC congregation is required to welcome all people regardless of their ability, age, ethnicity, financial situation, gender identity, life circumstances, race, or sexual orientation.

The Task Force participates in three regional LGBTQ+ events each summer (Allentown, Reading, Wilkes-Barre), providing information regarding local Lutheran congregations that welcome LGBTQ+ persons and couples.

Our society today recognizes a need to aid youth who are discerning their sexual identity and orientation. Therefore, the Task Force is planning a one day seminar entitled "We LOVE" which will explore ways that congregations can help youth understand their own and other's sexual identities. This event should help adult leaders working with youth, as well as the youth themselves.

CARE OF CREATION TASK FORCE

As a part of the Witness and Service Ministry Team, the synod's Creation Care Task Force, or CCTF, works to make stewardship of God's creation an integral part of faith. We do this through a combination of education, advocacy, conservation, energy efficiency, and enjoyment of the natural beauty of Northeastern Pennsylvania.

In past years we have hosted outdoor events (such as kayaking and hiking), participated in interfaith and ecumenical programs, and worked on the synod's fossil fuel divestment resolution.

CAMPUS MINISTRY

Lutheran ministries are present on several college and university campuses in our synod, sharing the Gospel through a variety of outreach ministries. The primary outreach is through Partner Congregations located near institutions of higher education. Partner Congregations on the Northeastern PA Synod during 2018 include Trinity and St. John's, Kutztown relating to Kutztown University; and St. Paul's and St. Peter's, Bethlehem relating to Lehigh University. Muhlenberg College, an ELCA-related college also provides campus ministry to students and staff on its campus. There has been a decrease in outreach to students on college and university campuses during recent years within the Synod territory. The Campus Ministry Affinity Group encourages congregations that neighbor higher education institutions to consider beginning an outreach ministry to the young adult population in their midst.

The Campus Ministry Affinity Group meets three to four times a year for mutual support and conversation about the synod vision for campus ministries. The Affinity Group seeks to support existing partner congregations and encourage new campus ministry opportunities on our Synod territory.

Synod funding for Campus Ministry comes from congregational mission support to the synod and ELCA, and is distributed by the Witness and Service team to the Campus Ministry Affinity Group. During 2018, \$20,000.00 was distributed to support Campus Ministry efforts on our Synod territory.

Block grants are available to congregations and synod campus ministry groups for special program incentives for students in higher education or Lutheran students of synod congregations that seek to enhance their growth in faith, through specific activities, during their college experience.

CONGREGATION LEGACY PLANNING

The September 7, 2018, meeting of the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod's witness and service team identified those who had indicated interest in joining to do the work authorized by the resolution at the 2018 Synod assembly, received from the Schuylkill mission district. The resolution was entitled: *Encouraging Congregational Statements Concerning The Closing Of Congregations And The Disposition Of Assets*. Response of the reference and counsel committee expressed appreciation to the voting members of the Schuylkill Mission District Spring Assembly for bringing this timely and important matter to the attention of the Synod Assembly. It recommended that this resolution be referred to the Witness and Service Ministry Team for the purpose of creating a process and planning manual to guide congregations in advance preparations for the time when closing might be their most faithful ministry option, and that the ministry team give a report of its progress to the 2019Synod Assembly.

To that end, our September 2018 communications to these folks subsequently identified the date of our first meeting as October 18, 2018 and to date our subsequent meetings were held on November 16 rescheduled to 12/18 due to weather; January 11, 2019; March 26, 2019; May 7, 2019. Contributors and participants in these meetings to date have been Marlane Drunkenmiller, Scott Paradise, Steve Schussett, Carl Shankweiler, Travis Woodfield, Linda Zawaski and most recently joining is Brian Reidy.

Our meetings have accomplished:

- Addressing the basics how the name of the document reflects its inner meaning, some specifics about the document's chapters or sections, and the desire to care for congregations at various cycles of their life together in Christ. The group intentionally desires the contents of this work to address the faith filled, missional and emotional pre-work related to a variety of life cycles of a congregation and provide information on assessment tools for the same.
- A meeting with Richard J. Wiest, Esq. at the law firm Williamson, Friedberg, and Jones to review the various legal aspects or ways used to close a congregation.
- In February we reviewed the information gleaned from our last meeting with Attorney Wiest, as well as
 input from members of the Witness and Service Team at their last meeting as it related to this body of
 work. We reviewed the outcome of earlier discussions with the table of contents for our edition of this
 document and assigned writers to each section.
- We continue working on the actual written contents as we construct and write some of the newer pieces
 and merge alternate external resources already in existence and still relevant to our work, provided by
 members of our team or from other synods as available.

CANDIDACY COMMITTEE

"The best time to plant a tree was twenty years ago. The second-best time is now."

The idea behind that saying applies to the realm of candidacy – raising up leaders for the church – as well as it applies to planting trees. Since the candidacy process takes several years, just as trees take time to grow and mature, there is a lot of lead time needed to form new deacons and pastors. This is especially

relevant now, as this year we had no new candidates finish the process within our synod, even as we (and the church as a whole) cannot fill all of the vacancies in our congregations.

The picture, however, is not completely bleak. NEPA has nine candidates in various stages of the candidacy process, as well as five people who have expressed interest in entering. We also have a group of leaders, the candidacy committee, committed to supporting these individuals as they meet the various milestones (entrance, endorsement, and approval) of the process.

We do ask that you, in your congregations, share in this task. As Paul put it in his first letter to the Corinthians, "I planted, Apollos watered, but God gave the growth." The job of raising up leaders is one that involves the whole community of faith as well as the Spirit. So we ask that you do some work by:

- Planting identifying and encouraging those who have gifts for public ministry . . . and then actively doing something about it. Get them in contact with the committee, encourage them to speak with your pastor, help them along the way! Planting a seed takes some effort.
- Watering tangibly supporting seminary students, either from your congregation or in general. There
 are several ways to do this: the synod's student fund, the ELCA Fund for Leaders, or a student fund in
 your congregation. Support beyond financial assistance is also of great value; watering can take
 many forms.

In short, we ask you to be involved.

Finally, in terms of the committee itself, we would like to thank the current members for their hard work and devotion over the last year. In particular we would like to thank Pastor Mary Gade, who (as the synod staff representative on the committee) has done so much to serve both the committee and the candidates over the years. Mary's contributions can hardly be given full justice here, but we can at least express our deep gratitude for them. Since her retirement in April, the committee's new staff representative is Pastor Peggy Wuertele. Given Peggy's vast experience with candidacy, we are confident that this transition will be a smooth one.

In closing, please feel free to contact either Pastor Metzloff or Pastor Wuertele if you have any questions or concerns with regard to candidacy; we would also be delighted to speak with any prospective candidates. And, finally, please keep the entire candidacy committee in your prayers as we seek to carry out this calling on behalf of the church. Thank you!

LUTHERAN ARCHIVES CENTER AT PHILADELPHIA

In 2019, we celebrate the 400th anniversary of Lutherans in North America. As two ships sailed from the Dano-Norwegian Realm 400 years ago on what became an ill-fated voyage of discovery, the chaplain (Rasmus Jensen), officers, and crew became the first Lutherans to reach North America. While we mark this anniversary we also know that it was left to subsequent generations of Lutherans to establish Lutheran communities and congregations, first in the northeastern portion of what would become the United States of America, and then across the whole of the North American continent.

At the Lutheran Archives Center at Philadelphia we cherish this rich history, as we assist researchers and scholars from across the region, and from around the world, to discover the treasures entrusted to the north-eastern regional archives of the ELCA. While 2019 is a significant anniversary year for Lutherans on this continent, this year brings some significant transitions for us at the Archives. First of all we say farewell to our Curator of more than forty years, John Peterson, as he enters upon his well-deserved retirement. John has been with the archives from the beginning and he has seen the archives through the move from the lower level of the Krauth Memorial Library on the Philadelphia campus of ULS to our state-of-the-art facility in the basement of the Brossman Center. We will mark John's retirement with a dinner at the William Penn Inn in Gwynedd, PA, on June 9.

On May 8 we are also hosting a welcome event at the Archives for our new Executive Director, Lisa Minardi, who started working for us late last summer. Lisa has helped us tremendously as we carry the work of the archives into the future, and we are very grateful for her leadership.

Finally, for the past twenty years our quarterly publication, the *Archives Advocate*, has set the standard for such publications throughout the Lutheran church in the United States. The stories contained in the *Advocate* have represented the breadth of Lutheranism throughout the northeast, and the sharp design of the newsletter has inspired those who have read it to delve deeper into our common history. For twenty years Kim-Eric Williams (Curator of the Augustana Institute and staff archivist at LACAP) has ensured that the *Advocate* has met a high editorial and artistic standard. Kim-Eric will be retiring from his role as editor this year, and our Executive Director will be assuming the role of editor. Through these changes and transitions, the Archives will continue to be in good hands, and we will continue to serve the congregations, Synods, and institutions of region seven of the ELCA.

As we have done throughout our history, we continue to rely on Synodical support and funding from closed congregations (\$5000 from each closed parish whose records we receive), as well as from the other agencies and organizations whose archives we hold. We are furthermore very grateful for contributions from a variety of supporters. Please continue to support the work of your regional Archives Center with your prayers and contributions! Please pick up copies of the *Archives Advocate* at your Assembly for yourself and for your congregation, and make sure to greet your Synod Archivist! And remember -- visitors are always welcome at the Archives Center!

MUHLENBERG COLLEGE

Muhlenberg College develops students' full intellectual and personal potential, positioning them well for lifelong fulfillment and success. Firmly grounded in the liberal arts and featuring several strong pre-professional programs, a Muhlenberg education inspires our students to think critically about problems from a diversity of perspectives. As a College of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, Muhlenberg helps students examine their context and their missions to be public witnesses and leaders in a pluralistic world.

Over the last year, several exciting developments have happened in the life of the college. Selected high-lights are below:

• In 2018, Muhlenberg College joined the American Talent Initiative (ATI), partnering with 100 top-performing institutions to commit to the collective goal of enrolling 50,000 additional talented, low- and moderate-income students at colleges and universities with strong graduation rates by 2025. As part of ATI, Muhlenberg will develop strategies to attract, enroll and support more high-achieving, lower-and moderate-income students from before they arrive on campus to graduation and beyond.

- The Princeton Review featured Muhlenberg College in the new 2019 edition of its flagship college guide, "The Best 384 Colleges." The College garnered a #9 ranking for "Best College Theater," placing the program among the top 12 in the nation 10 of the last 11 years. In addition, Muhlenberg was included in the following lists: Best Northeastern Colleges, Green Colleges and the Colleges that Pay You Back, which was "based on a combination of institutional and student survey data, including academic rigor, affordability and career outcomes for graduates."
- The Muhlenberg College <u>English department</u> hosted the annual Living Writers course, which brings both up-and-coming and renowned authors to campus. Students read their recent works and then interact with the authors directly as they visit campus for a day. This year's authors included novelist Zadie Smith.
- Several Athletic teams and individual athletes had tremendous seasons. The Muhlenberg football team achieved a school record with an 11-2 season. The team clinched a share of the Centennial Conference championship and played, for the first time, in the NCAA Division III quarterfinals.
- The Stabler Foundation granted the College \$720,000 toward the Donald B. and Dorothy L. Stabler Endowed Scholarship Fund. The Fund assists students who might otherwise be unable to attend Muhlenberg due to financial constraints as well as students whose families experience an unforeseen financial crisis partway through their time at Muhlenberg.
- Beginning in fall 2019, Muhlenberg College will offer a new <u>sustainability studies</u> major, an interdisciplinary program with the goal of instilling understanding, appreciation and thoughtful problem-solving skills with regard to the relationships and interactions of humans and the environment.
- Muhlenberg announced a new 3+3 partnership with the Villanova University Charles Widger School of Law that will provide qualified students with early access to one of the nation's top law schools. They will spend the first three years at Muhlenberg earning a Bachelor of Arts or Bachelor of Science degree and then enroll at Villanova Law to earn a Juris Doctor (JD) for the final three years, saving a year's worth of time and tuition.
- The Institute for Jewish-Christian Understanding (IJCU) offered many opportunities for community dialogue and conversation including the First Friday program where the theme for this year was Seeking Truth, Building Trust Making the World Make Sense.
- The college welcomed several new staff members including College Chaplain, the Rev. Kristen Glass
 Perez, Vice President of Communications Brian Speer, Athletic Director Lynn Tubman and Associate Provost for Faculty and Diversity initiatives, Dr. Brooke Vick.

Since its founding, Muhlenberg College has encouraged discovery and exploration of a set of roles to be honored and lived out in one's daily life. We are proud of all of the opportunities we have for living and learning together in and outside of the classroom. We are also delighted that Bishop Samuel Zeiser serves on our Board of Trustees and grateful to be a partner with the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod.

In our second year as United, we lay claim to the lyrics of Marty Haugen—building a house (on two campuses!) where all are named, their songs and visions heard. PENNSYLVANIA COUNCIL OF CHURCHES

The Pennsylvania Council of Churches is church bodies and agencies representing Anabaptist, Episcopal, Orthodox, Pentecostal, and Protestant communions in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania working together for Christian unity for the sake of the world. [John 17:23]

IMPORTANT ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Future Planning Work. The Future Task Group completed its work in 2018. The group recommended changes in the composition of the Council's Board of Directors to reduce the size of the Board by having a single member representing each member denomination in order to improve efficiency—a model much like the National Council of Churches. The Board voted to make this change in October 2018, effective for meetings beginning in 2019. The group also recommended the formation of a Strategic Planning Committee to lay the foundation for the Council's future, with consideration to be given to members with the skills needed to address many of the Council's perceived needs, which might include persons with gifts and experience, such as: similar work working with and coaching other religious organizations; fundraising/development; communications; and legal, among others. The Board will name this group at its first 2019 meeting, with work to be completed by the end of 2020.

Conferences and Meetings. The Council did not hold a single statewide conference in 2018, but conducted workshops around the issues of criminal justice reform and gun violence.

Continuing from 2017, the Council held an event in Lancaster in April 2018 called "Faithful Advocacy for Criminal Justice Reform: Principles and Practice." This session was designed to educate participants about the criminal justice system/mass incarceration at the federal and state levels, "Clean Slate" legislation (designed to remove a barrier for formerly incarcerated persons for qualified offenses at the state level), and how to advocate effectively for this legislation. Participants were asked/encouraged to participate in advocacy visits with their Pennsylvania representatives with support from the Council's Public Witness program. This effort was supported in part by funds from the Mennonite Central Committee. The Clean Slate legislation passed in May 2018, supported by these significant efforts by the faith community.

The Council held another session in Pittsburgh in August 2018 called "Faithful Advocacy for Gun Violence Prevention: Principles and Practice." This session followed the same format of the Clean Slate sessions, but focused on gun violence prevention legislation designed to remove guns from domestic abusers and others who could be a danger to themselves or others. Legislation aimed at domestic abusers passed in October 2018, and like Clean Slate, was supported by significant efforts by the faith community. More workshops are planned for 2019.

The Council also presented to various congregations seeking to learn more about the Berks County Residential

Center, used to detain immigrant families, often for long periods of time. It also presented two sessions on climate change using slides and information provided by the Climate Leadership Program attended by the Director of Advocacy and Ecumenical Outreach in 2017.

Finally, the Council conducted a Healing Communities training in Bethlehem in June for over 20 participants from the Lehigh Valley. Healing Communities aims to train congregations to be welcoming and supportive of formerly incarcerated persons.

2018 was a year of gearing up for additional "School-to-Prison Pipeline" sessions around the state, using a trauma-informed lens to help participants understand the role of funding to ensure that all students have the resources they need to overcome barriers to learning, including poverty, race, disabilities, and language, among other things. The newer sessions will focus more on how racism plays a role in the distribution of school funding by the state in Pennsylvania. Given the high correlation between students facing traumatic conditions without sufficient support and those who end up in prison, these sessions will continue to make the case for a fair school funding formula and adequate funding in order to bridge the gap. These sessions are being supported by funds from the William Penn Foundation through a collaborative grant from POWER in Philadelphia (a PICO organizing group).

Support for Collaborative Efforts. The Council has received support from several different sources aimed at supporting collaborative efforts involving the Council and other denominations and coalitions.

- The Mennonite Central Committee's (MCC) East Coast Office has again reauthorized a \$10,000 grant to support advocacy in areas that are particularly important to Anabaptist traditions: criminal justice reform, immigration, gun violence, and education. The grant runs through March 2020. It is the Council's hope that this funding will continue to be renewed. There has been a continuing focus on building a Healing Communities network in PA, and on calling for closure of the Berks County Family Detention Center that is holding refugee families far in excess of the time they should be held. Additional efforts in 2018 included the "Faithful Advocacy" events described above, continuing to build networks among stakeholders active in work around immigration/immigration reform, conversations with groups involved with reducing gun violence, including Heeding God's Call and CeaseFirePA.
- A grant of \$16,000 from the William Penn Foundation (through POWER; \$8,000/year for 2 years—an
 increase from the previous grant amount) continues to support the Council's efforts to reform school
 funding in PA. The funds have been used to do basic education on equity and adequacy of public school
 funding in PA, and to support the "school to prison pipeline" sessions described above.

These grants have continued to support part-time efforts by an Advocacy Programs Coordinator, John-Michael Cotignola-Pickens.

During the summer of 2018, the Council was invited to apply for a substantial grant from the Van Ameringen Foundation, in conjunction with the Abolitionist Law Center, to do work in the area of criminal justice reform, particularly with regard to the use of solitary confinement and treatment of incarcerated persons with mental health conditions. While not as much as was hoped, the Foundation awarded a three-year grant to be divided between the two organizations: \$75,000 in Year 1, \$100,000 in Year 2, and \$125,000 in Year 3. Work will begin in 2019.

Other Activities

- The Board of Directors adopted one resolution on gun violence reduction in October 2018.
- The Council:
 - Issued a public statement: A Statement on Separation of Families at the Border (June 19, 2018); and
 - Offered official greetings to: (1) the Western PA Conference of the United Methodist Church; and (2) Church Women United.
- Both of the Council's websites, www.pachurches.org and www.pachurchesadvocacy.org, have continued to evolve.
- The Director of Advocacy and Ecumenical Outreach participated in an editorial board meeting with the Harrisburg Patriot News with Bishop Audrey Scanlan of the Episcopal Diocese of Central Pennsylvania to discuss media coverage of the faith community and interfaith relations.

COUNCIL MINISTRIES

Commission on Public Witness & Public Witness Ministry. The Council's advocacy efforts in 2018 focused on the following areas:

Advocacy for a Pennsylvania budget with sufficient revenues that addresses the concerns of people of faith

- Human needs/poverty-related work.
- Efforts to raise the minimum wage, primarily in coordination with the Raise the Wage PA Coalition.
- Public education funding, primarily in coordination with POWER.
- Criminal justice reform.
- Immigration, particularly around calling for the closure of the Berks County Family Detention Center that
 is holding refugee women and children for long periods of time, and for ending the separation of families
 at the border.
- Environment, primarily climate change and protecting water resources, in coordination with several organizations.

The Commission continues to work on efforts aimed at improving the lives of people on the margins, and addressing problems with our political system.

Commission on Unity & Relationships. The Council, working with Lancaster Theological Seminary intern Teman Cooke, worked on refining an approach for conducting "difficult" conversations within and between congregations. These are conversations designed to bring people with widely disparate beliefs/opinions together to hear each other's stories and discuss their differences in a safe environment. One session was held in December 2018 at Community Mennonite Church in Lancaster, and others are being planned for 2019.

Commission on Common Ministries. The Council has continued to provide support to its Trucker/Traveler Ministry, Campground Ministries, and Farmworker Ministries. Work continues on building a Healing Communities network in Pennsylvania.

LOOKING TO THE FUTURE

Council staff continues to discuss activities and areas where the Council might engage to be of service to our members, the wider faith community.

LUTHERAN ADVOCACY MINISTRY IN PENNSYLVANIA (LAMPa)

In response to God's love in Jesus Christ, we advocate for wise and just public policies in Pennsylvania that promote the common good. Lutheran Advocacy Ministry in Pennsylvania is a shared ministry of seven Pennsylvania synods, the ELCA Domestic Mission unit, and Pennsylvania ELCA agencies and institutions. Through LAMPa, Lutherans who are working to eradicate hunger are supported to voice their faith convictions in the public square with and on behalf of our most vulnerable neighbors and the world we share, while seeking to create a more just Commonwealth.

In 2018, LAMPa celebrated 39 years of advocacy ministry that supported and deepened your congregational efforts to address hunger, poverty, human trafficking, immigration, school funding inequity, racism and environmental threats to health and safety. Thanks be to God for the support of our Northeasetern Pennsylvania Synod Policy Council representatives, the Rev. Dennis Ritter and the Rev. Inge Williams.

Our work in 2018 was guided by both the LAMPa issue agenda adopted by our policy council in December 2017 as well as the principles of ELCA World Hunger to be transformative, holistic and integrated with attention to fostering vital congregations and equipping leaders.

Equipping disciples, growing leaders, supporting vital congregations

We began 2018 by accompanying and supporting Pennsylvania hunger leaders in learning and legislative visits during the ELCA World Hunger Gathering in Washington, D.C. In May, Lutheran Day in the Capitol saw us celebrate what God is doing through advocates in each synod as well as to equip advocates for justice-seeking on issues from hunger to clean water and to put that into practice in legislative visits in the state Capitol. As keynote, Nobel-Prize-winning geophysicist Dr. Richard Alley inspired, informed and encouraged advocates to address climate change. LAMPa staff took that message to the National Youth Gathering, connecting with youth to share ways they could care for our common home when they returned to Pennsylvania.

LAMPa staff helped organize and engage Lutherans in a statewide EnergyStar tour to help congregations understand government resources and research available to reduce their contributions to climate change as well as save money. We also joined other faith-based organizations to host a webinar on community solar programs, laying the groundwork for related legislation introduced in early 2019. LAMPa staff worked with individuals and congregations who were led by their ministry of service into advocacy and by sharing grant opportunities with those engaged in related ministry. LAMPa also invited and supported advocates and those

with lived experiences of hunger, poverty, and violence in testifying, making legislative visits, speaking at press conferences, or leading letter-writing campaigns

Progress on LAMPa's Issue Agenda

The 2018 session saw success on several items on LAMPa's issue agenda.

Hunger – Maintained funding for the State Food Purchase Program and the Pennsylvania Agriculture Surplus System, the state's major anti-hunger programs.

Clean Slate – The legislature passed and the governor signed clean slate legislation that seals the records of those with nonviolent misdemeanor convictions after an individual has remained crime-free for 10 years and would also seal non-conviction records as a matter of course. This is now being held up as a model for criminal justice reform in other states.

Firearms and Domestic Violence – The legislature passed and the governor signed legislation that would require those involved in domestic violence to turn over firearms to police within 24 hours. The previous legislation allowed firearms to be turned over to friends and family members within 60 days.

Safe Harbor – The legislature passed and the governor signed legislation that would divert child sextrafficking victims away from the criminal justice system and into appropriate services.

Protecting the Social Safety Net – LAMPa advocates helped defeat legislation that would have created barriers to food aid by mandating burdensome work requirements, even in areas with high unemployment.

Payday lending – Payday lending legislation was introduced, but quick and firm response by advocates kept it from getting anywhere.

Creation Care – An outpouring from advocates helped defeat a last-minute attempt to pass legislation shared at Lutheran Day that would have rolled back environmental regulation of the oil and gas industry to standards of 30 years ago.

The passion of our advocates is recognized. We are the only organization in Pennsylvania that garners signatures for hunger funding and policy in every legislative district in the state. We have been invited to participate in the Governor's Food Policy Council. Our work on Safe Harbor has led to an invitation to work on further legislation to end human trafficking.

We look forward to strengthening ecumenical and interfaith work in 2019, building on the foundation that has been laid in recent years and in response to the glaring need to heal division and promote unity in such a time as this when our differences have been fed by fear and turned into paralysis at one extreme and violence at the other. We lean into that work with the theme of "Set a Welcome Table," and a day of ecumenical and interfaith fellowship, service, learning and preparation for advocacy in May.

Connecting Service to Advocacy: In 2018, LAMPa resourced congregations participating in the Churchwide Day of Service, garnering more than 1,000 letters to lawmakers on a variety of topics. LAMPa will again share service-and-advocacy projects for Sept. 8. We would be glad to help your congregation plan to make that day one of "God's work. Our hands. Our voices."

LUTHERAN CONGREGATIONAL SERVICES (LCS)

Lutheran Congregational Services (LCS) continues, as it has for over 45 years, to **empower creative ministries**. As we partner with communities of many kinds throughout Eastern Pennsylvania, we continue to be encouraged by how God calls people together to support those who are hurting and are most vulnerable.

LCS is a ministry of the Liberty Lutheran family of services. Liberty faithfully accompanies and empowers individuals and families by honoring choices and promoting well-being. The entire family of Liberty communities—Artman, Paul's Run, The Hearth at Drexel, The Village at Penn State, and The Manor at York Town—continues to be devoted to an approach to care and service that focuses on each resident's uniqueness in preferences and activities, so that their lives are filled with meaning, connection and purpose. Liberty services, including Lutheran Congregational Services, The Becoming Center, LCFS-West Philadelphia Senior Community Center, Liberty Lutheran Foundation, and Liberty at Home, continue to foster relationships and collaboration with partners to enrich the lives of all we serve.

As part of the Liberty family of services, LCS's goal is to help congregations live out their missions of faith and service. Our programs include disaster response, Lay Eucharistic Visitor Training, bereavement support programs, and consulting.

- Lutheran Disaster Response Eastern Pennsylvania. LCS serves as the ELCA Lutheran Disaster Response affiliate in the 19 counties of Eastern PA.
 - ♦ In March 2018, LCS received a grant from ELCA LDR to support the recovery efforts of families who had evacuated from Puerto Rico to Pennsylvania. With our partners we were able to identify resources to provide housing stability resources including rental assistance, case management to empower approximately 250 families in finding housing stability. In addition, churches and individuals donated 200 Winter coats, 50 Kitchen Kits, 17 Gift cards, 20 school kits, 10 sets of gifts for families adopted at Christmas, and 40 hygiene kits.
 - LCS is currently supporting long term recovery efforts in Schuylkill and Susquehanna Counties in response to the devastating impact of heavy downpours in late summer 2018. In Schuylkill County, LCS is providing construction coordination leadership. We are grateful also for the efforts of St. John's Lutheran Church, Tremont, PA and other congregations who have sent work teams and funds to support that effort. In Susquehanna County, LCS is providing guidance to the long term recovery committee and assisting in document and file coordination.
 - Congregations interested in supporting the efforts in Schuylkill or Susquehanna County via work teams or donations can contact Julia Menzo.

• Lay Eucharistic Visitor Training

LCS offers four sessions per year throughout Northeast and Southeast Pennsylvania. We find this ministry is as valuable to those being trained as it is to those who receive the sacrament and as well as to their sending congregations. Over the past year, 32 new lay Eucharistic visitors were trained! Additional sessions are available to churches who specifically request them.

Bereavement Ministries

- Interest in "Journeys through Grief," our six week support program for those facing loss of any kind, continues to grow. In 2018, under the leadership of Sylvia Havlish, LCS held six, 6 week sessions, with 55 people benefitting. Three sessions are planned for this spring in Bally, Emmaus and Allentown.
- Also available to congregations is the single session, "Path of Grief." The Path of Grief program is a one-time program for the congregation to equip and strengthen leaders to support those in their community who experience many kinds of loss. If you have Thrivent Financial members in your community, "Action Team" dollars can cover the cost of grief programming as an educational service event.
- We also offer a closed Facebook group for those who want a more informal setting or who wish to stay connected to others after the traditional 6 week session concludes. Led by our Bereavement Ministries Coordinator Sylvia Havlish, the page currently has members. Find it on Facebook by searching for "Journeys through Grief."

• Church consultation

The LCS network of providers is available for Adult Forums, discussions with church groups, Temple Talks, workshops and more to inspire dialogue around topics related to church preparedness, personal and community resiliency, church security, disaster and climate change, and more.

LCS helps families grieve individual losses, while also exploring how we can support communities grieve congregational changes and losses from flooding and hurricanes, and imagine new possibilities for worship and ministry.

LCS is led by Director of Community Outreach, Julia Menzo. Programs are administered by a network of

contracted employees, part time staff, the LCS Advisory Committee, volunteers, the public relations and advancement departments at Liberty Lutheran, and through a vast network of congregational and community partners across eastern Pennsylvania.

Fiscal year 2018 marked Good Shepherd Rehabilitation Network's (GSRN) 110th year of service, one during which we continued to expand our physical footprint and explore new ways to provide our unique brand of compassionate care.

Based in Allentown, Pennsylvania, GSRN is a nationally recognized rehabilitation leader, offering an unmatched continuum of care for adults and children with physical and cognitive needs. Good Shepherd is known for its inpatient and outpatient care of patients with catastrophic injuries and conditions, such as spinal cord injury, brain injury, stroke, amputation and major multiple traumas. GSRN also excels at providing outpatient musculoskeletal and orthopedic rehabilitation services, long-term acute care and long-term care.

More than 2,100 compassionate Good Shepherd Associates treat patients at more than 70 locations in nine Pennsylvania counties and New Jersey. GSRN is the eighth largest rehabilitation provider in the country, according to *Modern Healthcare* magazine, and the world's leading clinical user of the Ekso Bionics exoskeleton to treat patients with strokes and other neurological conditions.

Good Shepherd has earned a reputation as an international destination for recovery, expanding the reach of our mission and core values to hundreds of patients from around the globe. In fact, approximately 33 percent of Good Shepherd's patients come from outside our immediate service area. Regardless of their location, patients and families choose Good Shepherd not only because the organization's outcomes are better than regional and national competitors; they come to experience firsthand the compassionate care and excellent service our skilled clinical team is known for.

Significant 2018 accomplishments included:

- Good Shepherd celebrated the tenth anniversary of our joint venture with Penn Medicine. Good Shepherd Penn Partners is the official therapy provider for Penn Medicine and has nearly tripled in size since its inception, having added two new outpatient therapy locations this year, including Kinetic Rehabilitation Services, P.C., and Penn Therapy and Fitness – South Philadelphia.
- Good Shepherd introduced an Integrative Wellness Program to help the body heal itself and reduce
 the need for other medical treatments. The program, led by a Good Shepherd physiatrist, uses traditional medicine, psychology and wellness coaching, nutrition and therapy and is very helpful for people with chronic health problems, including diabetes, obesity, pain, hypertension, general disability/
 deconditioning and headaches.
- Good Shepherd's two long-term care homes earned U.S. News and World Report's Best Nursing Homes highest rating, placing them in the top 15 percent of such facilities nationally.
- Good Shepherd's new electronic health records (EHR) system was implemented in both inpatient and
 outpatient areas. This was a tremendous undertaking, one that has helped streamline the entire patient experience and optimized our internal work flows. Eighty-plus Associates worked for more than a
 year to design and implement the new system.
- In March 2018, Good Shepherd announced a partnership with Penn State Health to open a 14-bed inpatient rehabilitation facility in Berks County at Penn State Health St. Joseph. With four existing successful Good Shepherd outpatient sites in the region and an outpatient physical medicine and rehabilitation physician practice opening soon, we look forward to delivering world-class inpatient rehab close to home for Berks County residents in the near future.
- The National Stroke Association (NSA) recognized Good Shepherd Rehabilitation Hospital's Stroke Team for excellence in stroke care with a RAISE Award to acknowledge its commitment to raising stroke awareness.

- Two Good Shepherd physicians received leadership awards from the Brain Injury Association of Pennsylvania (BIAPA) for improving the quality of life for people with brain injuries, their families and friends and advancing the field of brain injury rehabilitation.
- Good Shepherd's Vision Rehabilitation Team was named a Health-Care Hero by *Lehigh Valley Business* magazine for its contributions to improving the health of our community.
- For the fifth time, Good Shepherd collaborated with the Disability Friendly Community of the Lehigh Valley and Muhlenberg College's Institute of Public Opinion to conduct a Community Health Needs Assessment. The local knowledge gained through the assessment will be blended with state and national data so we better understand what we can and should do to effect change for a more inclusive and accessible community.

DIAKON LUTHERAN SOCIAL MINISTRIES AND DIAKON CHILD, FAMILY AND COMMUNITY MINISTRIES CELEBRATING 150 YEARS OF SERVICE

2018 was a special year for the Diakon family of organizations—it was our 150th anniversary! And we spent much of the year rededicating Diakon for another century-and-a-half of caring for our neighbors in need.

One of the ministries that began that history—The Lutheran Home at Topton—originated in the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod; the earlier home, the Tressler Lutheran Home for Children, arose in what is now the Lower Susquehanna Synod, in Loysville, Perry County, in 1868.

To celebrate this milestone of uninterrupted service, we created various materials including a history booklet and video and held numerous activities and programs including several within the synod:

- Staff-appreciation events at all locations in February.
- Rededication and celebratory events at all senior living communities, as well as key community-based program sites; these included Luther Crest in Allentown and a major event at The Lutheran Home at Topton, during which extensive renovations to Old Main, including the new Helen Palmer Center for Permanency, were dedicated.
- Recognition activities and items for residents, clients, supporters and partner congregations.
- A public event in October featuring nationally recognized humorist Jeanne Robertson; held at a theater in York, the event sold out.

We express deep appreciation for and celebrate our partnership with the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod and its congregations for their role in helping to make possible our 150-year-old mission. Through Many Hands, guided by One Heart, Diakon serves people in need of all ages, especially those with limited financial resources. In 2018, Diakon provided \$19.43 million in benevolent care, including more than \$5.8 million within the synod.

Luther Crest in Allentown, which holds a unique distinction among senior living communities as a nationally certified arboretum, continued to partner with its sister community, The Lutheran Home at Topton, in sharing amenities and activities. Luther Crest also maintained its emphasis on specialized programming in memory support, particularly for family members caring for a loved one with Alzheimer's disease or similar cognitive impairment, and opened a primary care center for independent-living and personal-care residents.

As noted, The Lutheran Home at Topton rededicated Old Main, the senior living campus' iconic building. In addition to restoring the second floor and creating the permanency center for Diakon Adoption & Foster Care, the project created space for Diakon Ministry Support offices that had been located in the Medical Arts Building in Allentown. The Lutheran Home continued to maintain its excellent national ratings.

Diakon-sponsored Girls on the Run – Lehigh Valley, a physical activity-based youth program that teaches life skills through interactive lessons and running games, continued to expand the number of girls it serves in Lehigh and Northampton counties. In 2018, the program involved 1,000 third- through eighth-grade students at numerous host sites. Some 250 volunteer coaches and 1,500 other volunteers contributed to the success of the program, which continued to secure local grants to provide scholarships for girls who might not other

wise be able to participate. In 2018, St. Luke's Health Network became the program's fall and spring 5k presenting sponsor.

Diakon Adoption & Foster Care served 3,020 children, youths and families within the synod, continuing to emphasize child-specific recruitment/family-finding programs and its newer foster care program for medically fragile children. Beyond opening the permanency center at Topton, the regional office of Diakon Adoption & Foster Care experienced extensive growth. For example, the program provided 56,897 days of foster care, compared with 39,024 in 2017.

Separately, Diakon manages Pennsylvania's Statewide Adoption & Permanency Network, or SWAN, meaning the Diakon organization plays a role in all public adoptions. In 2018, that work had an impact on the lives of 3,538 children and youths within the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod, as well as 821 family members in the region.

Diakon Community Services offered a range of services—health-related programs, health-insurance counseling, community-based senior centers, Diakon Living & Learning, volunteer programs and meals on wheels—to some 15,000 people in Schuylkill County and, through growth within the APPRISE contracts in 2018, in Pike, Columbia, Montour, Luzerne and Wyoming counties. In addition, Diakon Community Services in 2018 began to oversee RSVP programs in Berks, Pike and Wayne counties, inclusive of transportation services in Berks County, which provided 2,100 one-way transports for 107 older adults.

We thank God for the gifts of staff, volunteers, congregations, donors and board members who enabled us last year to touch the lives of thousands of people within the synod, all while upholding and celebrating 150 years of ministry!

2019 Synod Assembly Minutes

PLENARY SESSION ONE

Saturday, June 1, 2019, 9:00 a.m.

OPENING WORSHIP. The 2019 Assembly of the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod, Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA), meeting at the Genetti Ballrooms, Hazleton, Pennsylvania, began at 9:00 a.m. on June 1, 2019, with opening worship, which included the installation of the newly elected deans of the synod's mission districts, communion, and the order for the opening of an assembly.

ASSEMBLY OPENING. The Rev. Dr. Samuel R. Zeiser, Bishop, called the first plenary session of the assembly to order at 10:35 a.m. He introduced the Rev. Paul Braden, synod communicator, who explained ELCA Guidebook and how it would support the work of the assembly by making documents available electronically.

Bishop Zeiser then declared that a quorum was present. He expressed appreciation to all of the persons involved in making arrangements for the assembly: the deans of the Hazleton-Lehighton, Scranton-Wilkes-Barre, and Pocono Mission Districts and the volunteers from those districts; the Rev. Christopher deForest and all others on the Assembly Planning Team; the persons who provided technical support; the members of the synod's Worship Team including assembly musician Deacon Michael E. Krentz; the synod support staff for helping to prepare for the assembly and provide clerical support, and the Rev. Kurt E. Garbe. He explained that packets of handout information were not prepared but that assembly members should pick up any items of interest from the ministry resources table. He thanked Patrick Genetti for the helpful cooperation of his staff at the Genetti Ballrooms, and he pointed out that fourteen other synods were meeting at this same time.

ADOPTION OF THE AGENDA. Vice President Kristen Edelman-Weiner, who assisted Bishop Zeiser in chairing the assembly, called upon the Rev. Carl D. Shankweiler, Secretary, to present the following resolution on behalf of the Synod Council of the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod: *Resolved*, That the 2019 Synod Assembly Program as printed on pages 1 and 2 of the Bulletin of Reports be adopted. The motion was adopted.

Secretary Shankweiler reported that copies of the 2018 Assembly Minutes have been certified by the bishop and secretary and prepared for deposit in the archives, with the 2018 minutes included on pages 51 to 59 of the 2019 Bulletin of Reports.

NOMINATIONS AND ELECTIONS. Vice President Edelman-Weiner explained the process for nominating candidates for synodical elections. Edward C. Cool, chairperson of the elections committee, and the Rev. Kenneth Melber joined in giving these explanations, which included listing the positions for which nominees were still needed (Synod Council, youth male; Synod Council, female person of color or language other than English; Discipline Committee, three lay females).

Bishop Zeiser opened the floor to nominations, with the following persons being nominated: The Rev. Cheryl Meinschein, for Synod Council, clergy

Aaron Poper, for Synod Council, youth

With no additional nominations being made, Bishop Zeiser declared the nominating process closed.

Mr. Cool moved, and it was seconded, to elect those persons running unopposed. The motion carried, and Bishop Zeiser declared the following persons elected by acclamation:

For Vice President: Kristen Edelman-Weiner

For Synod Council: Ruth Major (four years), Thomas Engle (four years), Aaron Poper (two years)

Mr. Cool directed the assembly to use the ballots provided to vote for the nominees for synod secretary (the Revs. Michael Scholtes and Carl Shankweiler) and for Synod Council (the Revs. Rebecca Middeke-Conlin and Cheryl Meinschein).

Because Pastor Meinschein had been nominated from the floor, there was floor discussion as to how her biographical information could be made available before the voting concluded; and she was asked to make a brief biographical statement. The Rev. David Rowe moved, and it was seconded, that this first ballot for this position should be considered void; but the motion was defeated. The assembly concluded its voting for these two positions.

Bishop Zeiser announced that the offering for world hunger received during the opening worship service was \$3,595.53.

FIRST REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON REFERENCE AND COUNSEL. Bishop Zeiser called upon the Rev. Dody Siegfried, chairperson of the Committee on Reference and Counsel, who introduced the members of her committee and explained its work, including the procedure for the submission of resolutions. She then introduced the first resolution submitted to the committee and gave the committee's response as follows:

"The following resolution was received from the East Berks Mission District in Assembly.

"Whereas, youth ministry is an essential ministry to the life and vitality of congregations and of Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod; and

"Whereas, congregational leaders need synodical support such as a leader who provides direction to develop the leadership skills of youth and young adults and the skills of adults working with youth and young adults; and

"Whereas, congregations need a synodical leader that assists the Youth, Young Adult and Family Ministry and Faith Formation Resource Ministry teams that plan, organize, oversee, and implement youth, young adult, and faith formation gatherings and events; and

"Whereas, the following congregations and leaders have already committed to support a synod staff position; Deacon Kathleen Schaeffer; Deacon Deborah Graf; Deacon Joy Gerhart; Deacon Jackie Grauel; Deacon Marlane Druckenmiller; the Rev. Greg Frey; the Rev. Paul Spohn; the Rev. Donna House; the Rev. Lauren Applegate; St. Paul, Douglassville; New Jerusalem Lutheran Church ELC, Lower Saucon Township; the Youth, Young Adult, and Family Ministry Team of NEPS; and the East Berks Mission District; Therefore, be it

"Resolved, That a synodical staff person be called/hired to be an Associate of the Bishop for Youth, Young Adult Ministry and Faith Formation; and be it further

"Resolved, That congregations be contacted to ask for voluntary dedication of contributions to support the salary of an Associate of the Bishop for Youth, Young Adult Ministry and Faith Formation; be it further

"Resolved, That a task force be established to implement this resolution."

"Response of the Reference and Counsel Committee: Appreciating the intent of the resolution and with awareness of the upcoming leadership transitions within this synod, the committee recommends that this resolution be referred to the Transition Team that has been created to identify syn-

od priorities for the coming years and that it serve as information for those who will become nominees for Bishop of the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod."

Deacon Kathleen Schaeffer expressed her disappointment in the reply of the committee and explained that the last year was difficult because of the lack of a staff person for these ministries.

Pastor Gregory Frey spoke about the lacuna in the synod's youth program and noted that it could take two to three years for this to be resolved. He spoke about the work involved in taking youth to a national youth gathering and the importance of ministry related to youth. He asserted that this ministry needs to be a priority and that someone needs to take responsibility.

The Rev. Lauren Applegate said that the last year was difficult for youth ministry across the synod. A point person on the synod level is needed. She spoke in favor of the original resolution as a way to help the synod through the transition and bridge the gap.

The Rev. Larry Laine said that the synod is procrastinating and needs to appeal for funds; he added that he cannot imagine that an appeal would not succeed.

Bernice Henderschedt asked whether there was any possibility to set up a task force to deal with this matter? She was told that there was not.

Bishop Zeiser proposed that the resolution be read and that the assembly would then vote.

The Rev. Alan Wolkenhauer raised a point of order, asking that if the committee's proposal were to fail, would the assembly then vote on the original resolution. The Rev. Brandon Heavner raised a point of order, asking Pastor Siegfried to explain the committee's rationale on the matter before the assembly.

Pastor Siegfried said that there is a great need for youth. However, there are ambiguities related to the possible job description for the position and the funding of this proposed position. What will the impact be in the transition to a new bishop? How could the synod hire someone and say that the position might last for only a few months until there is a new staff person?

A vote was then taken. Bishop Zeiser declared that the recommendation from the Reference and Counsel committee was defeated, which took the assembly back to the original resolution from East Berks for discussion. The bishop also declared that the time available to consider this issue had expired and that the matter would be brought up again in the next session.

REPORT OF THE REPRESENTATIVE OF THE ELCA. Mr. James Jennings, a congregational member from the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod who is serving on the Church Council of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, was invited to address the assembly. He spoke about the April 2019 meeting of the council and the statements being worked on to provide vision for the future of the ELCA. He spoke about the committees on which he has served and the new roles he will play after the 2019 ELCA assembly. He explained that the terms of many persons serving on the council will end with the 2019 assembly; only eight members will be returning.

The Rev. Ronald T. Glusenkamp, Director for Always Being Made New: The Campaign for the ELCA, then addressed the synod assembly as the 2019 churchwide representative. He thanked the synod for its Mission Support, forty-seven percent of which is passed on to the ELCA and which he compared to duct tape in that it binds us together. He showed a video, "We are Church; We are Lutherans," which explained the work of the ELCA. He spoke about the breadth and effectiveness of hunger ministries in the church as well as disaster relief. He explained that the Fund for Leaders has provided over \$2.6 million dollars in scholarship assistance and gave examples of ELCA-supported leadership efforts in other countries. He highlighted ELCA support for Common Ground, Reading; Andrew Berdahl as a recipient of support from the Fund for Leaders; and nineteen missionaries including eight Young Adults in Global Mission volunteers. He spoke about the proposed statement "Faith, Sexism, and Justice: Lutheran Call to Action," which will be voted upon at the

2019 churchwide assembly, and about other churchwide assembly business.

He announced that God's Work, Our Hands Sunday will be September 8, 2019; that the Women of the ELCA will meet in Phoenix from July 16-19, 2020; and that a rostered ministers' gathering will take place in Phoenix from July 20-23, 2020. He spoke about *Living Lutheran* and showed a video from Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton, which spoke of congregations as peacemakers in a divided world, giving several examples which concluded with Common Ground, Reading. He also thanked the assembly for the offering on behalf of the World Hunger Appeal of the ELCA.

At the conclusion of Pastor Glusenkamp's remarks Bishop Zeiser thanked him and called for a special offering on behalf of the Campaign for the ELCA.

REPORT OF THE BISHOP. Bishop Zeiser drew attention to his printed report as found in the Bulletin of Reports. He spoke about the need for conversation and discernment concerning the 2020 election of a new bishop. He suggested that the synod's members and congregations need to build collegiality with the new bishop, adding that the synod needs to go beyond nostalgia. The new bishop will need to move in new ways and will need to be surrounded by support. He asserted that he himself has received love and support, and yet there remains friction towards "the synod" and the office of the bishop. Mission will suffer if this needed support is not given, and progress is possible against destructive sentiments. The next bishop, if he or she also remains in office for two terms, will serve until 2032. There will be many changes in those years.

REPORT OF THE VICE PRESIDENT. Ms. Edelman-Weiner sang "I am the church," doing as a layperson. We are a church in three expressions: congregations, synod, and churchwide. She asserted that today we are together. "Now is when we need God working through you—God's energy." She suggested that maybe now is the time to work outside the brick-and-mortar church. She welcomed the expertise of all present and said that it is "great to be working with you today."

After Secretary Shankweiler made the necessary announcements, at 12:39 p.m. Vice President Edelman-Weiner declared the session to be in recess until 2:00 p.m. During the intervening time the assembly enjoyed a luncheon in recognition of the fiftieth anniversary of the synod's receiving its charter.

PLENARY SESSION TWO

Saturday, June 1, 2:00 p.m.

REPORT OF THE FIRST BALLOT. After the assembly sang a hymn, Elizabeth Leibenguth offered an opening prayer; and the Rev. Paul Braden reported that the offering received for the ELCA's Always Being Made New initiative was \$3,325.94. Bishop Zeiser then called upon Pastor Melber to report the results of the first ballot.

Bishop Zeiser declared that Pastors Shankweiler and Meinschein were elected to their respective offices.

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY. Pastor Shankweiler presented the Report of the Secretary as found in the Bulletin of Reports, pages 5 to 9, asking that any errors or omissions be brought to his attention. (The Rev. Laura Csellak noted that her starting date at Christ's United Lutheran Church was August 1, not July 1, 2018, as printed.)

Pastor Shankweiler then drew the assembly's attention to pages 14 to 23 of the Bulletin of Reports, which contained a document coming to the assembly from the Synod Council titled <u>"Continuing Resolutions and Other Resolutions of Ongoing Impact."</u> He explained the reasons for, and background of, this document.

He then moved the following resolution, which was seconded and adopted: **Resolved**, **That the document** "Continuing Resolutions and Other Resolutions of Ongoing Impact," as considered and amended by the Synod Council at its meeting on January 18, 2017, be approved effective the close of this 2019 assembly, except for those specific sections identified in writing by at least one member of the 2019 assembly for further consideration at the 2020 assembly, in which instances the previous synodical actions on the same topics will continue in effect until revised or replaced by the 2020 assembly.

(By the end of the assembly, only one item was brought to Secretary Shankweiler's attention. Deacon Marlane Druckenmiller pointed out that the proposed item I.11. was no longer needed as it pertains to pastors of full communion partners, who are now covered in the constitution as having voice and vote in synod assemblies.)

ROSTERED MINISTERS CELEBRATING ANNIVERSARIES. Vice President Edelman-Weiner stated that the synod held a special worship service and luncheon on April 30 at the Lutheran Center to honor those rostered ministers celebrating major anniversaries. A video was shown of part of the Rev. Kenneth Feinour's sermon on that occasion; he was the only pastor in the synod celebrating a fiftieth anniversary.

SECOND REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF REFERENCE AND COUNSEL. Pastor Siegfried was called upon to continue the report of the Committee on Reference and Counsel.

The Rev. Mark Rigg made a motion to substitute the following resolution for the resolution from the East Berks assembly. He spoke about his genuine passion for youth but did not want to impose an unfunded mandate on the synod, considering his proposal a better way to deal with this issue. In the ensuing discussion he made the point that although he could not say exactly what the task force should or would do, he saw the need to (1) study the feasibility of the position, (2) make recommendations for funding the position, and (3) prepare a draft job description.

Resolved, That a task force be formed to address the need for synodical youth leadership, a task force that will work with the Transition Team and that will report to the new bishop in 2020.

The motion was seconded; the substitute was on the floor for discussion.

The Rev. Lauren Blatt said that although it would be unrealistic to pay a full \$50,000 salary, someone could be hired part time.

The Rev. Thomas Lang presented an amendment to the resolution, adding, "to charge the task force with the job of studying the feasibility of the position to recommend sources of funding and to draw up a draft job description."

Deacon Druckenmiller objected to the amendment, saying that this amendment would put a restriction on the task force and may lengthen the time of its work.

The amendment was defeated.

The Rev. Sonja Ware spoke against the substitute, saying that the synod cannot afford to wait any longer. The matter could be dealt with by an interim position. She asserted that the church does not have a money problem, it has a ministry problem, and added that she wants to see more persons under age thirty involved in the synod.

The Rev. Thomas Irwin argued that the synod has youth leadership without having paid staff. Deacon Linda Zawaski replied that the synod does have people who have been a blessing and not been reimbursed; but the addition of a leader at the synod level would be a help. She said that the substitute resolution needs clarification to say that someone is needed by the end of this year.

Pastor Applegate acknowledged that some of the tasks to be fulfilled by the proposed staff position are ones that persons involved with these ministries have picked up naturally, but she spoke against kicking the can down the road by establishing a task force. She said that the original proposal from East Berks allows the synod to move forward. Karrison Dubbs argued for the helpfulness of the substitute.

The Rev. Susan Ruggles argued that some synod ministries have been dropped, such as family ministry and faith formation, and moved the following amendment, which was seconded:

Resolved, That a synodical staff person be called/hired to be an Associate of the Bishop for family, youth, young adult ministry, and faith formation, and be it further Resolved, That a task force work to implement that the synod budget reflect this.

The Rev. Kenneth Melber rose in opposition to the amendment, saying that the synod needs to be wary of what needs to be lost in the budget to fund this.

A vote was taken on the amendment; it was defeated. The original motion from Pastor Rigg was on the table without the amendment.

Mark Hammond questioned why a separate task force should be formed when there already is a group dealing with this ministry area. He moved an amendment which was seconded and adopted:

Resolved, That reference to a task force be dropped and add that "the Youth, Young Adult, and Family Ministry Team address" this issue. (Pastor Hammond had referred to the Youth, Young Adult, and Family Ministry Team by its popular name, YoYoFa, with Secretary Shankweiler asking the assembly's permission to use the full name.)

With this amendment, the substitute as amended was read by Secretary Shankweiler: "*Resolved*, That the Youth, Young Adult, and Family Ministry Team address the need for synodical youth leadership, a team that will work with the Transition Team and that will report to the new bishop in 2020." The substitute resolution as amended was adopted.

INTRODUCTION OF ROSTERED MINISTERS WHO RETIRED. Vice President Edelman-Weiner invited those rostered ministers who retired since the 2018 assembly to stand at their seats and be greeted. The persons who retired were the Rev. Allen Forsman, the Rev. Peter D. Kuritz, Deacon Michael Krentz, the Rev. Harold Hand, Deacon Beverly A. Eiche Kriner, the Rev. John R. Kuschel, the Rev. Richard W. Schoenleber, the Rev. Mary Gade, the Rev. Barry L. Mitchell, and the Rev. Elizabeth M. Mitchell.

She then introduced the rostered leaders received from other synods: the Rev. Kristen Glass Perez, Deacon Diana K. Pelletier, the Rev. Shongchai Hang, the Rev. Drew J. Neidig, the Rev. Joseph A. Veres, and the Rev. Terrence M. Walsh.

MISSION INTERPRETERS. Georgia Suranofsky, one of the coordinators of the synod's Mission Interpretation Ministry, was introduced and presented a brochure of that work. She introduced the Rev. Jenny Heavner who spoke on behalf of Lutheran Congregational Services and Julia Menzo of Liberty Lutheran's Disaster Preparedness and Recovery ministry, who told about disaster relief ef-

forts in Schuylkill County.

TREASURER'S REPORT. Donald Dillman, the synod's treasurer, presented his report as found in the Bulletin of Reports, drawing the assembly's attention to a chart summarizing Mission Support for the period 2007 through 2019 and thanking the assembly for their support.

FINANCE COMMITTEE. Dr. Donald Boyer presented the 2020 Program Proposal and explained the changes as compared to 2019 and the process used to develop the plan, which included meetings of the Finance Committee with the ministry teams to ascertain the funding required for 2020. He presented the following resolution on behalf of the synod council; it was adopted.

Resolved, That the 2020 program proposal (February 1, 2020, to January 31, 2021) be adopted. The Synod Council is hereby authorized to establish the 2020 budget no later than its January 2020 meeting, making any necessary adjustments to the budget proposal in light of both realistic anticipation of receipts and synodical priorities (in consultation with the ELCA Treasurer with respect to the ELCA portion thereof.)

2020 COMPENSATION GUIDELINES. The Revs. Kurt Garbe and David Blitch, representing the Leadership Development Ministry Team, presented the 2020 Compensation Guidelines for Pastors as found in the Bulletin of Reports; they were adopted. They presented next the guidelines for deacons, also in the Bulletin of Reports, which were also adopted.

During the discussion the Rev. Thomas Irving asked if something could be said further about leaders who have been serving for twenty-one years of more; the guidelines could be understood to set a plateau at that point.

CANDIDACY COMMITTEE. The Rev. Paul Metzloff, chairperson of the synod's Candidacy Committee, encouraged the synod's congregations to raise up potential candidates for rostered ministry. He made the point that in this synod no one finished the candidacy process during the current year. There are nine persons in various stages of development with five persons interested in entering. He thanked the Rev. Mary Gade for her work with the committee prior to her retirement and the Rev. Peggy Wuertele, her replacement.

50TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE ORDINATION OF WOMEN. The Rev. Virginia Biniek was introduced to speak about the fiftieth anniversary of the ordination of women. She pointed out that she herself was not even allowed to be an acolyte as a child, but was ordained in 1978, forty-one years ago. She pointed out that even after fifty years, for some people a woman as pastor is still a rare sight, while for others in their lifetimes there have always been female pastors. The first female ordained in the Lutheran Church in America, one of the ELCA's predecessor bodies, was the Rev. Elizabeth Platz; this synod's first ordination of a female pastor took place in 1976, making Pastor Biniek the sixth in our synod. The assembly then watched a video concerning this topic.

BEAR CREEK CAMP. The Rev. Jimmy Lee Werley, Interim Director of Bear Creek Camp, extended greetings from the camp's staff and explained that the camp is a joint ministry of the Southeastern and Northeastern Pennsylvania Synods. He explained as well that the summer sessions at this 3,000-acre camp are for grades one through twelve, with the registrations for 2019 up 82 as compared to 2018 (now 967 and still open). An active search committee is looking for a new director. No one can be denied attendance because of finances. Some staff members come from other countries, though two persons intending to come for 2019 could not get visas.

DIAKON LUTHERAN SOCIAL MINISTRIES. The Rev. Mark A. Wimmer brought greetings on behalf of Mark Pile, President and CEO of Diakon, and of the board of directors of Diakon. He spoke about the parable of the Good Samaritan, pointing to the innkeeper as a person who does not get much mention but performs an essential service. He compared Diakon to that innkeeper. He listed Diakon's ministries in the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod and invited the synod's members to be partners with Diakon in ministry.

UNITED LUTHERAN SEMINARY. Dr. Richard Green, Interim President of the United Lutheran Seminary, spoke about the seminary's beginning next year to offer free tuition to all ELCA full-time students. He pointed out that the seminary is growing in the number of students attending with fifty-four students in the first year class and over sixty-five graduating in 2019. More than fifty percent of the students are women. Two-thirds of the seminarians are under thirty years of age. He spoke of the need to encourage youth to consider seminary. He expressed appreciation for what the North-eastern Pennsylvania Synod does for the seminary, and he said that the church is trying to bring the previous seminaries together in learning and serving.

COMMITTEES, TEAMS, TASK FORCES. Bishop Zeiser indicated that the reports of all of the synod's ministry teams, committees, and task forces were before the assembly for questions. No questions were asked. He asked if there was any unfinished business; nothing was brought forward.

CLOSING MATTERS. Bishop Zeiser announced that the 2020 assembly (June 4-6) will be held at the Kalahari Resort. Among the business items will be the election of a new bishop. Secretary Shankweiler made the final announcements. Bishop Zeiser called for a motion to adjourn, which was adopted at 4:10 p.m. A closing worship services followed, which included the installation of newly elected officers and Synod Council members.

BISHOP ZEISER'S ASSEMBLY SERMON (Genesis 1:1-5)

The Northeastern PA Synod is many things. Here's a document illustrating one of those things: the Certificate of Charter, issued April 7, 1969 by the Berks County Court of Common Pleas, approving the incorporation of this synod. The Northeastern PA Synod is a non-profit corporation. Then there's this Reference and Council resolution from the 1968 Convention of the Eastern PA Synod - LCA (*Minutes*, pg. 122): "Resolved, that we memorialize the Lutheran Church in America to take tangible steps across its territory to confront and combat white racism within its membership." Fifty years after its founding, the Northeastern PA Synod continues to be an annual gathering where deliberate over issues of social/civil consequence.

This synod is many things. Today, in the fiftieth year after its founding, you can look around and see yet another illustration: the synod, taking shape with tables and chairs; a raised podium holding officers and decorative appointments; microphones and banners; a baptismal font as you approached the plenary hall. The Northeastern PA Synod is visible and needs to be engaged. It has not always been like *this*. So that synod could come alive here, this space was shaped by necessity and imagination. When the planning team visited 2 weeks ago, it was greeted by openness - a void, if you will. Yesterday, as the sound/video team set up, chaos is the word to describe what filled this room. This synod engages its surroundings, and its surroundings are transformed as a result. Likewise, this synod is transformed by whatever surroundings or context it engages.

This synod is many things. YOU are one of those things, and I know enough about you, Northeastern PA Synod, to know that you have a persistent stirring within. You - 2019 Voting Member - I know your spirit stirs within you to connect yet one more dot in your complex, unfolding relationship to the God drawing you close. Knowing you, I imagine there are times when you are filled with the wonder of God's

active presence in your life, confident to say, "Yes! There it is!" And you're on to connecting the next dot.

I know enough about you, Northeastern PA Synod, to know that you can find yourself driven by faith. Driven, not the way hunger drives a person to devour food, or the way anger pushes you to pound your fist. But driven, even if imperfectly, because you are convinced you're onto something about the love of God in Jesus. And you're compelled to discover more. It drives you, and it will not go away.

It can be confusing because you've got some of the pieces, but not all. There are dots yet to be connected. You try to put the dots together, sometimes successfully. Often, not. But you don't walk away.

What makes it all bearable is that you find yourself in the company of others in the same faith pursuit. Together you have settled upon a way to explore the stirring, a way that celebrates the stirring within. And together you seem to move the pieces closer together with vigor, beginning creative endeavors of compassion, justice, hope. Some are ready for this. Others say "Not ready yet." The Northeastern PA Synod is many things. *This* is one of them.

Stepping back, as we do today in assembly, you take account of where you are, where we are, and what it's been like to get there. Ideas are shared through conversations, redports, discussion/debate, through sermons. Some take notes, report back to congregations, follow up with additional contacts. Our secretary writes it all down.

In this way we are like the ones who compiled Genesis 1:1-5. Like them, we want to recall how much has been discovered: the goodness, the surprise, the melding of spirits that leads to acts of compassion toward, well, toward others; then driven again to give yourself over to this persistent stirring within.

In time, sufficient insights have been aroused, with increasing connections made among them. The curious are drawn, hoping for that stirring to be within them, too. Then, from among perhaps the shyest (it's so often the quiet ones) comes the provocative request: "Wait a minute! an we talk about the one who brings us here." Out of nowhere, eyes light up and it's as if a "wind from God [sweeps] over the face of the water."

The words of Genesis 1:1-5 arose *after* the Israelites experienced a few things that came to make sense. They connected the dots and discovered that God had offered them new days over and overs. You know some of the situations that occurred. For now, connecting dots that go back 50 years (to April 7, 1969), to dots from August 2018, to dots from two weeks ago, to dots from yesterday, to dots that will appear today, the word of God opens the way for Genesis 1:1-5, like a wind from God sweeping over the face of the dark waters, to settle on this one-day assembly of the congregations and rostered ministers of the Northeastern- PA Synod. We gather because for generations there have been those convinced that we're onto something. And it drives us still, and it will not go away.

The Northeastern PA Synod is many things. I know so many of you - Northeastern PA Synod - to be a people of God beset with a persistent stirring within; a stirring that drives you and will not go away. It drives you to connect the dots

prompting creative endeavors in mission,, unleashing new ministries for the sake of the gospel in your locations for this time. You, Northeastern PA Synod - are many things. Among them is God's witness, shaped by necessity and imagination, for a new day.

Can one day in Hazleton make a difference for you, for your congregation, for this synod, for the entirety of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America?

In the Risen Jesus Christ it can. The Easter Season offers a message with power to take one day in Hazleton and make a difference in your faith for the sake of being the Northeastern PA Synod.

0 Holy Spirit, let there be light. A light that drives us, and frees us in Christ for a new day.

CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS

Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod,

Evangelical Lutheran Church in America

(including changes adopted by the 2019 Churchwide Assembly)

* Items marked with an asterisk are mandated by the ELCA. (See *S18.11. and *S18.12. of this constitution.) The constitution is printed in **boldface** type; the bylaws (indicated by the initials BL) are in lightface type.

Chapter 1 NAME AND INCORPORATION

- *S1.01. The name of this synod, as determined by the Churchwide Assembly, shall be the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.
- *S1.02. For the purposes of this constitution and the accompanying bylaws, the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America is hereafter designated as "this synod" or "the synod."
- *S1.11. This synod shall be incorporated. Amendments to the articles of incorporation of this synod shall be submitted to the Church Council for ratification before filing.
- *S1.21. The seal of this synod is two concentric circles surrounding the words "Incorporated I987."

 Within the concentric circles is the legend "Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod Evangelical Lutheran Church in America."

Chapter 2 STATUS

- *S2.01. This synod possesses the powers conferred upon it, and accepts the duties and responsibilities assigned to it, in the *Constitution, Bylaws, and Continuing Resolutions of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America*, which are recognized as having governing force in the life of this synod.
- *S2.02. The name Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA or "this church") as used herein refers in general references to this whole church, including its three expressions: congregations, svnods, and the churchwide organization. The name Evangelical Lutheran Church in America is also the name of the corporation of the churchwide organization to which specific references may be made herein.
- *S2.03. No provision of this constitution shall be inconsistent with the constitution and bylaws of this church.

Chapter 3 TERRITORY

- *S3.01. The territory of this synod, as determined by the Churchwide Assembly, shall be the counties of Berks, Bradford, Carbon, Lackawanna, Lehigh, Luzerne, Monroe, Northampton, Pike, Schuylkill, Sullivan, Susquehanna, Wayne, and Wyoming in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.
- *S3.02. "Determined by the Churchwide Assembly," as stipulated by *S3.01., is understood to include the reported changes in synod relationship made by any congregation in a border area agreed under ELCA bylaws 10.01.01. and 10.01.03.

Chapter 4 CONFESSION OF FAITH

- *S4.01. This synod confesses the Triune God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.
- *S4.02. This synod confesses Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior and the Gospel as the power of God for the salvation of all who believe.
 - a. Jesus Christ is the Word of God incarnate, through whom everything was made and through whose life, death, and resurrection God fashions a new creation.
 - b. The proclamation of God's message to us as both Law and Gospel is the Word of God, revealing judgment and mercy through word and deed, beginning with the Word in creation, continuing in the history of Israel, and centering in all its fullness in the person and work of Jesus Christ.
 - c. The canonical Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the written Word of God. Inspired by God's Spirit speaking through their authors, they record and announce God's revelation centering in Jesus Christ. Through them God's Spirit speaks to us to create and sustain Christian faith and fellowship for service in the world.
- *S4.03. This synod accepts the canonical Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments as the inspired Word of God and the authoritative source and norm of its proclamation, faith, and life.
- *S4.04. This synod accepts the Apostles', Nicene, and Athanasian Creeds as true declarations of the faith of this synod.
- *S4.05. This synod accepts the Unaltered Augsburg Confession as a true witness to the Gospel, acknowledging as one with it in faith and doctrine all churches that likewise accept the teachings of the Unaltered Augsburg Confession.
- *S4.06. This synod accepts the other confessional writings in the Book of Concord, namely, the Apology of the Augsburg Confession, the Smallcald Articles and the Treatise, the Small Catechism, the Large Catechism, and the Formula of Concord, as further valid interpretations of the faith of the Church.
- *S4.07. This synod confesses the Gospel, recorded in the Holy Scriptures and confessed in the ecumenical creeds and Lutheran confessional writings, as the power of God to create and sustain the Church for God's mission in the world.

Chapter 5 NATURE OF THE CHURCH

- *S5.01. All power in the Church belongs to our Lord Jesus Christ, its head. All actions of this synod are to be carried out under his rule and authority.
- *S5.02 This church confesses the one, holy, catholic, and apostolic Church and is resolved to serve Christian unity throughout the world.
- *S5.03. The Church exists both as an inclusive fellowship and as local congregations gathered for worship and Christian service. Congregations find their fulfillment in the universal community of the Church, and the universal Church exists in and through congregations. This church, therefore, derives its character and powers both from the sanction and representation of its congregations and from its inherent nature as an expression of the broader fellowship of the faithful. In length, it acknowledges itself to be in the historic continuity of the communion of saints; in breadth, it expresses the fellowship of believers and congregations in our day.

*S5.04 This church, inspired and led by the Holy Spirit, participates in The Lutheran World Federation as a global communion of churches, engaging in faithful witness to the gospel of Jesus Christ and in service for the sake of God's mission in the world.

Chapter 6 STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

- *S6.01. The Church is a people created by God in Christ, empowered by the Holy Spirit, called and sent to bear witness to God's creative, redeeming, and sanctifying activity in the world.
- *S6.02. To participate in God's mission, this synod as a part of the Church shall:
 - a. Proclaim God's saving Gospel of justification by grace for Christ's sake through faith alone, according to the apostolic witness in the Holy Scriptures, preserving and transmitting the Gospel faithfully to future generations.
 - b. Carry out Christ's Great Commission by reaching out to all people to bring them to faith in Christ and by doing all ministry with a global awareness consistent with the understanding of God as Creator, Redeemer, and Sanctifier of all.
 - c. Serve in response to God's love to meet human needs, caring for the sick and the aged, advocating dignity and justice for all people, working for peace and reconciliation among the nations, and standing with the poor and powerless, and committing itself to their needs.
 - d. Worship God in proclamation of the Word and administration of the sacraments and through lives of prayer, praise, thanksgiving, witness, and service.
 - e. Nurture its members in the Word of God so as to grow in faith and hope and love, to see daily life as the primary setting for the exercise of their Christian calling, and to use the gifts of the Spirit for their life together and for their calling in the world.
 - f. Manifest the unity given to the people of God by living together in the love of Christ and by joining with other Christians in prayer and action to express and preserve the unity which the Spirit gives.
- *S6.03. This synod, in cooperation with the churchwide organization, shall bear primary responsibility for the oversight of the life and mission of this church in its territory. In fulfillment of this role and consistent with policies and procedures of this church, this synod shall:

Provide for pastoral care of congregations and rostered ministers in the synod;

Plan for, facilitate, and nurture the mission of this church through congregations;

Strengthen interdependent relationships among congregations, synods, and the churchwide organization, and foster relationships with agencies and institutions affiliated with or related to this church as well as ecumenical partners.

Interpret the work of this church to congregations and to the public on the territory of the synod.

*S6.03.01. The responsibilities of the synod include the following:

providing for pastoral care of congregations, ministers of Word and Sacrament, and ministers of Word and Service in the synod, including:

- approving candidates for the ministry of Word and Sacrament in cooperation with the appropriate seminaries of this church, which may be done through multi-synod committees;
- authorizing ordinations and ordaining ministers of Word and Sacrament on behalf of this church;
- approving ministers of Word and Service, which may be done through multi-synod committees;
- 4) authorizing ordinations and ordaining ministers of Word and Service on behalf of this church; and
- 5) consulting in the call process for rostered ministers.

- BLS6.03.01.a.5) The Candidacy Committee shall examine the qualifications of candidates for ordination, for reception from other Lutheran church bodies, and for consecration as ministers of Word and Service, and shall present recommendations concerning applicants approved by the Committee to the Synod Assembly, or in exceptional circumstances to the Synod Council, for final action.
- b. providing for leadership recruitment, preparation, and support in accordance with churchwide standards and policies, including:
 - 1) nurturing and supporting congregations and lay leaders;
 - 2) seeking and recruiting qualified candidates for the rostered ministries of this church;
 - 3) making provision for pastoral care, call review, and guidance;
 - encouraging and supporting persons on the rosters of this church in stewardship of their abilities, care of self, and pursuit of continuing education to undergird their effectiveness of service; and
 - 5) supporting recruitment of leaders for this church's colleges, universities, seminaries, and social ministry organizations.
 - c. providing for discipline of congregations, ministers of Word and Sacrament, and ministers of Word and Service; as well as for termination of call, appointment, adjudication, and appeals consistent with Chapter 20 of this church's constitution.
 - d. providing for archives in conjunction with other synods.
- *S6.03.02. In planning for, facilitating, and nurturing the mission of this church through congregations, the responsibilities of the synod include the following:
 - a. developing of new ministries, redevelopment of existing ministries, and support and assistance in the conclusion, if necessary, of a particular ministry;
 - b. leading and encouraging of congregations in their evangelism efforts;
 - c. assisting members of its congregations in carrying out their ministries in the world;
 - d. encouraging congregations to respond to human need, work for justice and peace, care for the sick and the suffering, and participate responsibly in society;
 - e. providing resources for congregational life;
 - f. grouping congregations in conferences, clusters, coalitions, or other area subdivisions for mission purposes.
- *S6.03.03. In strengthening interdependent relationships among congregations, synods, and the churchwide organization, and in fostering relationships with agencies and institutions affiliated with or related to this church as well as with ecumenical partners, the responsibilities of the synod include the following:
 - a. promoting interdependent relationships among congregations, synods, and the churchwide organization, and entering into relationships with other synods in the region;
 - fostering organizations for youth, women, and men, and organizations for language or ethnic communities;
 - c. developing relationships with social ministry organizations and ministries, participating in their mission planning, and providing supportive funding;
 - d. supporting relationships with and providing supportive funding on behalf of colleges, universities, and campus ministries;
- BLS6.03.03.d. Muhlenberg College shall nominate to the Synod Council persons for positions on its Board of Directors. The Synod Council shall elect the requisite number from such nominees as directors.
 - maintaining relationships with and providing supportive funding on behalf of seminaries and continuing education centers;
- BLS6.03.03.e. The United Lutheran Seminary shall nominate to the Synod Council persons for each position to be filled on the seminary's governing board. The Synod Council shall elect the requisite number from such nominees as governing board members.
 - f. fostering supporting relationships with camps and other outdoor ministries;

- BLS6.03.03.f.. The Eastern Pennsylvania Lutheran Camp Corporation shall nominate to the Synod Council persons for positions on the camp's Board of Directors. Election shall be by the Synod Council.
 - g. fostering supporting relationships with preschools, elementary schools, and secondary schools operated by congregations of the synod;
 - h. fostering relationships with ecumenical and global companions;
 - cooperating with other synods and the churchwide organization in creating, using, and supporting regions to carry out those functions of the synod which can best be done cooperatively with other synods and the churchwide organization.
- *S6.03.04. In interpreting the work of this church on the territory of the synod, the responsibilities of the synod include the following:
 - a. encouraging financial support for the work of this church by individuals and congregations;
 - b. participating in churchwide programs;
 - interpreting social statements in a manner consistent with the interpretation given by the churchwide unit or office which assisted in the development of the statement, and suggestion of social study issues;
 - d. providing ecumenical guidance and encouragement.
- *S6.04. Except as otherwise provided in this constitution and bylaws, the Synod Council shall establish processes that will ensure that at least 60% of the members of the synod assemblies, councils, committees, boards, and other organizational units shall be laypersons; and that at least 45 percent of the lay members of assemblies, councils, committees, boards, or other organizational units shall be women and at least 45 percent shall be men; and that, where possible, the representation of ministers of Word and Sacrament shall include both men and women. This Synod shall establish processes that will enable it to reach a minimum goal that 10 percent of its assemblies, councils, committees, boards, or other organizational units be persons of color and/or persons whose primary language is other than English.
- *S6.04.01. It is the goal of this synod that at least 10 percent of the membership of synod assemblies, councils, committees, boards and/or other organizational units of this synod be persons of color and/or persons whose primary language is other than English.
- *S6.04.02. It is the goal of this synod that at least 10 percent of the voting members of the Synod Assembly, Synod Council, committees, organizational units of this synod be youth and young adults. The Synod Council shall establish a plan for implementing this goal. For purposes of the constitution, bylaws, and continuing resolutions of this synod, the term "youth" means a voting member of a congregation who has not reached the age of 18 at the time of election or appointment for service. The term "young adult" means a voting member of a congregation between the ages of 18 and 30 at the time of election or appointment for service.
- *S6.05. Each assembly, council, committee, board, commission, task force, or other body of this synod or any synod units shall be conclusively presumed to have been properly constituted, and neither the method of selection nor the composition of any such assembly, council, committee, board, commission, task force, or other body may be challenged in a court of law by any person or be used as the basis of a challenge in a court of law to the validity or effect of any action taken or authorized by any such assembly, council, committee, board, commission, task force, or other body.
- *S6.06. References herein to the nature of the relationship between the three expressions of this church—congregations, synods, and the churchwide organization—as being interdependent or as being in a partnership relationship describe the mutual responsibility of these expressions in God's mission and the fulfillment of the purposes of this church as described in this chapter, and do not imply or describe the creation of partnerships, co-ventures, agencies, or other legal relationships recognized in civil law.

SYNOD ASSEMBLY

- *S7.01. This synod shall have a Synod Assembly, which shall be its highest legislative authority. The powers of the Synod Assembly are limited only by the provisions in the Articles of Incorporation, this constitution and bylaws, the Assembly's own resolutions, and the constitutions and bylaws of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.
- *S7.11. A regular meeting of the Synod Assembly shall be held at least triennially.
- BLS7.11. A regular meeting of the Synod Assembly shall be held annually.
- S7.11.01. The time and place of the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod Assembly shall be determined by the Synod Council. The time and place for the next regular assembly normally shall be announced not less than four weeks prior to the assembly.
- S7.12. a. Special meetings of the Synod Assembly may be called by the bishop with the consent of the Synod Council, and shall be called by the bishop at the request of one-tenth of the voting members of the Synod Assembly. The notice of each special meeting shall define the purpose for which it is to be held. The scope of actions to be taken at such a special meeting shall be limited to the subject matter(s) described in the notice.
 - b. If the special meeting of the Synod Assembly is required for the purpose of electing a successor bishop because of death, resignation, or inability to serve, the special meeting shall be called by the Synod Council after consultation with the presiding bishop of the ELCA.
- S7.13. Notice of the time and place of all meetings of the Synod Assembly shall be given by the secretary of this synod.
- BLS7.13. Notice for a regular meeting of the Synod Assembly shall be given not less than four weeks preceding the meeting, and for a special meeting of the Synod Assembly not less than two weeks preceding the meeting.
- S7.14. One-third of the members of the Synod Assembly shall constitute a quorum.
- *S7.21. The membership of the Synod Assembly, of which at least 60% of the voting membership shall be composed of laypersons, shall be constituted as follows:
 - a. All ministers of Word and Sacrament under call on the roster of this synod in attendance at the Synod Assembly shall be voting members.
 - b. All ministers of Word and Service, under call, on the roster of this synod shall be voting members in the Synod Assembly.
 - c. A minimum of one lay member elected by each congregation with fewer than 175 baptized members and a minimum of two lay members elected by each congregation with 175 or more baptized members related to this synod, typically one of whom shall be a man and one of whom shall be a woman, shall be voting members. The Synod Council shall establish a formula to provide additional lay representation from congregations on the basis of the number of baptized members in the congregation. The Synod Council shall seek to ensure that at least 45 percent of the lay members of the assembly shall be women and at least 45 percent shall be men.
- BLS7.21. c. A congregation having more than 1,000 persons who are on the roll of baptized members shall be entitled to an additional lay voting member for each additional 1,000 such members, or major fraction thereof.
- *S7.21. d. Voting membership shall include the officers of this synod.

- *S7.21.01. Voting members shall begin serving with the opening of a regular Synod Assembly and shall continue serving until voting members are seated at the next regular Synod Assembly.
- *S7.21.02. If a special Synod Assembly is called and voting members at the previous assembly are unable to serve as voting members, where permitted by state law, the congregation through the Congregation Council may elect new members who shall continue to serve until the next Synod Assembly.
- S7.22. This synod may establish processes that permit retired ordained ministers, or those designated as disabled, or on leave from call, on the roster of this synod to serve as voting members of the Synod Assembly, consistent with *S7.21.c. If the synod does not establish processes to permit the rostered ministers specified above to serve as voting members, they shall have voice but not vote in the meetings of the Synod Assembly.
 - a. All retired ministers of Word and Sacrament on the roster of this synod who register for the Synod Assembly, and all retired ministers of Word and Service on the roster of this synod who register for the Synod Assembly shall be voting members of the assembly, consistent with the provision that 60% of the voting membership shall be laypersons.
 - b. All ministers of Word and Sacrament on the roster of this synod who are on leave from call and who register for the Synod Assembly, and all ministers of Word and Service on the lay roster of this synod who are on leave from call and who register for the Synod Assembly shall be voting members of the assembly, consistent with the provision that 60% of the voting membership shall be laypersons.
 - c. All ministers of Word and Sacrament from other denominations that are our fullcommunion partners and who have been appointed or authorized by the bishop and/or Synod Council to serve congregations of this synod shall have voice and vote in the meetings of the Synod Assembly.
- *S7.23. The presiding bishop of the ELCA and such other official representatives of the churchwide organization as may be designated by the presiding bishop, shall have voice but not vote in the meetings of the Synod Assembly. Like privileges shall be accorded to those additional persons whom the Synod Assembly or Synod Council shall from time to time designate.
- S7.24. Lay members of the Synod Assembly representing congregations shall continue as such until replaced by the election of new members or until they have been disqualified by termination of membership in that congregation. Normally, congregations will hold elections prior to each regular meeting of the Synod Assembly.
- *S7.25. Except as otherwise provided in this constitution or in the Constitution, Bylaws, and Continuing Resolutions of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, each voting member of the Synod Assembly shall be a voting member of a congregation of this synod.
- S7.26. This synod may establish processes through the Synod Council that permit representatives of congregations under development and authorized worshiping communities of the synod, under ELCA bylaw 10.02.03., to serve as voting members of the Synod Assembly, consistent with *S7.21.
- S7.27 Duly elected voting members of the Synod Council who are not otherwise voting members of the Synod Assembly under *S7.21, shall be granted the privilege of both voice and vote as members of the Synod Assembly.
- *S7.31. Proxy and absentee voting shall not be permitted in the transaction of any business of the Synod Assembly.
- S7.32. Robert's Rules of Order, latest edition, shall govern parliamentary procedure of the Synod Assembly, except as otherwise provided in the constitution or bylaws of the church or the constitution or bylaws of this synod.

- S7.33. "Ex officio" as used herein means membership with full rights of voice and vote unless otherwise expressly limited.
- S7.41. Holy Communion shall be celebrated at each regular Synod Assembly.
- S7.42. All appointments for the conduct of general religious services or public meetings shall be made by the bishop.
- S7.43. The secretary shall send out a Bulletin of Reports to all ordained ministers, and to all associates in ministry, deaconesses of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, and diaconal ministers on the lay rosters of this synod, and to the lay voting members of the assembly elected by the congregations at least fifteen days before each regular Synod Assembly.
- S7.44. The Synod Council shall prepare the proposed agenda and program for each meeting of the Synod Assembly and shall determine the time and place for each meeting of the assembly.
- S7.45. A special meeting of the Synod Assembly shall transact only such business as is related to the purpose stated in the call.
- S7.51. There shall be a Committee of Reference and Counsel, whose duties shall be (a) to recommend special orders for the hearing of special representatives or for consideration of items of business; (b) to grant or deny permission to distribute printed or otherwise duplicated material not issuing from the office of the secretary; (c) to consider and present memorials from Mission Districts and congregations and to make recommendation thereon; (d) to receive and present all motions and resolutions of a general character, not germane to any pending question or report, and to make recommendation thereon to the assembly; (e) to give such assistance as may be requested by the bishop in the course of the assembly.
- S7.52. All reports published in the Bulletin of Reports shall be received by the Synod Assembly without further action.
- S7.61. The minutes of each Synod Assembly shall be submitted meeting by meeting by the secretary to a Committee on Minutes, which shall examine the same and make recommendations thereon to the Assembly. Approval of the minutes of any meeting of the final day of the assembly shall be the responsibility of the officers of the synod.
- S7.62. The bishop and the secretary shall, after making any necessary corrections therein, certify two copies of the printed minutes of each Synod Assembly as the official protocol of said assembly and shall submit the same to the next regular assembly for approval and deposit in the archives.

Chapter 8 OFFICERS

- *S8.01. The officers of this synod shall be a bishop, a vice president, a secretary, and a treasurer.
- S8.10. Bishop
- *S8.11. The bishop shall be elected by the Synod Assembly. The bishop shall be a minister of Word and Sacrament of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.
- *S8.12. As this synod's pastor, the bishop shall:

- Preach, teach, and administer the sacraments in accord with the Confession of Faith of this church.
- b. Have primary responsibility for the ministry of Word and Sacrament in this synod and its congregations, providing pastoral care and leadership for this synod, its congregations, its ministers of Word and Sacrament, and its ministers of Word and Service.
- BLS8.12. b. A fund to be known as the Bishop's Fund shall be administered by the bishop, at whose discretion aid shall be granted to ministers of Word and Sacrament and ministers of Word and Service, and their families in time of special need. The bishop shall submit an accounting annually for audit by the Certified Public Accountant named by the Synod Council to audit the accounts of this Synod
- *S8.12. c. Exercise solely this church's power to ordain (or provide for the ordination by another synod bishop of) approved candidates who have received and accepted a properly issued, duly attested letter of call for the office of ministry of Word and Sacrament (and as provided in the bylaws of the Evangelical Lutheran Church of America.)
 - d. Ordain (or provide for the ordination of) approved candidates who have received and accepted a properly issued, duly attested letter of call for service as ministers of Word and Service of this church.
 - e. Attest letters of call for persons called to serve congregations in this synod, letters of call for persons called by the Synod Council, and letters of call for persons on the rosters of this synod called by the Church Council.
 - f. Install (or provide for the installation of) rostered ministers whose calls the bishop has attested.
 - g. Exercise leadership in the mission of this church and in so doing:
 - 1) Interpret and advocate the mission and theology of the whole church;
 - 2) Lead in fostering support for and commitment to the mission of this church within this synod;
 - 3) Coordinate the use of the resources available to this synod as it seeks to promote the health of this church's life and witness in the areas served by this synod;
 - 4) Submit a report to each regular meeting of the Synod Assembly concerning the synod's life and work; and
 - 5) Advise and counsel this synod's related institutions and organizations.
 - h. Practice leadership in strengthening the unity of the Church and in so doing:
 - 1) Exercise oversight of the preaching, teaching, and administration of the sacraments within this synod in accord with the Confession of Faith of this church;
 - Be responsible for administering the constitutionally established processes for the resolution of controversies and for the discipline of rostered ministers and congregations of this synod;
 - 3) Be the chief ecumenical officer of this synod;
 - 4) Be a member of the Conference of Bishops and consult regularly with other synod bishops;
 - 5) Foster awareness of other churches throughout the Lutheran world communion and, where appropriate, engage in contact with leaders of those churches;
 - 6) Cultivate communion in faith and mission with appropriate Christian judicatory leaders functioning within the territory of this synod; and

- 7) Be ex officio a member of the Churchwide Assembly.
- i. Oversee and administer the work of this synod and in so doing:
 - Serve as the president of the synod corporation and be the chief executive and administrative officer of this synod, who is authorized and empowered, in the name of this synod, to sign deeds or other instruments and to affix the seal of this synod;
 - 2) Preside at all meetings of the Synod Assembly and provide for the preparation of the agenda for the Synod Assembly, Synod Council, and the council's Executive Committee;
 - 3) Ensure that the constitution and bylaws of the synod and of the churchwide organization are duly observed within this synod, and that the actions of the synod in conformity therewith are carried into effect;
 - 4) Exercise supervision over the work of the other officers;
 - 5) Coordinate the work of all synod staff members;
 - 6) Appoint all committees for which provision is not otherwise made;
 - 7) Be a member of all committees and any other organizational units of the synod, except as otherwise provided in this constitution;
 - 8) Provide for preparation and maintenance of synod rosters containing the names and addresses of all rostered ministers of this synod and a record of the calls under which they are serving or the date on which their retired or disability status took effect;
 - 9) Annually bring to the attention of the Synod Council the names of all rostered ministers on leave from call or engaged in approved graduate study in conformity with the constitution, bylaws and continuing resolutions of this church and pursuant to prior action of this synod through the Synod Council;
 - 10) Provide for prompt reporting to the secretary of this church of:
 - a) additions to and subtractions from the rosters of this synod;
 - the issuance of certificates of transfer for rostered ministers in good standing who have received and accepted a properly issued, duly attested, regular letter of call under the jurisdiction of another synod; and
 - c) the entrance of the names of such persons for whom proper certificates of transfer have been received;
 - 11) Provide for preparation and maintenance of a roster of the congregations of this synod and the names of the laypersons who have been elected to represent them; and
 - 12) Appoint a statistician of the synod, who shall secure the parochial reports of the congregations and make the reports available to the secretary of this church for collation, analysis, and distribution of the statistical summaries to this synod and the other synods of this church.
- *S8.13. The synod bishop may appoint an attorney, admitted to the bar within the territory of the synod or the state where the synod is located, to be Synod Attorney. The appointment must be approved by the Synod Council and reported to the Synod Assembly and to the secretary of this church. The appointment continues until resignation or until a successor is appointed. The Synod Attorney provides legal advice and counsel to the synod officers and the Synod Council. The Synod Attorney is expected to be familiar with the governing documents and policies of the synod and, as necessary, to attend meetings of the Synod Council. The Synod Attorney serves with-

out salary but may be retained and compensated for specific legal services requested by the synod.

- S8.14. The bishop may have such assistants as this synod shall from time to time authorize.
- *S8.15. The presiding bishop of this church, or the appointee of the presiding bishop, shall install into office, in accord with the policy and approved rite of this church, each newly elected synod bishop.

*S8.16 Conflicts of Interest

- *S8.16.01 The following procedures shall govern matters of potential conflicts of interest for synod bishops:
 - a. Whenever a synod bishop determines that a matter of the kind described in *S8.16.01.b may require his or her determination or action with respect to a related individual as defined in *S8.16.01.c., the synod bishop shall withdraw from personal involvement in such matter and shall so notify the presiding bishop. The presiding bishop shall then appoint another synod bishop from the same region to handle the matter to conclusion. In dealing with such matter, the appointed bishop shall exercise all of the functions and authority to the same extent as if the appointed bishop were the elected bishop of the withdrawing bishop's synod.
 - b. Matters include any proceedings under Chapter 20, proceedings under provision 7.46. of the Constitution, Bylaws, and Continuing Resolutions of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (*S14.18.), candidacy, reinstatement, and similar matters where determinations or actions by the synod bishop could change, limit, restrict, approve, authorize, or deny the related individual's ministry on one of the official rosters of the church.
 - c. A related individual is one who, with respect to the synod bishop, is a spouse, parent, son, daughter, sibling, uncle, aunt, niece, nephew, grandparent, grandchild, including corresponding members of blended families and in-laws (parent, son, daughter, or sibling of a spouse, spouse of a sibling, or the parent or sibling of the spouse of a sibling.)

S8.20. Vice President

- *S8.21. The vice president shall be elected by the Synod Assembly. The vice president shall be a layperson. The vice president shall be a voting member of a congregation of this synod. The vice president shall not receive a salary for the performance of the duties of the office.
- S8.22. The vice president shall chair the Synod Council.
- *S8.23. In the event of the death, resignation, or disability of the bishop, the vice president, after consultation with the presiding bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, shall convene the Synod Council to arrange for the conduct of the duties of the bishop until a new bishop shall be elected or, in the case of temporary disability, until the bishop resumes full performance of the duties of the office.
- S8.24. The vice president shall be ex officio a member of all Ministry Teams and committees of this synod.

- S8.25. The vice president shall be ex-officio a member of the Churchwide Assembly.
- S8.30. Secretary
- *S8.31. The secretary shall be elected by the Synod Assembly. The secretary shall be a voting member of a congregation of this synod. The secretary may be either a layperson or a rostered minister.
- *S8.32. The secretary shall:
 - a. Keep the minutes of all meetings of the Synod Assembly and Synod Council, be responsible for the printing and distribution of such minutes, and perform such other duties as this synod may from time to time direct.
 - b. Be authorized and empowered, in the name of this synod, to attest all instruments which require the same, and which are signed and sealed by the bishop.
 - c. In consultation with the bishop, classify and arrange all important papers and documents and deposit them in the archives of this synod.
 - d. Submit to the secretary of this church at least nine months before each regular Churchwide Assembly a certified list of the voting members elected by the Synod Assembly.
- S8.40. Treasurer
- *S8.41. The treasurer may be elected by the Synod Assembly or may be appointed by the Synod Council. The treasurer shall be a voting member of a congregation of this synod. The treasurer may be either a layperson or a rostered minister.
- S8.42. The treasurer shall provide and be accountable for:
 - a. Management of the monies and accounts of this synod, its deeds, mortgages, contracts, evidences of claims and revenues, and trust funds, holding the same at all times subject to the order of this synod.
- BLS8.42. Whenever it becomes necessary to satisfy of record any mortgage or mortgages, any judgment or judgments, owned or held by this Synod, the Treasurer shall be the attorney-in-fact thereof, and is duly authorized and empowered as such attorney-in-fact in the name of this Synod to satisfy of record such mortgages or judgments upon receiving full payment of the amounts due upon the same, or such compromise thereof as may have been approved by the Synod Council. The Treasurer is further empowered to assign and transfer any policies of insurance or other collateral that may be held by this Synod for such other loans or judgments.
- S8.42. b. Investment of funds upon the authorization of the Synod Council.
- BLS8.42. b. All investments or funds belonging to this Synod shall be held or registered as to principal in the name of this Synod, or in a nominee registration, and shall be made only by and with the consent of the Synod Council or its Finance Committee. All investments may be sold, assigned, transferred, and changed upon the direction of the Synod Council or its Finance Committee, duly evidenced by written order, and authority is hereby given to the Bishop or Treasurer to execute and deliver any and all assignments, powers of attorney, transfers, and other assurances in the law necessary to make effective the sale and assignment of such securities.
- S8.42. c. Receipt and acknowledgment of offerings, contributions, and bequests made to this synod, collecting interest and income from its invested funds, and paying regular appropriations and orders on the several accounts as approved and directed by the Synod Council. The

- treasurer shall transmit each month to the treasurer of the ELCA the funds received by this synod for the general work of this church.
- d. Maintenance of a regular account with each congregation of this synod and informing the congregation, at least quarterly, of the status of this account.
- e. Rendering at each regular meeting of the Synod Assembly a full, detailed, and duly audited report of receipts and disbursements in the several accounts of this synod for the preceding fiscal year, together with the tabulations, for record and publication in the *Minutes*, of the contributions from the congregations.
- f. Obtaining a fidelity bond in the amount determined by the Synod Council for persons handling synod funds, which bond shall be in the custody of the secretary. The premium for the bond shall be paid by the synod. Fidelity coverage provided by the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America shall be deemed a fulfillment of this requirement.
- S8.50. General Provisions
- *S8.51. The terms of office of the officers of this synod shall be as follows:
 - a. The bishop of this synod shall be elected to a term of six years and may be re-elected.
 - b. The vice president and secretary of this synod shall be elected to a term of four years and may be re-elected. The officer shall serve until his or her successor takes office.
 - c. The treasurer of this synod shall be elected or appointed to a four-year term and may be reelected or reappointed. The treasurer shall serve until his or her successor takes office.
- BLS8.51. The vice president may be elected for a maximum of two consecutive terms.
- S8.52. The terms of the officers shall begin on the first day of the third month following election or, in special circumstances, at a time designated by the Synod Council.
- *S8.53. Each officer shall be a voting member in a congregation of this synod, except that the bishop need not be a member of a congregation of this synod at the time of election.
- *S8.54. Should the bishop die, resign, or be unable to serve, the vice president, after consultation with the presiding bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, shall convene the Synod Council to arrange for the appropriate care of the responsibilities of the bishop until an election of a new bishop can be held or, in the case of temporary disability, until the bishop is able to serve again. Such arrangements may include the appointment by the Synod Council of an interim bishop, who during the vacancy or period of disability shall possess all of the powers and authority of a regularly elected bishop. The term of the successor bishop, elected by the next Synod Assembly or a special meeting of the Synod Assembly called for the purpose of election, shall be six years with the subsequent election to take place at the Synod Assembly closest to the expiration of such a term and with the starting date of a successor term to be governed by constitutional provision S8.52.
- S8.55. Should the vice president, the secretary, or the treasurer die, resign, or be unable to serve, the bishop, with the approval of the Executive Committee of the Synod Council, shall arrange for the appropriate care of the responsibilities of the officer until an election of a new officer can be held or, in the case of temporary disability, until the officer is able to serve again. The term of the successor officer, elected by the next Synod Assembly, shall be four years.

- *S8.56. The Executive Committee of the Synod Council shall determine whether an officer is unable to serve; the officer may appeal the decision of the Executive Committee by requesting a hearing before the Synod Council. A meeting to determine the ability of an officer to serve shall be called upon the request of at least three members of the Executive Committee and prior written notice of the meeting shall be given to the officer in question at least ten calendar days prior to the meeting.
- *S8.57. The recall or dismissal of an officer and the vacating of office may be effected for willful disregard or violation of the constitutions, bylaws, and continuing resolutions of this church; for such physical or mental disability as renders the officer incapable of performing the duties of office; or for such conduct as would subject the officer to disciplinary action as a rostered minister or as a member of a congregation of this church.
 - a. Proceedings for the recall or dismissal of a synod bishop shall be instituted by written petition by:
 - 1) the Synod Council on an affirmative vote of at least two-thirds of its elected members present and voting;
 - 2) the Synod Assembly on an affirmative vote of at least two-thirds of its members present and voting:
 - 3) at least 10 synod bishops; or
 - 4) the presiding bishop of this church.
 - b. Proceedings for the recall or dismissal of an officer of a synod, other than the synod bishop, shall be instituted by written petition by:
 - 1) the Synod Council on an affirmative vote of at least two-thirds of its elected members present and voting;
 - 2) the Synod Assembly on an affirmative vote of at least two-thirds of its members present and voting; or
 - 3) the synod bishop.
 - c. The petition shall be filed with the chair of the Committee on Appeals (in care of the secretary of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, 8765 West Higgins Road, Chicago, Illinois 60631) and shall set forth the specific charge or charges.
 - d. Upon the filing of a written petition, the Executive Committee of the Synod Council may temporarily suspend the officer from service in the synod without prejudice, but with continuation of compensation, including benefits, if the officer is a salaried employee of the synod.
 - e. In the case of alleged physical or mental incapacity of an officer of the synod, the procedures outlined in †\$8.56. shall be followed, and such officer shall comply with the decision of the Synod Council. If such officer fails or refuses to comply, the Synod Council may proceed to petition for recall or dismissal as follows:
 - 1) the Synod Council will submit a written report of their findings and the basis of their decision to the Committee on Appeals.
 - 2) the Committee on Appeals, other than those who are disqualified, shall review the findings and decision of the Synod Council and by an affirmative vote of at least two-thirds of those present and voting may adopt the findings and grant the petition.
 - f. If the synod officer is a minister of Word and Sacrament, grounds for recall or dismissal include those set forth in ELCA bylaw 20.22.01. and as defined under the process described in ELCA constitutional provisions 20.21. and 20.22. as grounds for discipline. If the officer is a minister of Word and Service, grounds for recall or dismissal include those set forth in ELCA bylaw 20.23.01. and as defined under the process described in ELCA constitutional provisions 20.21. and 20.22. as grounds for discipline.
 - g. If the officer is a layperson, grounds for recall or dismissal include those set forth in ELCA bylaw 20.41.01. as grounds for discipline.
 - h. If the case of alleged willful disregard or violation of the constitutions, bylaws, and continuing resolutions or of alleged conduct as would subject the officer to disciplinary action, the following procedures shall apply:
 - the petition shall be referred to the Committee on Appeals, which shall function as the discipline hearing committee that shall conduct a hearing in accordance with the rules

- provided for in ELCA bylaw 20.22.14. except to the extent that those rules are in conflict with the provisions of this bylaw; and
- 2) the members of the Committee on Appeals, other than those who are disqualified, may grant the petition by an affirmative vote of at least two-thirds of those present and voting.
- Written notice of a decision by the Committee on Appeals that the charges have been sustained shall be given to the affected officer and to the Synod Council, and the office shall be vacated.
- *S8.58. If the bishop is to be temporarily absent from the synod for an extended period, the bishop, with the consent of the Synod Council, may appoint as acting bishop for such period a minister of Word and Sacrament of this church. Except as limited by action of the Synod Council, an acting bishop shall possess all of the powers and authority of a regularly elected bishop other than authority to ordain or to authorize the ordination of properly approved candidates for ordination.

NOMINATIONS AND ELECTIONS

- *S9.01. The Synod Assembly shall elect such officers of this synod and such other persons as the constitution and bylaws may require, according to procedures set forth in the bylaws. The Synod Assembly shall elect members of the Churchwide Assembly in accordance with bylaw 12.41.11. of the constitution and bylaws of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.
- S9.01.A08. The Synod Council Executive Committee shall provide for background checks for persons nominated for synodical office prior to the Synod Assembly at which the election will take place or as soon as possible after the Synod Assembly for newly elected officers nominated from the floor who were not identified as nominees prior to the assembly. The process shall be as follows:
 - a. Prior to the Synod Assembly appropriate notice of the background check requirement and protocol will be provided to voting members, potential nominees, and others as directed by the Synod Council.
 - b. Nominees and newly elected officers are required to provide written consent to a background check and all information necessary to complete a background check, which should be completed prior to the Synod Assembly with respect to nominees and prior to installation for newly elected officers, if possible.
 - c. The Synod Council's Executive Committee shall designate one Executive Committee or Synod Council member to obtain the background checks.
 - d. All background checks for nominees and newly elected officers will entail a criminal background check. A financial background check will be completed for nominees for treasurer. The Executive Committee shall decide whether additional types of background checks are appropriate for each officer position.
 - e. The background check results shall be provided to that nominee or elected officer and to the Synod Council's Executive Committee, which shall then take action as deemed appropriate. Further disclosure of the results may be determined by the Executive Committee.
 - f. The Executive Committee may adopt other procedures or protocols as are necessary to provide for background checks for nominees and newly elected synodical officers and shall report such actions to the Synod Council.
- *S9.02. In all elections by the Synod Assembly, other than for the bishop, a majority of the legal votes cast shall be necessary for election.
- BLS9.02. Voting members to the Churchwide Assembly shall be elected in three groups as follows:

- a. Group A shall consist of the bishop and a number of voting members equal to the number of Mission Districts of this Synod. Each Mission District shall nominate for election in this group an ordained minister or a layperson according to an appropriate pattern established by the Synod Council. The persons so nominated and the bishop shall be elected en bloc as voting members.
- b. Group B shall consist of voting members who are persons of color or whose primary language is other than English, nominated by the Synod Council in an appropriate number to conform to the goals of this synod as set forth in a continuing resolution.
- c. Group C shall consist of the rest of the total number of voting members allocated to this synod by the ELCA in appropriate categories. Nominations for each category may be made by the Nominating Committee, or by any ordained minister of this synod, or by any congregation acting through its lay voting members, or from the assembly floor. The secretary shall mail nominating forms no later than 15 weeks before the Synod Assembly. The forms must be returned no later than 8 weeks before the first day of the Synod Assembly. The Nominating Committee shall nominate at least twice the number of voting members assigned to each category of this group. Nominees who have previously served as voting members to a Churchwide Assembly shall be identified by an asterisk.
- d. If a voting member elected in any of the groups cannot serve, then that voting member shall be replaced by an alternate voting member from the same category. The bishop of this synod, at any time prior to the closing of the Churchwide Assembly roll, shall be empowered to appoint a substitute in the event no alternates are available. All voting members shall be members of this synod.
- S9.03. There shall be a Nominating Committee appointed by the Synod Council for each regular meeting of the Synod Assembly. Additional nominations may be made from the floor for all elections for which nominations are made by the Nominating Committee.
- S9.04. The bishop shall be elected by the Synod Assembly by ecclesiastical ballot. Three-fourths of the legal votes cast shall be necessary for election on the first ballot. If no one is elected, the first ballot shall be considered the nominating ballot. Three-fourths of the legal votes cast on the second ballot shall be necessary for election. The third ballot shall be limited to the seven persons (plus ties) who receive the greatest number of legal votes on the second ballot who are willing to serve, and two-thirds of the legal votes cast shall be necessary for election. The fourth ballot shall be limited to the three persons (plus ties) who receive the greatest number of legal votes on the third ballot, and 60 percent of the legal votes cast shall be necessary for election. On subsequent ballots a majority of the legal votes cast shall be necessary for election. These ballots shall be limited to the two persons (plus ties) who receive the greatest number of legal votes on the previous ballot.

(See also Continuing Resolution 33)

- S9.05. The Nominating Committee shall nominate at least one person for vice president; additional nominations may be made from the floor.
- S9.06. The Synod Council shall nominate at least one person for secretary; additional nominations may be made from the floor.
- S9.07. If the treasurer is elected, the Synod Council shall nominate at least one person for treasurer; additional nominations may be made from the floor.
- S9.08. In all elections, except for the bishop, the persons receiving the highest number of votes, but not

elected by a majority of the legal votes cast on a preceding ballot, shall be entered on the next ballot to the number of two (plus ties) for each vacancy unfilled. No ballot for an ineligible person shall be counted as a vote cast in any election. On any ballot when only two names appear, a majority of the legal votes cast shall be necessary for election.

- S9.09. The result of each ballot in every election shall be announced in detail to the assembly in the following manner: total number of ballots cast, number of disqualified ballots, number of votes required for election, number of ballots cast for each candidate.
- *S9.10. When notified by the secretary of this church, on behalf of the Nominating Committee of the Churchwide Assembly, the Synod Assembly shall nominate two persons in the specified categories for possible election by the Churchwide Assembly to the Church Council.
- S9.11. The Synod Council shall elect or appoint representatives to the steering committee of its region.
- *S9.12. Background checks and screening shall be required and completed for persons nominated as synod officers prior to their election, if possible, or as soon as practical after their election. The specific procedures and timing of background checks and screening shall be determined by the Synod Council.

Chapter 10

SYNOD COUNCIL

- *S10.01. The Synod Council consisting of the four officers of this synod, 10 to 24 other members, and at least one youth and at least one young adult, shall be elected by the Synod Assembly.
 - a. Each person elected to the Synod Council shall be a voting member of a congregation of this synod, with the exception of ministers on a roster of this synod who reside outside the territory of this synod. The process for election and the term of office when not otherwise provided shall be specified in the bylaws. A member of the Church Council of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, unless otherwise elected as a voting member of the Synod Council, may serve as an advisory member of the Synod Council with voice but not vote.
 - b. The term of office of members of the Synod Council, with the exception of the officers and the youth member, shall be three years.
- *S10.02. The Synod Council shall be the board of directors of this synod and shall serve as its interim legislative authority between meetings of the Synod Assembly. It may make decisions which are not in conflict with actions taken by the Synod Assembly or that are not precluded by provisions of this constitution or the constitution and bylaws of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.
- S10.03. The functions of the Synod Council shall be to:
 - a. Exercise trusteeship responsibilities on behalf of this synod.
 - b. Recommend program goals and budgets to the regular meetings of the Synod Assembly.
 - c. Carry out the resolutions of the Synod Assembly.

- d. Provide for an annual review of the roster of ministers of Word and Sacrament and the roster of ministers of Word and Service, receive and act upon appropriate recommendations regarding those persons whose status is subject to action under the constitution, bylaws, and continuing resolutions of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, and make a complete report to the Synod Assembly of the Synod Council's actions in this regard.
- e. Issue letters of call to rostered ministers as authorized in Chapter 7 of the constitution and bylaws of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.
- f. Fill vacancies until the next regular meeting of the Synod Assembly except as may otherwise be provided in the constitution or bylaws of this synod, and determine the fact of the incapacity of an officer of this synod.
- g. Report its actions to the regular meeting of the Synod Assembly.
- h. Pass upon the propriety of the constitutions of the several congregations of this synod.
- i. Perform such other functions as are set forth in the bylaws of this synod, or as may be delegated to it by the Synod Assembly.

BLS10.03. The Synod Council shall:

- a. Determine the time and place for each meeting of the Synod Assembly and propose its agenda and program.
- b. Elect staff officials upon nomination of the bishop.
- c. Set the salaries of officers and staff officials of this synod.
- d. Institute and oversee a system of personnel practices applicable to all synod officers, staff officials, and other employees.
- e. Elect the representatives of this synod who are to serve, in addition to the bishop ex–officio, on the governing bodies of the interchurch agencies to which this synod is related.
- f. Select persons from the required category in filling vacancies.
- g. Have the power to borrow money on such property as this synod may own or hereafter acquire and to execute mortgages, bonds and warrants, or other instruments of indebtedness for the same.
- h. Provide for an annual physical examination of all investments and securities held by this synod.
- S10.04. Any proposal to appropriate funds, whether by amendment to the budget or otherwise, which is presented to a meeting of the Synod Assembly without the approval of the Synod Council shall require a two-thirds vote for adoption.
- S10.05. No elected member of the Synod Council shall receive compensation for such service, nor shall simultaneously be a Mission District Dean.
- S10.06. If a member of the Synod Council ceases to meet the requirements of the position to which she or he was elected or is absent without excuse from two successive regular meetings of the Synod Council, the office filled by such member shall at once become vacant.
- S10.07. The composition of the Synod Council, the number of its members, the manner of their selection, and its additional duties and responsibilities shall be set forth in the bylaws.
- S10.07.01. To the extent permitted by state law, meetings of the Synod Council and its committees may be held electronically or by telephone conference, and notice of all meetings may be provided elec-

tronically.

BLS10.07.The Synod Council shall consist of the four officers of this synod, two youth, and twenty other members.

The twenty other members of the Synod Council shall be elected to terms of three years, as follows:

(I) one person by each Mission District. These shall be divided into categories of clergy, lay male, and lay female. (2) the remaining members of the Council shall be elected by the Synod Assembly. These shall include categories of clergy, lay male, and lay female. The clergy category shall include a female. At least two elected members shall be persons of color and/or persons whose primary language is other than English. The Nominating Committee shall implement the method of allocation. Council members may serve two consecutive terms. The youth members shall be elected by the Synod Assembly to a two -year term upon nomination by the Nominating Committee, and there shall be one male and one female youth member, elected in alternating years. The terms of the youth members and of the twenty other members of the Synod Council shall begin at the close of the annual Synod Assembly.

Chapter 11

COMMITTEES AND MINISTRY TEAMS OF THIS SYNOD

- *S11.01. There shall be an Executive Committee, a Consultation Committee, a Committee on Discipline, a Mutual Ministry Committee, an Audit Committee, and such other committees as this synod may from time to time determine. The duties and functions of such committees, or any other organizational units created by this synod, and the composition and organizational structure of such units, shall be as set forth in this constitution or in the bylaws or continuing resolutions, and shall be subject to any applicable provisions or requirements of the constitution and bylaws of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.
- BLS11.01.a. The Executive Committee of the Synod Council shall be composed of the four officers of the synod and the chairs of the committees of the Synod Council. The officers of the synod shall likewise serve as the officers of the Executive Committee with the vice president as the presiding officer.
 - b. The provisions of the ELCA bylaws 20.21.01 through 20.21.24, inclusive, are incorporated herein by reference with respect to the consultation and discipline procedure of ordained ministers.
- S11.01.A13. There shall be seven Ministry Teams: 1) Worship, 2) Spirituality, 3) Witness and Service, 4) Youth, Young Adult and Family, 5) Faith Formation, 6) Connection Building, and 7) Leadership Development.
 - It shall be the duty of each Ministry Team to oversee the development of programs which will further the achievement of the purposes established by the Synod Council and the Synod Assembly. The Ministry Teams shall also carry out further tasks that may be assigned by the Synod Council.
 - The Witness and Service Team, in consultation with the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America Congregational and Synodical Mission Unit (CSM), shall be responsible for identification and review of new and renewing ministries in this synod that are supported by CSM grants.
 - The Ministry Teams may appoint task groups as necessary to carry out programs in their areas of concern and shall assure the necessary coordination and communication among these committees.
 - Each Ministry Team shall recommend to the Synod Council an annual budget for that team's area of concern. In preparing this budget recommendation, it will consult with its task groups concerning the needs and plans in each area of its concern. It shall also include in its budget request an amount for new programs that the team will identify and fund during the budget year.
 - The teams shall report regularly and at least annually to the Synod Council and annually to the Synod Assembly.
- S11.01.B13.a. There may be support committees to provide for the other ministry functions of this synod and to assure the availability of resources to meet these needs.

- b. With the exception of the Committee of Deans, the Consultation Committee, and the Committee on Discipline, support committees will be appointed by the Synod Council on nomination by the bishop, and their duties shall be determined by the Synod Council.
- S11.01.C13..a. There shall be a cabinet composed of the bishop and vice president of the Synod, the chairs of the Ministry Teams and the staff persons relating to the Ministry Teams. The function of the Cabinet shall be to provide coordination and communication among the teams.
 - b. The Cabinet shall report to the Synod Council after each Cabinet meeting.
- *S11.02. The Consultation Committee of this synod shall consist of at least six persons and not more than 12 persons, of whom half shall be ministers of Word and Sacrament and half shall be laypersons, who shall each be elected by the Synod Assembly for a term of six years without consecutive reelection. The functions of the Consultation Committee are set forth in Chapter 20 of the Constitution, Bylaws, and Continuing Resolutions of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America and in Chapter 17 of this constitution. The size of the Consultation Committee, in accord with this provision, shall be defined in this synod's bylaws.
- BLS11.02.01 The Consultation Committee of this synod shall consist of six persons.
- *S11.03. The Committee on Discipline of this synod shall consist of 12 persons of whom six shall be ministers of Word and Sacrament and six shall be laypersons, who shall each be elected by the Synod Assembly for a term of six years without consecutive reelection.
 - The functions of the Committee on Discipline of this synod are set forth in Chapter 20 of the Constitution, Bylaws, and Continuing resolutions of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.
 - The Synod Council shall fill vacancies on the Committee on Discipline for any unexpired term.
- *S11.04. The Mutual Ministry Committee shall be appointed by the Executive Committee of the Synod Council to provide support and counsel to the bishop.
- *S11.05. The Audit Committee of this synod shall consist of three to six persons, none of whom is a member of the synod staff. Up to half of the committee members may be Synod Council members. The Audit Committee members shall be elected by the Synod Council for a term of three years and be eligible for re-election to a second consecutive three-year term. The terms of the Audit Committee members shall be staggered. The Audit Committee shall be responsible for assisting the Synod Council in fulfilling its general oversight of the synod's accounting, financial reporting, internal control systems, and external audit processes as provided in *S15.31.
- S11.06. This synod shall have program, support, and coordinating ministry teams, committees, and task forces as designated or provided for in the bylaws or continuing resolutions.
- S11.10. General Provisions
- S11.11. With the exception of ministers on the rosters of this synod who reside outside the territory of this Synod, each member of a committee of this synod, or any other organizational unit created by this synod, shall be a voting member of a congregation of this synod.

member in good standing on a roster of this synod, or ceases to be a voting member of a congregation of this synod, if a layperson, or is absent without excuse from two successive regular meetings, the office filled by such a member shall at once become vacant.

Chapter 12

MISSION DISTRICTS

- *S12.01. This synod may establish conferences, clusters, coalitions, area subdivisions, and networks as appropriate within its territory and in collaboration with other synods and entities, as specified in the bylaws and continuing resolutions. The purpose of such groupings shall be to foster interdependent relationships for missional purposes among congregations, synods, the churchwide organization, and other affiliates.
- BLS12.01.a. This Synod shall be divided into Mission Districts, as follows: Bethlehem-Easton, East Berks, Hazle-ton-Lehighton, Lehigh, Northern Lehigh Valley, Pocono, Schuylkill, Scranton-Wilkes-Barre, and West Berks.
 - b. Mission Districts shall be agents of the Church's mission on their respective territories. They shall study, plan, and implement ministries, challenging all congregations on their territories to participate fully in the life and mission of the Church.
 - c. Requests by individual congregations for assignment to a different Mission District shall be acted upon by the Synod Council.
 - d. Each Mission District shall have an Assembly, which shall meet at least annually.
 - I) The Mission District Assembly shall consist of all rostered ministers under call to congregations and the same number and category of lay representatives as each congregation has to the Synod Assembly. The executive of each Church-affiliated institution or agency on the District territory shall designate two representatives to the Mission District Assembly, one of whom shall be a layperson. The status of "official visitor" shall be given to rostered ministers living on the territory of the Mission District, who are either retired or are engaged in extra-parish service. The Mission District Assembly shall also consist of those persons of a church body with which a relationship of full communion has been declared and established by a Churchwide Assembly of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America who serve a congregation on the Mission District territory.
 - 2) The Mission District Assembly shall elect a dean from among the rostered ministers of Word and Sacrament of the Mission District, a secretary, and such other persons as may be assigned by this synod's constitution and bylaws. They shall serve terms of three years, and shall serve no more than two terms consecutively.
 - 3) The dean shall be elected by ecclesiastical ballot, and a majority of the votes cast shall be necessary for election. If no one is elected on the first ballot, it shall be considered the nominating ballot, and the second ballot shall be limited to the five persons (plus ties) who receive the greatest number of votes on the first ballot. If no one is elected on the second ballot, the third ballot shall be limited to the two persons (plus ties) who receive the greatest number of votes on the second ballot.
 - 4) The secretary of the Mission District shall be elected from nominees proposed either by the Mission District's Nominating Committee or from the floor of the Mission District Assembly, and a majority of the votes cast shall be necessary for election. If no one is elected on the first ballot, the second ballot shall be limited to the two persons (plus ties) who receive the greatest number of votes on the first ballot. This same procedure shall be followed for other elections by the Mission District Assembly.

- 5) The terms of the dean and the secretary of the Mission District shall begin at the close of the Mission District Assembly at which they are elected.
- 6) The Mission District Assembly may adopt an annual program budget for the Mission District. Major alterations from the budget recommended by the Mission District Council shall require approval of the Synod Council.
- e. There shall be a Mission District Council, which shall meet regularly to direct and coordinate the program of the Mission District.
 - I) The Mission District Council shall consist of the dean, the secretary, representatives elected by the Mission District to the Synod Council, plus at least three other persons to be elected by the Mission District Assembly. They shall serve terms of three years, and shall serve no more than two terms consecutively.
 - 2) It shall be the responsibility of the Mission District Council, in consultation with the synod staff person assigned to the Mission District, to coordinate the work of the Mission District, to identify areas of need and concern, to establish priorities for action, and to implement programs approved for action.
 - 3) The Mission District Council shall elect a layperson from among its membership to serve as chair. The chair shall serve a term of one year and may be reelected.
 - 4) The Mission District Council may elect a person to serve as treasurer. The treasurer shall serve a term of one year, and shall serve no more than six consecutive terms.
 - 5) If a vacancy occurs in the office of dean, the Mission District Council, in consultation with the bishop, shall elect an interim dean to serve until the next regular or special Mission District Assembly.
 - 6) The Mission District Council may propose an annual program budget to the Mission District Assembly, after seeking and receiving from the Synod Council approval for the budget.
 - 7) The Mission District Council shall appoint a nominating committee, which shall present nominees to the Mission District Assembly.
 - 8) The Mission District Council may appoint such committees as it deems necessary to carry out the work of the Mission District.
 - The Mission District Council shall report annually to the Synod Council and Synod Assembly on behalf of the Mission District.
 - 10) The secretary of each Mission District shall provide the bishop, and other persons whom the bishop may designate, with copies of all Mission District Assembly and Mission District Council minutes.
- f. The Mission District Council may authorize and oversee such clusters or coalitions of congregations as it deems helpful in carrying out the work of the Mission District.
 - Clusters or coalitions are groups of congregations reflecting close ties with each other because
 of geographic or socioeconomic considerations.
 - 2) The purpose of clusters or coalitions is to carry the work of the Mission District to the local community, to provide mutual support for congregations facing similar challenges, and to bring to the attention of the Mission District unique needs in a local area.
- g. The dean will serve as an advisor to the bishop, and will assist in representing this synod and the Mission District at important events in congregations and communities.

- The dean shall preside at the meetings of the Mission District Assembly.
- 2) The dean will work in conjunction with the synod staff person assigned to the Mission District. The dean may be assigned further responsibilities by the bishop of this synod or by the Synod Council.
- 3) The dean will report annually to the Mission District Assembly.
- h. Mission Districts, through the Mission District Assembly, may adopt bylaws that are not in conflict with the constitution or bylaws of this synod and/or the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. Bylaws adopted by the Mission District shall go into effect following approval by the Synod Council.
- Mission Districts may solicit funds from congregations on their territories only with the approval of the Synod Council.

CONGREGATIONS

- *S13.01. Each congregation, except those certified as congregations of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America by the uniting churches, prior to being listed in the roster of congregations of this synod, shall adopt the *Model Constitution for Congregations* or one acceptable to this synod, that is not in contradiction to the constitution and bylaws of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.
 - a. <u>New Congregations.</u> A congregation newly formed by this church and any congregation seeking recognition and reception by this church shall:
 - 1) Accept the criteria for recognition and reception as a congregation of this church, fulfill the functions of the congregation, and accept the governance provisions as provided in Chapter 9 of the constitution and bylaws of this church.
 - 2) Adopt governing documents that include fully and without alterations the Preamble, Chapter 1, where applicable, and all required provisions of Chapters 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 15, 16, 17, 18, and 19 in the Model Constitution for Congregations consistent with requirements of the constitutions, bylaws, and continuing resolutions of this church. Bylaws and continuing resolutions, appropriate for inclusion in these chapters and not in conflict with these required provisions in the Model Constitution for Congregations, the constitution of this synod, or the Constitution, Bylaws, and Continuing Resolutions of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, may be adopted as described in Chapters 16 and 18 of the Model Constitution for Congregations.
 - 3) Accept the commitments expected of all congregations of this church as stated in *C6.01., *C6.02., and *C6.03. of the *Model Constitution for Congregations*.
 - b. Congregations from another church body. If a congregation is a member of another church body, the leadership of the congregation first should consult with the appropriate authorities of that church body before taking action to leave its current church body. After such consultation, leaders of the congregation should contact the ELCA synod bishop or staff where the congregation is located. The synod bishop or synod staff where the transferring or independent congregation is located shall confer with the congregation to assure its understanding and acceptance of commitment to and affiliation with this church.
 - c. <u>Recognition and reception</u>. Recognition and reception into this church of transferring or independent congregations by the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America is based on the judgment of the synod and action by the synod through the Synod Council and Synod As-

sembly. The synod bishop shall provide for prompt reporting of such additions to the secretary of this church for addition to the roster of congregations.

- *S13.02. It shall be the responsibility of each congregation of this synod to choose from among its voting members laypersons to serve as members of the Synod Assembly as well as persons to represent it at meetings of any conference, cluster, coalition, or other area subdivision of which it is a member. The number of persons to be elected by each congregation and other qualifications shall be as prescribed in guidelines established by this synod.
- S13.11. When a rostered minister resigns a call, the Congregation Council shall receive the letter of resignation, report it to the congregation, and at once notify the bishop of this synod.
- S13.12. A congregation under financial obligation to its former rostered minister shall make satisfactory settlement of the obligation before calling a successor.
- *S13.20. A congregation considering a relocation shall confer with the bishop of the synod in which it is territorially located and the appropriate unit of the churchwide organization before any steps are taken leading to such action. The approval of the Synod Council shall be received before any such action is effected.
- *S13.21. A congregation considering development of an additional site to be used regularly for worship shall confer with the bishop of the synod in which it is territorially located and the appropriate unit of the churchwide organization before any steps are taken leading to such action.
- BLS13.21.The term "pastoral charge" shall mean the basic unit of pastoral care in charge of at least one pastor.

 The word "congregation" shall mean the basic unit into which are organized persons baptized in the faith confessed in the laws of the church. A pastoral charge may include one or more congregations. When a pastoral charge contains only one congregation it may be referred to interchangeably by either term.
- *S13.22. Each congregation of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America within the territory of this synod, except those which are in partnership with the Slovak Zion Synod, shall establish and maintain a relationship with this synod.
- *S13.23. Provision 9.71. of the constitution of this church shall govern the relationship of this synod and a congregation of this synod regarding the property of the congregation. This synod may transfer or convey property to a congregation of the synod, subject to restrictions accepted by the congregation, including provision that if the Synod Council, in its sole and exclusive discretion, determines (1) that the property is not being used to serve the mission and ministry needs of this church, or (2) that the congregation has transferred, encumbered, mortgaged, or in any way burdened or impaired any right, title, or interest in the property without the prior approval of the Synod Council, then title to the property shall revert to the synod, and the congregation, upon written demand, shall reconvey the property to the synod.
- S13.24. The Synod Council, itself or through trustees appointed by it, may take charge and control of the property of a congregation of this synod to hold, manage, and convey the same on behalf of this synod, if any of the following apply:
 - The congregation has disbanded, ceased to worship, or otherwise ceased to exist as a congregation.
 - The congregation has abandoned its property.
 - The remaining members of the congregation decide that it is no longer possible to function as a congregation or that they are unable to provide required governance.
 - The Synod Council determines that the membership of a congregation has become so scattered or so diminished in numbers that it cannot provide required governance or that it has become impractical for the congregation to fulfill the purposes for which it was orga-

nized.

The Synod Council determines that it is necessary for this synod to protect and preserve the congregation's property from waste and deterioration.

The congregation shall have the right to appeal any such decision to the next Synod Assembly.

- S13.25. This synod may temporarily assume administration of a congregation upon its request or with its concurrence.
- S13.30. Discipline
- *S13.31. Congregations and members of congregations are subject to discipline in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 20 of the Constitution, Bylaws, and Continuing Resolutions of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. The synod's involvement in and responsibility for such disciplinary processes shall be as set forth in that chapter.
- BLS13.31.The provisions of the ELCA constitution 20.11. through 20.16., inclusive, and of the ELCA bylaws 20.31.01. through 20.31.05., inclusive, with respect to congregations are incorporated herein by reference. The provisions of the ELCA constitution 20.11. through 20.16., inclusive, and of the ELCA bylaws 20.41.01. through 20.41.05., inclusive, with respect to members of the congregations are incorporated herein by reference.
- \$13.40. Synodically Authorized Worshiping Communities
- S13.41. Authorized worshiping communities, acknowledged under criteria and procedures of the ELCA Division for Outreach and the Church Council of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, shall accept and adhere to the Confession of Faith and Statement of Purpose of this church, shall be served by leadership under the criteria of this church, and shall be subject to the discipline of this church.

Chapter 14

ROSTERED MINISTERS

- *S14.10. Ministers of Word and Sacrament
- *S14.11. The time and place of the ordination of those persons properly called to ministry in this synod shall be authorized by the bishop of this synod.
- *S14.12. Consistent with the faith and practice of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America,
 - a. Every minister of Word and Sacrament shall:
 - 1) preach the Word;
 - 2) administer the Sacraments;
 - 3) conduct public worship;
 - 4) provide pastoral care;
 - 5) seek out and encourage qualified persons to prepare for the ministry of the Gospel;
 - 6) impart knowledge of this church and its wider ministry through available channels of effective communication:
 - 7) witness to the Kingdom of God in the community, in the nation and abroad; and
 - speak publicly to the world in solidarity with the poor and oppressed, calling for justice and proclaiming God's love for the world.

- b. Each pastor with a congregational call shall, within the congregation:
 - 1) offer instruction, confirm, solemnize marriages, visit the sick and distressed, and bury the dead;
 - 2) relate to all schools and organizations of the congregation;
 - 3) install regularly elected members of the Congregation Council;
 - 4) with the council, administer discipline;
 - 5) endeavor to increase the support given by the congregation to the work of the churchwide organization and of this synod; and
 - 6) encourage adherence to covenantal relationship with this church as expressed in the Constitutions, Bylaws, and Continuing Resolutions of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.
- S14.13. The pastor (a) shall keep accurate parochial records of all baptisms, confirmations, marriages, burials, communicants, members received, and members dismissed or members excluded from the congregation, (b) shall submit a summary of such statistics annually to this synod, and (c) shall become a member of the congregation that has extended the letter of call. In a pastoral charge of multiple congregations, the pastor shall hold membership in one of the congregations.
- S14.14. Whenever members of a congregation move to such a distance that regular attendance at its services becomes impractical, it shall be the duty of the pastor to commend them, upon their consent, to the pastoral care of a Lutheran congregation nearer to their place of residence.
- S14.15. Each minister of Word and Sacrament on the roster of this synod shall submit a report of his or her ministry to the bishop of the synod at least 90 days prior to each regular meeting of the Synod Assembly.
- *S14.16. When a congregation of this church desires to call a pastor or a candidate for the ministry of Word and Sacrament of this church:
 - a. Each congregation of this synod shall consult the bishop of this synod before taking any steps leading to the extending of a call to a prospective pastor.
 - b. For issuance of a letter of call to a pastor or candidate by a congregation of this synod in accord with ELCA constitutional provision 7.41. a two thirds vote shall be required of voting members of the congregation present and voting at a meeting regularly called for the purpose of issuing such a call.
 - c. When the congregation has voted to issue a call to a prospective pastor, the letter of call shall be submitted to the bishop of this synod for the bishop's signature.
- BLS14.16.a. At the time of pastoral vacancy, an interim pastor shall be appointed by the bishop with the consent of the Congregation Council or councils of the vacant pastoral charge.
 - b. When a pastoral vacancy occurs, each Congregation Council affected shall immediately notify in writing the bishop of this synod and the dean of the Mission District. The bishop shall call a conference to be attended by the bishop or an appointed deputy, the dean of the Mission District, and the Congregation Council.
 - c. Nominations for the filling of pastoral vacancies must be made to the pastoral call committee of the pastoral charge through and with the approval of the bishop, and without that approval no nominee shall at any time be considered. In the consideration of candidates for the vacancy, names may be suggested to the bishop by the Congregation Council or by the dean of the Mission District.

- d. When the Congregation Council has decided to recommend to the pastoral charge for its call as pastor a particular nominee, duly suggested and approved, an election shall be conducted under the supervision of the bishop or a deputy appointed for the purpose. Balloting shall be limited at any Congregation Meeting to a single nomination, presented by the Congregation Council with at least two-thirds of its members concurring. In multiple-congregation pastoral charges a majority vote in each congregation and a two-thirds majority of the total shall be sufficient to elect.
- S14.17. No minister of Word and Sacrament shall accept a call without first conferring with the bishop of this synod. A minister of Word and Sacrament shall respond with a letter of acceptance or declination to a letter of call within thirty days of receipt of such call. In exceptional circumstances with the approval of the bishop of this synod and the chair of the Congregation Council of the congregation issuing the call, additional time may be granted to respond to a letter of call.
- *S14.18. The provisions for termination of the mutual relationship between a minister of Word and Sacrament and a congregation shall be as follows:
 - a. The call of a congregation, when accepted by a pastor, shall constitute a continuing mutual relationship and commitment which shall be terminated only by the pastor's death or, following consultation with the synod bishop and for the following reasons:
 - I) mutual agreement to terminate the call or the completion of a call for a specific term;
 - 2) resignation of the pastor, which shall become effective, unless otherwise agreed, no later than 30 days after the date on which it was submitted;
 - 3) inability to conduct the pastoral office effectively in that congregation in view of local conditions;
 - 4) physical disability or mental incapacity of the pastor;
 - 5) suspension of the pastor through discipline for more than three months;
 - 6) resignation or removal of the pastor from the roster of ministers of Word and Sacrament of this church;
 - 7) termination of the relationship between this church and the congregation;
 - 8) dissolution of the congregation or the termination of a parish arrangement; or
 - 9) suspension of the congregation through discipline for more than six months.
 - When allegations of physical disability or mental incapacity of the pastor under paragraph a.4) above, or ineffective conduct of the pastoral office under paragraph a.3) above, have come to the attention of the bishop of this synod,
 - the bishop in his or her sole discretion may investigate such conditions personally together with a committee of two rostered ministers and one layperson, or
 - when such allegations have been brought to the synod's attention by an official recital of allegations by the congregation council or by a petition signed by at least one-third of the voting members of the congregation, the bishop personally shall investigate such conditions together with a committee of two rostered ministers and one layperson.
 - c. In case of alleged physical disability or mental incapacity under paragraph a.4) above, the bishop's committee shall obtain and document competent medical opinion concerning the pastor's condition. When a disability or incapacity is evident to the committee, the bishop of this synod may declare the pastorate vacant. When the pastorate is declared vacant, the Synod Council shall list the pastor on the roster of Ministers of Word and Sacrament with disability status. Upon removal of the disability and restoration of the pastor to health, the bishop shall take steps to enable the pastor to resume the ministry, either in the congregation last served or in another appropriate call.

- d. In the case of alleged local difficulties that imperil the effective functioning of the congregation under paragraph a.3) above, the bishop's committee shall endeavor to hear from all concerned persons, after which the bishop together with the committee shall present their recommendations first to the pastor and then to the congregation. The recommendations of the bishop's committee must address whether the pastor's call should come to an end and, if so, may suggest appropriate severance arrangements. The committee may also propose other actions that should be undertaken by the congregation and by the pastor, if appropriate. If the pastor and congregation agree to carry out such recommendations, no further action need be taken by the synod.
- e. If either party fails to assent to the recommendations of the bishop's committee concerning the pastor's call, the congregation may dismiss the pastor only at a legally called meeting after consultation with the bishop, either (a) by a two-thirds vote of the voting members present and voting where the bishop and the committee did not recommend termination of the call, or (b) by a majority vote of the voting members present and voting where the bishop and the committee recommended termination of the call.
- f. If, in the course of proceedings described in paragraph c. or paragraph d. above, the bishop's committee concludes that there may be grounds for disciplinary action, the committee shall make recommendations concerning disciplinary action in accordance with the provisions of this church's constitution, bylaws, and continuing resolutions.
- *S14.19. Ministers of Word and Sacrament shall respect the integrity of the ministry of congregations which they do not serve and shall not exercise ministerial functions therein unless invited to do so by the pastor, or, if there is no duly called pastor, then by the interim pastor in consultation with the Congregation Council.
- *S14.21. The parochial records of all baptisms, confirmations, marriages, burials, communicants, members received, members transferred or dismissed, members who have become inactive, or members excluded from the congregation shall be kept accurately and permanently. They shall remain the property of each congregation. At the time of the closure of a congregation, such records shall be sent to the regional archives. The secretary of the congregation shall attest to the bishop of this synod that such records have been placed in his/her hands in good order by the departing pastor before:
 - a. installation in another call, or
 - b. approval of a request for change in roster status.
- *S14.22. The pastor shall make satisfactory settlement of all financial obligations to a former congregation before:
 - a. installation in another call, or
 - b. approval of a request for change in roster status.
- *S14.23. During service to a congregation, an interim pastor shall have the rights and duties in the congregation of a regularly called pastor. The interim pastor may delegate the same in part to an interim supply pastor with the consent of the bishop of this synod. The interim pastor and any rostered minister who may assist shall refrain from exerting influence in the selection of a pastor. Upon completion of service, the interim pastor shall certify to the bishop of this synod that the parochial records, for the period for which the interim pastor was responsible, are in order.
- *S14.24. With the approval of the synod bishop expressed in writing, which sets forth a clear statement of the purpose to be served by such a departure from the normal rule of permanency of the call as expressed in *S14.18., a congregation may call a pastor for a specific term. Details of such calls shall be in writing setting forth the purpose and conditions involved. Prior to the completion of a term, the bishop of this synod or a representative of the bishop shall meet with the pastor and representatives of the congregation for a review of the call. Such call may also be terminated before its expiration in accordance with the provisions of *S14.18.

- S14.25. All ministers of Word and Sacrament under a call shall attend meetings of the Synod Assembly, and pastors of congregations shall also attend meetings of the Mission District to which the congregation belongs.
- *S14.30. Ministers of Word and Service
- *S14.31. The time and place of the ordination of those persons properly called to ministry in this synod shall be authorized by the bishop of this synod.
- *S14.32. Consistent with the faith and practice of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, every Minister of Word and Service shall:
 - a. Be rooted in the Word of God, for proclamation and service;
 - b. Advocate a prophetic diakonia that commits itself to risk-taking and innovative service on the frontiers of the Church's outreach, giving particular attention to the suffering places in God's world:
 - c. Speak publicly to the world in solidarity with the poor and oppressed, calling for justice and proclaiming God's love for the world, witnessing to the realm of God in the community, the nation, and abroad:
 - d. Equip the baptized for ministry in God's world that affirms the gifts of all people;
 - e. Encourage mutual relationships that invite participation and accompaniment of others in God's mission;
 - f. Practice stewardship that respects God's gift of time, talents, and resources;
 - g. Be grounded in a gathered community for ongoing diaconal formation;
 - h. Share knowledge of this church and its wider ministry of the gospel, and advocate for the work of all expressions of this church; and
 - i. Identify and encourage qualified persons to prepare for ministry of the gospel.
- S14.33. The minister of Word and Service shall become a member of the congregation upon receipt and acceptance of the letter of call. In a parish of multiple congregations, the minister of Word and Service shall hold membership in one of the congregations.
- S14.34. Each minister of Word and Service on the roster of this synod shall submit a report of his or her ministry to the bishop of the synod at least 90 days prior to each regular meeting of the Synod Assembly.
- *S14.41. When a congregation of this church desires to call a minister of Word and Service or a candidate for the ministry of Word and Service of this church:
 - a. Each congregation of this synod shall consult the bishop of this synod before taking any steps leading to the extending of a call to a prospective minister of Word and Service.
 - b. For issuance of a letter of call to a minister of Word and Service or candidate by a congregation of this synod in accord with ELCA constitutional provision 7.71., a two-thirds vote shall be required of members of the congregation present and voting at a meeting regularly called for the purpose of issuing such a call.
 - c. When the congregation has voted to issue a call to a prospective minister of Word and Service, the letter of call shall be submitted to the bishop of this synod for the bishop's signature.
- S14.42. No minister of Word and Service shall accept a call without first conferring with the bishop of this synod. A minister of Word and Service shall respond with an answer of acceptance or declination to a letter of call within 30 days of receipt of such call. In exceptional circumstances with the approval of the bishop of this synod and the chair of the Congregation Council of the congregation issuing the call, an additional 15 days may be granted to respond to a letter of call.

- *S14.43. The provisions for termination of the mutual relationship between a minister of Word and Service and a congregation shall be as follows:
 - a. The call of a congregation, when accepted by a minister of Word and Service, shall constitute a continuing mutual relationship and commitment which shall be terminated only by the deacon's death or, following consultation with the synod bishop, for the following reasons:
 - 1) mutual agreement to terminate the call or the completion of a call for a specific term;
 - 2) resignation of the minister of Word and Service, which shall become effective, unless otherwise agreed, no later than 30 days after the date on which it was submitted;
 - 3) inability to conduct the office effectively in that congregation in view of local conditions;
 - 4) physical disability or mental incapacity of the minister of Word and Service;
 - 5) suspension of the minister of Word and Service through discipline for more than three months;
 - 6) resignation or removal of the minister of Word and Service from the roster of Ministers of Word and Service of this church;
 - 7) termination of the relationship between this church and the congregation;
 - 8) dissolution of the congregation or the termination of a parish arrangement; or
 - 9) suspension of the congregation through discipline for more than six months.
 - When allegations of physical disability or mental incapacity of the minister of Word and Service under paragraph a.4) above, or ineffective conduct of the ministry of Word and Service under paragraph a.3) above, have come to the attention of the bishop of this synod,
 - 1) the bishop in his or her sole discretion may investigate such conditions personally together with a committee of two rostered ministers and one layperson, or
 - 2) when such allegations have been brought to the synod's attention by an official recital of allegations by the Congregation Council or by a petition signed by at least one-third of the voting members of the congregation, the bishop personally shall investigate such conditions together with a committee of two rostered ministers and one layperson.
 - c. In case of alleged physical disability or mental incapacity under paragraph a.4) above, the bishop's committee shall obtain and document competent medical opinion concerning the minister of Word and Service's condition. When a disability or incapacity is evident to the committee, the bishop of this synod may declare the position vacant. When the position is declared vacant, the Synod Council shall list the deacon on the roster of Ministers of Word and Service with disability status. Upon removal of the disability and restoration of the minister of Word and Service to health, the bishop shall take steps to enable the minister of Word and Service to resume the ministry, either in the congregation last served or in another appropriate call.
 - d. In the case of alleged local difficulties that imperil the effective functioning of the congregation under paragraph a.3) above, the bishop's committee shall endeavor to hear from all concerned persons, after which the bishop together with the committee shall present their recommendations first to the minister of Word and Service and then to the congregation. The recommendations of the bishop's committee address whether the minister of Word and Service's call should come to an end and, if so, may suggest appropriate severance arrangements. The committee may also propose other actions that should be undertaken by the congregation and by the minister of Word and Service, if appropriate. If the minister of Word and Service and congregation agree to carry out such recommendations, no further action need be taken by the synod.
 - e. If either party fails to assent to the recommendations of the bishop's committee concerning the minister of Word and Service's call, the congregation may dismiss the minister of Word and Service only at a legally called meeting after consultation with the bishop, either (a) by a two-thirds vote of the voting members present and voting where the bishop and the committee did not recommend termination of the call, or (b) by a majority vote of the voting members present and voting where the bishop and the committee recommended termination of the call.
 - f. If, in the course of proceedings described in paragraph c. or paragraph d. above, the bishop's committee concludes that there may be grounds for disciplinary action, the committee shall make recommendations concerning disciplinary action in accordance with the provisions of this church's constitution, bylaws, and continuing resolutions.

- * S14.44. Ministers of Word and Service shall respect the integrity of the ministry of congregations which they do not serve and shall not exercise ministerial functions therein unless invited to do so by the Congregation Council.
- *S14.45. The minister of Word and Service shall make satisfactory settlement of all financial obligations to a former congregation before:
 - a. installation in another call, or
 - b. approval of a request for change in roster status.
- *S14.46. With the approval of the synod bishop expressed in writing, which sets forth a clear statement of the purpose to be served by such a departure from the normal rule of permanency of the call as expressed in *S14.43., a congregation may call a minister of Word and Service for a specific term. Details of such calls shall be in writing setting forth the purpose and conditions involved. Prior to the completion of a term, the bishop of this synod or a representative of the bishop shall meet with the minister of Word and Service and representatives of the congregation for a review of the call. Such call may also be terminated before its expiration in accordance with the provisions of *S14.43.
- S14.47. All ministers of Word and Service under a call shall attend meetings of the Synod Assembly, and the ministers of Word and Service of congregations shall also attend the meetings of the conference, cluster, coalition, or other area subdivision to which the congregation belongs.

FINANCIAL MATTERS

- *S15.01. The fiscal year of this synod shall be February 1 through January 31.
- *S15.11. Since the congregations, synods, and churchwide organization are interdependent expressions that share in God's mission, all share in the responsibility to develop, implement, and strengthen the financial support of the whole church. The gifts and offerings of the members of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America are given to support all parts of this church, the unity of this church should be evidenced in determining each part's share of the gifts and offerings. Therefore:
 - a. The mission of this church beyond the congregation is to be supported by such a proportionate share of each congregation's annual budget as each congregation determines. This synod shall develop guidelines for determining "proportionate share," and shall consult with congregational leaders to assist each congregation in making its determination.
 - b. This synod shall receive the proportionate share of the mission support from its congregations, and shall transmit that percentage or amount of each congregation's mission support as determined in consultation with the churchwide organization and approved by the Synod Assembly as part of its budget consideration.
 - c. Should the Synod Assembly not approve the proportionate share of mission support determined in consultation with the churchwide organization, a new consultation with the churchwide organization shall take place. The Synod Council is authorized to amend the budget adopted by the Synod Assembly to reflect the results of this consultation.
- *S15.12. The annual budget of this synod shall reflect the entire range of its own activities and its commitment to supportive funding with other synods and the churchwide organization.
- S15.13. On the basis of estimated income, the Synod Council shall authorize expenditures within the budget for the fiscal year. Expenditure authorizations shall be subject to revision, in light of

changing conditions, by the Synod Council.

- S15.14. Except when such procedure would jeopardize current operations, a reserve amounting to no more than 16% of the sum of the amounts scheduled in the next year's budget for regular distribution to synod causes shall be carried forward annually for disbursement in the following year in the interest of making possible a more even flow of income to such causes. The exact number of dollars to be held in reserve shall be determined by the Synod Council.
- S15.21. No appeal to congregations of this or any other synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America for the raising of funds shall be conducted by congregations or organizations related to or affiliated with this synod without the consent of the Synod Assembly or the Synod Council.
- *S15.31. This synod shall arrange to have an annual audit of its financial records conducted by a certified public accountant firm recommended by the synod Audit Committee and approved by the Synod Council. The audited annual financial report shall be submitted by this synod to the churchwide Office of the Treasurer and to the congregations of this synod. The financial reports shall be in the format approved from time to time by the churchwide Office of the Treasurer.
- *S15.32. This synod shall maintain adequate, continuous insurance coverage in accordance with standards recommended by the churchwide organization. Insurance programs offered or endorsed by the churchwide organization shall be deemed to fulfill this obligation.

Chapter 16

INDEMNIFICATION

- *S16.01. Subject to the limitations and duties imposed by law, each person who is or was made or threatened to be made a party to any proceeding by reason of the present or former capacity of that person as a Synod Council member, officer, employee, or committee member of this synod shall be indemnified against all costs and expenses incurred by that person in connection with the proceeding. Indemnification of any person by reason of that person's capacity as a director, officer, employee, or committee member of any other organization, regardless of its form or relationship to this synod, is subject to the provisions of section *S16.02.
 - a. The term "proceeding" means a threatened, pending, or completed lawsuit, whether civil or criminal, an administrative or investigative matter, arbitration, mediation, alternative dispute resolution, or any other similar legal or governmental action. Except as otherwise required by law, the term "proceeding" does not include (a) any action by this synod against the individual seeking indemnification, or (b) subject to *16.04., a disciplinary hearing or related process described in Chapter 20 of the Constitution, Bylaws, and Continuing Resolutions of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.
 - b. The term "indemnification" includes reimbursement and advances of costs and expenses for judgments, penalties, fines, settlements, excise taxes, reasonable attorneys' fees, disbursements, and similar required expenditures.
- *S16.02. Whenever a person who, while a Synod Council member, officer, committee member, or employee of this synod, is or was serving at the request of this synod as (or whose duties in that position involve or involved service in the capacity of) a director, officer, partner, trustee, employee, or agent of another organization, is or was made or threatened to be made a party to a proceeding by reason of such capacity, then such person shall be entitled to indemnification only if (a) the Synod Council has established a process for determining whether a person serving in the capacity described in this section shall be entitled to indemnification in any specific case, and (b) that process has been applied in making a specific determination that such person is entitled to indemnification.

- *S16.03. This synod may purchase and maintain insurance on behalf of itself or any person entitled to indemnification pursuant to this chapter against any liability asserted against and incurred by this synod or by such other person in or arising from a capacity described in section *S16.01. or section *S16.02.
- *S16.04. When written charges against a rostered minister of this church are made in disciplinary proceedings under Chapter 20 of the Constitution, Bylaws, and Continuing Resolutions of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America by the synod bishop or when written charges against a congregation are made in disciplinary proceedings by the Synod Council or the synod bishop, and the discipline hearing committee determines that no discipline shall be imposed, then if such determination is not reversed or set aside on appeal, indemnification shall be made by the synod to the accused for reasonable attorney's fees and other reasonable expenses related to the defense of the charges. The determination of the reasonableness of such fees and expenses shall be decided by the Synod Council.

CONSULTATION AND ADJUDICATION

- *S17.01. The synod bishop and the Executive Committee of the Synod Council shall be available to give counsel when disputes arise within this synod.
- *S17.02. The synod bishop and the Executive Committee of the Synod Council shall receive expressions of concern from rostered ministers of this church, congregations, and organizations within this synod; provide a forum in which the parties concerned can seek to work out matters causing distress or conflict; and make appropriate recommendations for their resolution. When a concern relates directly to the synod bishop, the synod vice president will lead the Executive Committee's efforts at resolving the matter. When the matter at issue cannot be resolved in this manner, applicable procedures for investigation, decision, appeal, and adjudication shall be followed. Allegations or charges that could lead to the discipline of a rostered minister of this church shall not be addressed by the Executive Committee but shall be resolved through the disciplinary process set forth in the Constitution, Bylaws, and Continuing Resolutions of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.
- *S17.03. When there is disagreement between or among congregations of this synod on a substantive issue that cannot be resolved by the parties, the council of an affected congregation may petition the synod bishop for a consultation after informing the other affected congregation(s) of its intent to do so. If this consultation fails to resolve the issue, the bishop shall refer the matter to the Consultation Committee of the synod, which shall undertake efforts to find an appropriate solution. If the Consultation Committee's efforts fail to resolve the issue(s), the entire matter shall be referred to the Synod Council for adjudication by whatever process the council deems necessary. The decision of the Synod Council shall be final.
- *S17.04. When conferences, clusters, coalitions, or area subdivisions of this synod have a disagreement on a substantive issue that they cannot resolve, the aggrieved party or parties may petition the synod bishop and the Executive Committee of the Synod Council requesting a consultation after informing the other affected parties of their intent to do so. In this case the decision of the Executive Committee shall prevail, except that, upon the motion of a member of the Synod Council, the decision shall be referred to the Synod Council for final action.
- *S17.10. Adjudication in a Congregation
- *S17.11. When there is disagreement between or among factions within a congregation on a substantive issue which cannot be resolved by the parties, members of the congregation may petition the synod bishop for consultation after informing the president of the Congregation Council of their intent to do so. The synod bishop shall seek a timely resolution of the dispute. If the issue relates directly to the pastor, the bishop may begin the process in *S14.18.d. In all other matters, if the bishop's consultation fails to resolve the issue, the bishop shall refer the matter to the Consultation Committee of the synod, which shall undertake efforts to find an appropriate solution. If the Consultation Committee's efforts fail to resolve the dispute, the entire matter shall be referred to the Synod Council for adjudication by whatever process the council deems necessary. The Synod Council's decision shall be final.

AMENDMENTS, BYLAWS, AND CONTINUING RESOLUTIONS

*S18.10. Amendments to Constitution

- *S18.11. Certain sections of this constitution incorporate and record therein required provisions of the constitution and bylaws of this church. If such provisions are amended by the Churchwide Assembly, corresponding amendments shall be introduced at once into this constitution by the secretary of this synod upon receipt of formal certification thereof from the secretary of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.
- *S18.12. Whenever the secretary of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America officially informs this Synod that the Churchwide Assembly has amended the Constitution for Synods, this constitution may be amended to reflect any such amendment by a majority vote at any subsequent meeting of the Synod Assembly without presentation at a prior Synod Assembly. An amendment that is identical to a provision of the Constitution for Synods shall be deemed to have been ratified upon its adoption by this synod. The Church Council, through the secretary of this church, shall be given prompt notification of its adoption.
- *S18.13. Other amendments to this constitution may be adopted by this synod through either of the following procedures:
 - a. Introduced with the support of at least 25 voting members and having been approved by a two-thirds vote of the voting members present and voting at a regular meeting of the Synod Assembly, an amendment may be adopted unchanged by a two-thirds vote at the next regular meeting of the Synod Assembly.
 - b. The Synod Council may propose an amendment, with notice to be sent to the congregations of this synod at least six months prior to the next regular meeting of the Synod Assembly. Such an amendment shall require for adoption a two-thirds vote of the voting members present and voting at such a regular meeting of the Synod Assembly.
 - All such amendments shall become effective upon ratification by the Churchwide Assembly or by the Church Council.

*S18.20. Amendments to Bylaws

*S18.21. This synod may adopt Bylaws not in conflict with this constitution nor with the constitution and bylaws of the churchwide organization. This synod may amend its bylaws at any meeting of the Synod Assembly by a two-thirds vote of voting members of the assembly present and voting. Newly adopted bylaws and amendments to existing bylaws shall be reported to the secretary of this church.

*S18.30. Amendments to Continuing Resolutions

*S18.31. This synod may adopt continuing resolutions not in conflict with this constitution or its bylaws or the constitution, bylaws, and continuing resolutions of the churchwide organization. Such continuing resolutions may be adopted or amended by a majority vote of the Synod Assembly or by a two-thirds vote of the Synod Council. Newly adopted continuing resolutions and amendments to existing continuing resolutions shall be reported to the secretary of this church.

CONTINUING RESOLUTIONS and OTHER RESOLUTIONS OF ONGOING IMPACT

Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod, ELCA

CONTINUING RESOLUTIONS

- S9.01.A08. The Synod Council Executive Committee shall provide for background checks for persons nominated for synodical office prior to the Synod Assembly at which the election will take place or as soon as possible after the Synod Assembly for newly elected officers nominated from the floor who were not identified as nominees prior to the assembly. The process shall be as follows:
 - a. Prior to the Synod Assembly appropriate notice of the background check requirement and protocol will be provided to voting members, potential nominees, and others as directed by the Synod Council.
 - b. Nominees and newly elected officers are required to provide written consent to a background check and all information necessary to complete a background check, which should be completed prior to the Synod Assembly with respect to nominees and prior to installation for newly elected officers, if possible.
 - c. The Synod Council's Executive Committee shall designate one Executive Committee or Synod Council member to obtain the background checks.
 - d. All background checks for nominees and newly elected officers will entail a criminal background check. A financial background check will be completed for nominees for treasurer. The Executive Committee shall decide whether additional types of background checks are appropriate for each officer position.
 - e. The background check results shall be provided to that nominee or elected officer and to the Synod Council's Executive Committee, which shall then take action as deemed appropriate. Further disclosure of the results may be determined by the Executive Committee.
 - f. The Executive Committee may adopt other procedures or protocols as are necessary to provide for background checks for nominees and newly elected synodical officers and shall report such actions to the Synod Council.

S11.01.A13. There shall be seven Ministry Teams: 1) Worship, 2) Spirituality, 3) Witness and Service, 4) Youth, Young Adult, and Family, 5) Faith Formation, 6) Connection Building, and 7) Leadership Development.

- a. It shall be the duty of each Ministry Team to oversee the development of programs which will further the achievement of the purposes established by the Synod Council and the Synod Assembly. The Ministry Teams shall also carry out further tasks that may be assigned by the Synod Council.
 - 1. The Witness and Service Team, in consultation with the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America Congregational and Synodical Mission Unit (CSM), shall be responsible for identification and review of new and renewing ministries in this Synod that are supported by CSM grants.
- b. The Ministry Teams may appoint task groups as necessary to carry out programs in their areas of concern and shall assure the necessary coordination and communication among these committees.
- c. Each Ministry Team shall recommend to the Synod Council an annual budget for that Team's area of concern. In preparing this budget recommendation, it will consult with its task groups concerning the needs and plans in each area of its concern. It shall also

- include in its budget request an amount for new programs that the Team will identify and fund during the budget year.
- d. The Teams shall report regularly and at least annually to the Synod Council and annually to the Synod Assembly.
- S11.01.B13.a. There may be support committees to provide for the other ministry functions of this Synod and to assure the availability of resources to meet these needs.
 - b. With the exception of the Committee of Deans, the Consultation Committee, and the Committee on Discipline, support committees will be appointed by the Synod Council on nomination by the Bishop, and their duties shall be determined by the Synod Council.
- S11.01.C13.a. There shall be a Cabinet composed of the Bishop and Vice President of the Synod, the chairs of the Ministry Teams and the staff persons relating to the Ministry Teams. The function of the Cabinet shall be to provide coordination and communication among the Teams.
 - b. The Cabinet shall report to the Synod Council after each Cabinet meeting.

OTHER RESOLUTIONS OF ONGOING IMPACT

CHAPTER I - Synod Policy, Officers, Elections, Leadership

- 1. This synod may adopt continuing resolutions by action of the Synod Assembly or by action of the Synod Council (S18.31). The assembly or council may also adopt other resolutions that have an ongoing impact on the life of the synod. All of these resolutions shall be included in the synod's list of Continuing Resolutions and Other Resolutions with Ongoing Impact until action is taken to rescind them.
- 2. All Continuing Resolutions and Other Resolutions with Ongoing Impact then in force shall be published immediately following the Constitution and Bylaws as part of the minutes of each annual Synod Assembly. Included with each continuing resolution and other resolution with ongoing impact shall be notice of the year in which it was adopted and by which governing authority.
- 3. The responses of the ELCA Churchwide Assembly or of the Church Council of the ELCA to memorials initiated in this synod shall be reported to the next Synod Assembly through the report of the Synod Council.
- 4. In keeping with Chapter 6 of its constitution, this synod is committed to encountering and sharing God's word of love given in Jesus Christ and to encouraging all people to engage in lives of service. To accomplish these goals, the synod's strategic directions are as follows:
- Deepen the spiritual lives of people to help them see God at work and help others see that too.
- Build a network that uses our gifts, skills, and resources to maximize what we can do together and strengthen congregations in their ministry.
- Develop leaders, both lay and ordained, who are equipped and engaged in God's mission in daily life.
- Enhance lives of service to deal with social needs and issues that arise in local communities or across the synod.
- Strengthen the work being done with children, youth, and families to support ministries as they engage their communities.
- 5. Those who serve on the bishop's executive staff shall be required to complete the Child Abuse History Check and the PA State Police Criminal Record Check every 36 months, as

required by law; and the Criminal Record Check shall be required of support staff as well, with the synod paying the cost.

- 6. Prior to the assembly at which a bishop of the synod is to be elected, the Synod Council shall appoint a task force to ascertain and define the needs, concerns, and priorities of the synod. The report of the Synod Council or appointed task force shall be disseminated prior to the spring mission district assemblies. Following the report of the second ballot for the office of bishop, a period of not less than three (3) hours shall be set aside for the purpose of the discussion of issues, mission district caucuses, presentations by the nominees, and prayer.
- 7. Service of an unexpired term, or a partial term, of two years or more in duration, shall count as a full term in determining eligibility for any election or appointment which is subject to limitation of terms.
- 8. At least one youth below the age of 21 shall be included in each of the lay male and lay female categories on the ballot for voting members of the ELCA churchwide assemblies.
- 9. Voting members, congregations, mission districts, and ministry teams presenting issues to the Committee of Reference and Counsel shall be urged to submit these issues in writing at least 45 days prior to the assembly. The Committee of Reference and Counsel is urged to mail a report of its recommended actions on those issues to voting members at least 30 days prior to the assembly.
- 10. Resolutions received by the Committee of Reference and Counsel less than two weeks before the opening of the Synod Assembly will be brought before the assembly to decide whether or not they should be considered. Such resolutions will be considered only if the assembly votes by a simple majority to consider them.
- 11. A missionary serving under a call from the Global Missions Program Unit who is unable to attend assemblies of the synod shall be regarded by the Committee on Registration and Excuse as excused.
- 12. It is the policy of this synod that display space and forum time at synod assemblies are available only to
 - a. congregations, mission districts, ministry teams, committees, task forces and teams of the synod;
 - b. those agencies and institutions which are a direct outreach ministry of the ELCA and/or the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod, ELCA educational institutions or those of our full communion partners, and the Pennsylvania Council of Churches;
 - c. Lutheran fraternal benefit societies; and
 - d. 1517 Media, which is the only group with permission to sell goods or services.

Other church-related groups and individuals may apply to the Synod Council for a one-time exception to the policy on displays or forums at an assembly. The decision of the council is final.

- 13. The following guidelines will apply to all displays and forums:
 - a. Displays and forums are to be related to the ELCA and the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod or their ministries.
 - b. Personal attacks and defamation are prohibited. In presenting a point of view, civil and respectful language must be used.
 - c. Displays and forums are not to promote ideas or activities in opposition to provisions of the ELCA, Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod, or congregational constitutions.

- 14. The synod calls upon each member of the synod to exercise his or her own political responsibility, as his or her own faith and conscience demand, including learning how to be involved in the political decision-making process
- 15. The synodical bishop may, at his or her discretion, provide legal assistance and/or bail for pastors and members of congregations who, for reason of Christian concern for human rights and eschewing violence, are subject to arrest and/or incarceration.
- 16. Recognizing the variety of opinions within this synod with regard to matters of human sexuality and same-gender relationships, the synod asks its rostered leaders, congregations, and social ministry organizations to commit themselves to the action of the 2009 ELCA Churchwide Assembly "to bear one another's burdens, love the neighbor, and respect the bound consciences of all" for the sake of the unity of this church.
- 17. The synod asks its rostered leaders, congregations, and social ministry organizations to commit themselves to live in ways that preserve and protect God's creation, utilizing the information and assistance that is available through ELCA ministries that support the care of creation.
- 18. The synod encourages its rostered leaders, congregations, and social ministry organizations to enter into partnerships to address the prevention of bullying, harassment, and related forms of violence.

CHAPTER II – Financial Matters

- 1. The Synod Council shall seek at least two bids for any project costing more than \$5,000.
- 2. The investment philosophy of the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod shall be follows:
 - a. Investment in the ELCA Mission Investment Fund shall be continued. The amount of the commitment shall be reviewed annually by the Finance Committee of the Synod Council.
 - b. Pennsylvania's Prudent Investor Rule shall apply. Exceptions may be authorized by the Synod Council.
 - c. Investment decisions shall reflect the social concerns and policy statements of the synod and the ELCA.
- 3. The "Declaration of Trust" here following shall be the synod's *Church Loan Development Fund*. All assets currently held in the Church Loan Development Fund, including income earned on these assets, will be used to provide loans to congregations and to assist in the purchase or improvement or capital repair of real estate and to assist mission congregations. A representative of the Synod's Witness and Service Ministry Team shall meet with the congregation to discuss their needs and appropriateness of a loan from these funds and to recommend terms to be reviewed and approved by the Finance Committee before submission to Synod Council for authorization. The amount of any loan should not exceed 15% of the assets of the fund, including principal balances on other outstanding loans, as determined at the time of the loan. The interest rate shall be zero for new mission congregations up to 1% below the Federal Reserve prime rate for all other loans. Each loan is to be secured by a judgment note or real estate mortgage maturing in not more than seven years.
- 4. Any bequest to the synod, to any of its program units, or to any cause administered by the synod, shall be applied to a synod endowment fund unless otherwise designated by the terms of the bequest.
- 5. Except where the donor specifies otherwise, a bequest naming the Eastern Pennsylvania Synod or the Lutheran Ministerium of Pennsylvania shall be allocated to the Southeastern Pennsylvania shall be allocated to the Southeast

- sylvania Synod, ELCA, or the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod, ELCA, according to the place of probate of the person's will, subject to these further rules:
- a. Should the decedent be a resident of neither synod, the allocation shall be made to the synod in which the person last resided.
- b. Should a case arise which is not covered by the foregoing rules or in which their literal application would frustrate the probable intent of the decedent, the officers of the two synods shall resolve the matter according to their best judgment of the probable intent.
- 6. The treasurer shall be authorized to place earned income that has not otherwise been designated for spending into a common fund (currently the Prosser, Pahse, Mission Fund) to be used for special projects or for synod budget items as designated from time to time by the Synod Council. Should an emergency arise between meetings of the Synod Council, the treasurer shall be authorized to expend up to \$5,000 from the fund upon unanimous consent of the other officers and the chairperson of the Finance Committee.
- 7. The assets from dissolving congregations, including the proceeds from selling their real estate holdings, shall be added to the Prosser, Pahse, Mission Fund with the exception that the Synod Council may entertain requests by the congregation councils of dissolving congregations that a portion of their assets be directed to other specific benevolent causes related to the ministries of the Synod and the ELCA.
- 8. The Synod Council shall set an annual spending policy for the Prosser, Pahse, Mission Fund, the Student Education Fund, the Leadership Development Fund, and the Social Ministry Fund based on the percentages of the funds' average asset values over the previous five-year period.
- 9. All income and appreciation from the Clyde Kelchner II Fund (the corpus of which represents the original bequest) shall be deposited in the Clyde Kelchner I Fund. The Finance Committee shall establish a spending proposal each year based on a percentage of the three-year rolling average of the sum of the two funds. The Lutheran Theological Seminary at Philadelphia or its successor shall be advised each year after the audit what amount will be available for scholarships in the forthcoming year.
- 10. To ensure the participation of the synod bishop in the annual ELCA Bishop's Academy, each year the bishop shall contribute up to \$500 from his or her continuing education funds toward the Academy expenses. Any expense above \$500 will be charged to the staff travel budget line in the synod's spending plan.
- 11. When studies are requested in this synod, the request shall be accompanied by an estimate of the cost and a recommendation regarding the source of the funds needed to conduct the study.

CHAPTER III – ELCA/Synod Related Organizations, Committees, Ministry Teams

- 1. The Constitution Committee shall review annually the Continuing Resolutions and Other Resolutions with Ongoing Impact and recommend to the Synod Assembly the repeal or replacement of any resolutions that the committee deems no longer applicable to the life of the synod.
- 2. The Leadership Development Ministry Team shall annually determine and publish guidelines for minimum base salaries for clergy and other rostered leaders.
- 3. It is the goal of this synod that at least 10% of the membership of the Synod Assembly, councils, ministry teams, and other organizational units be persons of color and/or persons whose primary language is other than English.

- 4. The leaders of the synod shall promote youth activity in synodical functions, including membership in the synod's ministry teams and organizations.
- 5. The following expectations shall inform the synod's ongoing relationship with the ELCA's social ministry organizations on its territory:
 - a. The synod shall provide moral and financial support to the ELCA agencies and institutions on its territory.
 - b. The social ministry organizations shall seek to coordinate their programs and ministry with the total ministry of the church on this territory.
 - c. The social ministry organizations shall report annually to the Synod Assembly.
 - d. The social ministry organizations shall seek the approval of the synod prior to any financial appeals among the congregations of the synod.
 - e. The social ministry organizations shall consult with the bishop of the synod concerning the employment of any rostered person whose call shall be issued by the Synod Council.
- 6. This synod shall be a member of the Pennsylvania Council of Churches. The bishop shall be authorized to appoint the required representatives.
- 7. The Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod of the ELCA recognizes Muhlenberg College as an ELCA church-related educational institution and affirms and supports its ministry as integral to the ministry of this synod. Further, the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod calls upon its members to support Muhlenberg College with their prayers and gifts.
- 8. The Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod recognizes the Good Shepherd Home Rehabilitation Network, Diakon Lutheran Social Ministries, and Lutheran Congregational Services as social ministry organizations affiliated with the ELCA. Further, the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod affirms the caring ministry of these agencies and institutions and calls upon its members to support that ministry through their prayers and gifts.
- 9. The Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod of the ELCA authorizes its participation as the corporate member of the Good Shepherd Rehabilitation Network.
- 10. Specialized ministries of the synod, the ELCA, or its partners that request to do so shall be given the opportunity to share their stories with the Synod Assembly in a brief manner.
- 11. The synod, its members, congregations, and related institutions are urged to consider 1517 Media resources as a source for worship, educational, and other church supplies.
- 12. The Lutheran Archives Center in Philadelphia shall be allowed to contact potential donors (congregations and individuals) for donations. All such contacts shall be in the form of a targeted appeal for assistance, not a general solicitation
- 13. A special offering to benefit the ELCA's World Hunger Appeal shall be received at the annual Synod Assembly.

CHAPTER IV – Judicatories and Ecumenical Partners

1. The synod is committed to working together with judicatories and congregations of the ELCA's ecumenical partners, wherever possible, in order to avoid unnecessary duplication, gain strength in shared resources, provide more effective ministry, and gain visible expression

to the unity we have in Christ, and to that end we will strive faithfully to

- a. engage in mutual prayer for the life and ministry of our respective judicatories and to encourage our congregations in every community to pray for each other;
- b. encourage and support congregations in like spirit to form covenant relationships on a local level by which they commit themselves to common worship, study, and mission;
- c. provide opportunities on judicatory levels for God's people to worship, study and do mission together, deepening our understanding of historical and theological traditions;
- d. encourage committees, task forces, agencies, and institutions of our judicatories with similar ministry concerns to provide for liaisons from the respective denominations and to share with these people all committee or task force communications;
- e. invite official observers to all the conventions, assemblies, and meetings of our governing boards;
- f. encourage a continued close working relationship between the bishops, executives, staff, and ecumenical committees of our judicatories;
- g. consider joint use of physical facilities; and
- h. review periodically our commitments to one another.

CHAPTER V – Congregations, Mission Districts, Clusters

- 1. The synod is a "Book of Faith" synod, committing us to live in and from the Word of God in all our meetings, assemblies, and events. To do so, we regularly and increasingly hear, read, study, share, and are engaged by God's Word. The bishop of our synod, who "as its pastor, shall be a teacher of the faith of this church and shall provide leadership for the life and witness of this church," shall lead this initiative personally and through collaborative programmatic work with congregations of the synod. We celebrate and continue to support and strengthen those places where Scripture is already taught and engaged. We encourage all congregations to explore new opportunities for engaging the Bible, send members to synodical events for training as Bible study leaders, and include biblical study as an integral part of all meetings and groups in order to become more fluent in the first language of faith the language of scripture that we might live into our calling as a people renewed, enlivened, empowered, and sent by the Word.
- 2. Each congregation on the roster of the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod is urged to adopt a constitution based on the latest edition of the ELCA's Model Constitution for Congregations.
- 3. Congregations of the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod are urged to commit themselves to the following:
 - Pray for the renewal of this church.
 - Prepare and renew evangelical leaders.
 - Teach discipleship.
 - Start and renew congregations.
- 4. Congregations of this synod are called upon to
 - lift up in prayer all those living in poverty and struggling for dignity;
 - use ELCA study resources pertaining to these issues, including relevant social statements and messages; and
 - exercise responsible consumerism as a way to live out our commitment to justice

- 5. The synod urges its congregations and rostered leaders to affiliate with and actively support their local ministeriums and regional or county conferences of churches.
- 6. Each congregation council shall submit a report annually to the bishop regarding compensation of rostered leaders, paying particular attention to the section related to steps that will be taken to raise compensation to minimum levels if they are not currently being met. The bishop and his/her associates shall consult with congregation councils where minimums are not being met. Consultation will automatically occur after the filing of the annual "Report for Ordained Minister Under Call From A Congregation" or the "Report for Associate in Ministry Under Call From A Congregation." All consultation shall be handled through the Office of the Bishop. With the goal of developing a process to achieve just and equitable compensation, the bishop may appoint, or the congregation council or rostered leader may request, specially trained consultants to facilitate continuing discussion. The bishop or his/her designee shall remind congregation councils of the importance of the housing equity allowance as a benefit to pastors in parsonages.
- 7. In accordance with S14.05. of the Synod Constitution, all rostered leaders shall complete the annual report for the bishop. This report lists compensation.
- 8. Congregation councils and rostered leaders shall develop an annual covenant of mutual goals, expectations, and responsibilities. The Mutual Ministry/Staff Support Committee will have, among its duties, the responsibility to review and evaluate the implementation of the covenant and to recommend appropriate compensation for rostered leaders. [Note: the synod council acted on January 18, 2017, to amend this item so that the second sentence will be replaced by "Appropriate processes will be developed to review and evaluate the implementation of the covenant." In future printings of this document, the synod council's wording will be shown as the adopted wording.]
- 9. Every candidate considering a call to a congregation in this synod shall be given a copy of the last annual meeting report of that congregation.
- 10. The Synod Council, through the appropriate synod committee, shall enter annually into consultations between the synod and its congregations to determine congregational mission support commitment goals for support of the synod's spending plan in the coming fiscal year.
- 11. Congregations of this synod considering a major capital expenditure are advised to consult with the bishop's designated representative before starting a major project involving capital expenditures.
- 12. Congregational leaders are encouraged to educate members as to how mission support funds are used, employing print and media resources created by the synod and the ELCA.
- 13. The bishop and his/her associates shall raise the issue of compensation publicly (at Synod Assemblies, mission district meetings, etc.) and give testimony to it as a matter of economic justice for those who serve the church.
- 14. The bishop or his/her designee shall provide an opportunity for education and discussion about compensation packages with new rostered leaders, emphasizing the leader's role in the process of compensation negotiation.
- 15. In arriving at a salary and benefits package, additional consideration shall be given to (a) prior work experience, especially in the case of "second career" leaders; (b) size and complexity of the employing congregation; (c) cost of living in different areas of the synod; and (d)

performance and achievement factors.

16. Congregations of the synod are urged to review annually the wages and benefits provided to lay employees, seeking to ensure that

wages are commensurate with skills, expectations and responsibilities; the possibility of offering health benefits is explored when needed and possible; opportunities to gain new skills are provided; and a forum for addressing concerns or grievances is made available.

Congregations are also urged to provide unemployment insurance for their lay employees.

- 17. Recognizing that we are all "blessed to be a blessing," congregations of the synod are urged to make the ministry of stewardship a high priority. Especially in times of pastoral transition, congregations are urged to review their current stewardship ministries, develop stewardship plans, and draw upon the resources offered by the ELCA and the synod to grow in the theology and practice of stewardship.
- 18. For a congregation in which the pastor(s) live in church-owned housing, the congregation council should review periodically the residential facilities to determine their safety and adequacy for the achievement of the purpose of the congregation in the community.
- 19. The synod encourages all congregations that enter a dissolution process to set aside an amount at least equal to the contribution requested by the Lutheran Archives Center at Philadelphia, the interest of which will be utilized to provide perpetual care for these records. If the assets of said congregations and agencies should come to the treasury of the synod without a grant to the Lutheran Archives Center having been made, the synod will forward the appropriate amount to the Lutheran Archives Center provided that the congregation's assets are sufficient to cover such a grant.
- 20. The synod calls upon all pastors and members of our congregations to support open occupancy in housing in their neighborhoods and to assist every sound and reasonable effort to end the exclusion of any person from equal opportunity to rent, lease, or purchase living accommodations with all facilities and services at equitable cost. Further, we call upon all members as well as pastors of our congregations to visit in Christian love all newcomers to their neighborhoods and to invite them into full participation in community affairs. Further, we call upon all members of our congregations, when selling real estate, to make it available for sale to all qualifying purchasers, and to this end to exercise great care in the selection of real estate agents who will handle such transactions in accordance with the wishes of the seller. And further, the synod extends to all its pastors and congregations the assurance of its continuing approval and support in the implementation of these principles.
- 21. The synod calls upon its congregations to include in their evangelism visitations all persons in their communities without distinction as to nationality race, color, language, sexual orientation, age, or religious experience in order to invite all people to experience God's grace through the ministries of the congregation. Further, the synod calls upon its members, congregations, and institutions to continue to be led by faith, the Scriptures, and church resources in order to address the racial barriers that have made the vision of a more multicultural church so difficult to achieve, while also recommitting to seek out, raise up, and support young people from all races, ethnic groups, and cultures for public leadership in the church.
- 22. Functions and events of this synod, its mission districts, and congregations shall be planned in such a manner and conducted in such places that physically, mentally, and sensory challenged persons can be included.
- 23. Congregations of this synod shall be safe environments for all children and their families and caregivers by

building Christ-centered, positive trusting relationships that nurture the healthy growth of children and strengthen families;

using our resources to provide a sanctuary for children;

creating a Gospel-centered, faith-based teaching and learning environment of hospitality that welcomes all children with their families and caregivers;

developing programs and places that help children to flourish;

collaborating with other faith communities, agencies, and service organizations that work for the well-being of children in our community;

working with the government for more public measures that support the well-being of children; supporting the efforts of the ELCA to meet the basic needs of children through Lutheran social ministry organizations as they provide caring services for children, and through the ELCA World Hunger Program, which carries our concerns for children through the world; and

encouraging all congregations to have adults working with children to undergo appropriate background checks.

- 24. Congregations of this synod are encouraged to engage in education and conversations to discern where God is leading them regarding the welcoming of and providing pastoral care for LGBT people and their families.
- 25. Congregations of this synod are encouraged to allow same-gender marriages within their facilities, providing the same resources and following the same criteria they use for different-gender marriages.
